



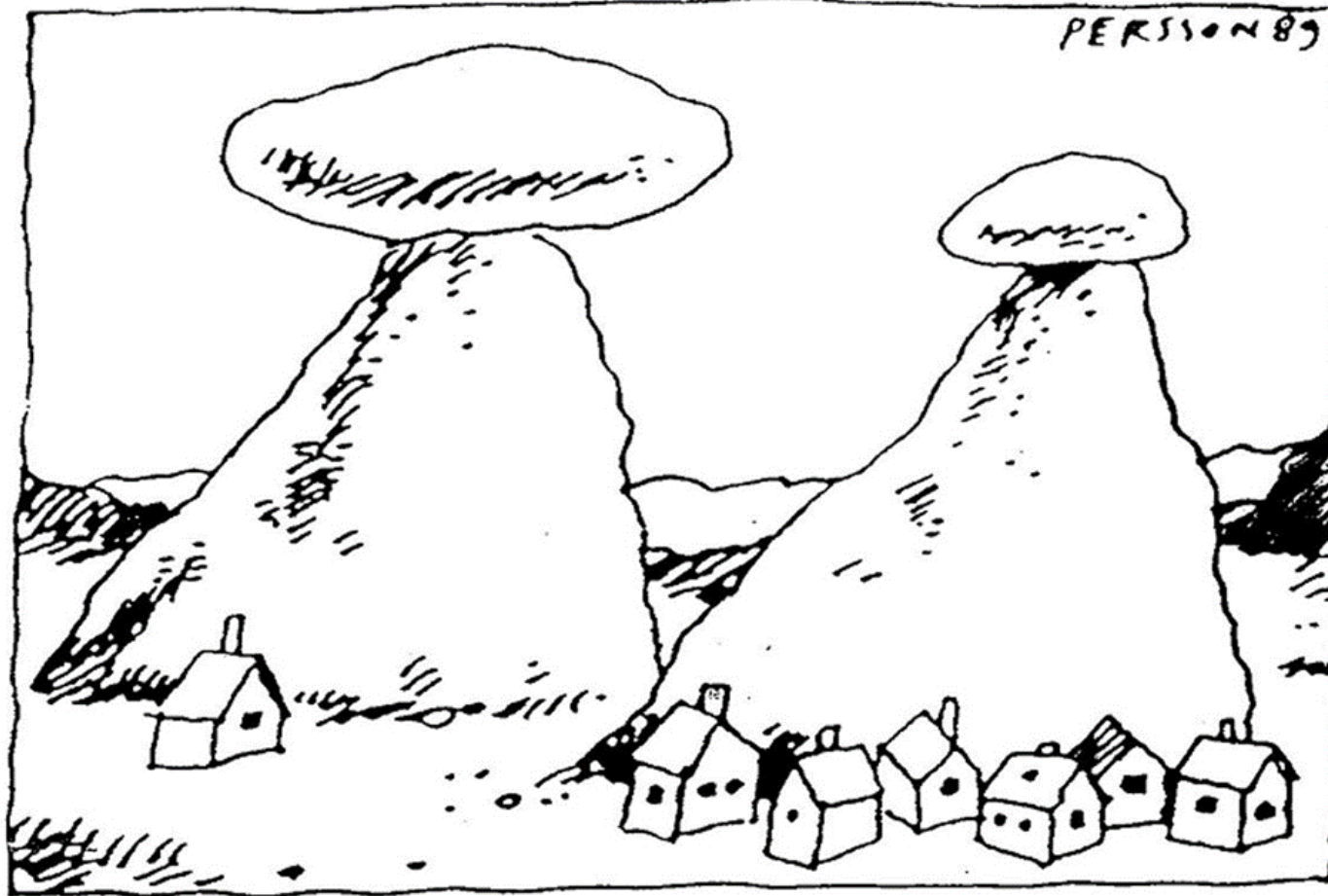

Occupational Health hazards...



Occupational health (breakdown)

- **Occupational accidents**

- Fall from height
- Falling objects
- Tripping and falling
- Trapped on a machine
- Contact with corrosive substances
- ...

- **Occupational disease**

- Caused by work
 - Hearing loss
 - Silicosis
 - Dermatitis
- Aggravated by work
 - Asthma
- Related to work
 - Occupational Stress
 - Carpal Tunnel Syndrome (CTS)
- - MSD

Occupational health hazards: Examples

Target organ	Disease	Agent
Lungs	Cancer, COPD, Asthma	Dust, smoke, particles, aerosol cleaning products, Asbestos
Skin	Toxic effects or allergy	Allergens, latex
Internal organs	Hepatotoxic effects, renal effects	Solvents
ENT	Hearingloss, tinnitus, rhinitis	Noise, dust
CNS	Encefalopathi	Solvents, mercury, metals, pesticides
Allergies	Respiratory organs, skin	Isocyanates, epoxy
Hyperreactivity		EMF, solvents, smells

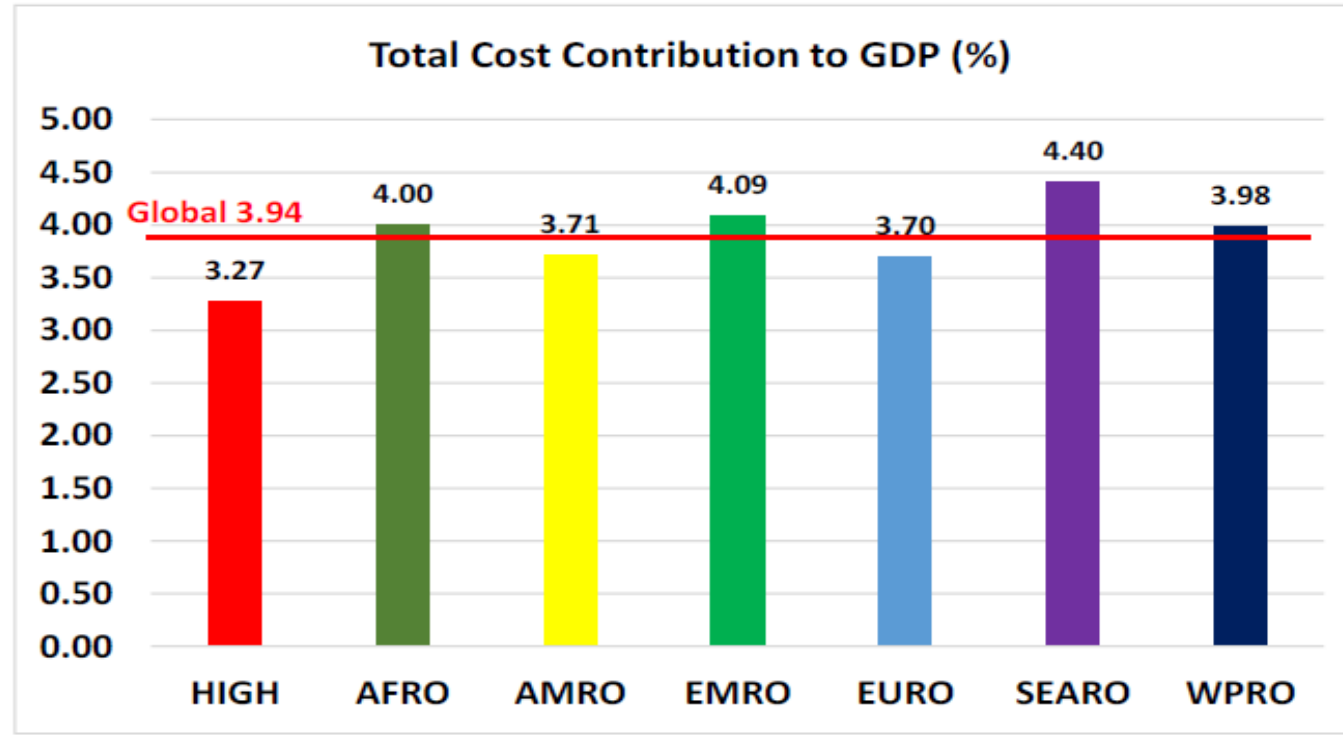
Estimated Costs...

The economic impact of failing to invest in worker safety and health is nearly equal to the combined gross domestic product of the 130 poorest countries in the world, International Labor Organization (ILO) Director-General Guy Ryder said Sept. 3 (2017) during the opening ceremony of the XXI World Congress on Safety and Health at Work.

The organization also unveiled estimates showing that, worldwide, 2.78 million workers die each year as a result of occupational injuries and illnesses. Of those, approximately 2.4 million are linked to work-related disease. The total cost of illnesses, injuries and deaths was 3.94 percent of the global GDP, or \$2.99 trillion.

The total cost percentage contribution to Gross Domestic Product (GDP) for the WHO regions was shown in the graph below.



The cost of poor or non-existing measures on safety and health were estimated to account for 3.94% of the global GDP.

AMRO denotes Low- and Middle-Income countries of the Americas

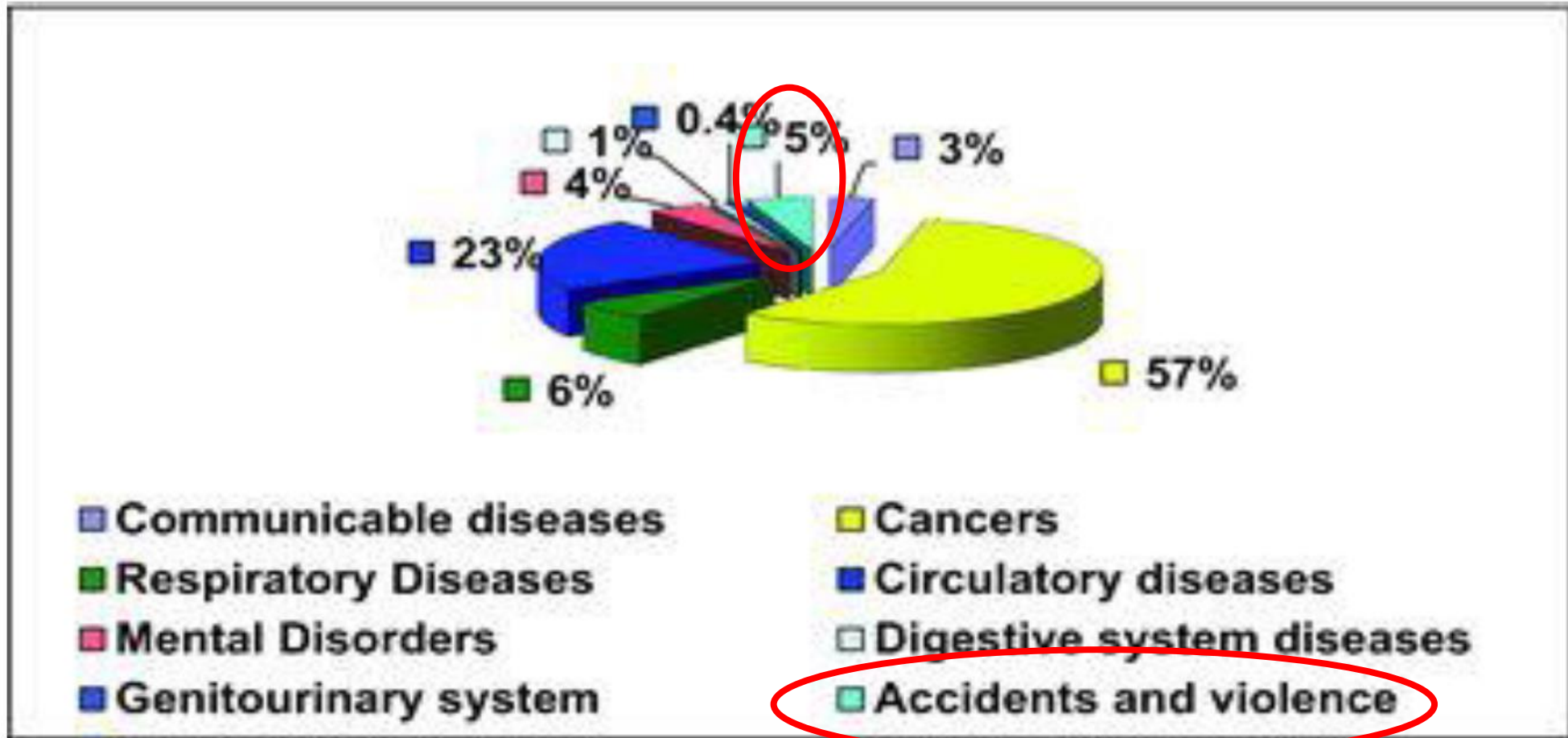
EMRO denotes Low- and Middle-Income countries of the Eastern Mediterranean Region

SEARO denotes Low- and Middle-Income countries of the South-East Asia Region

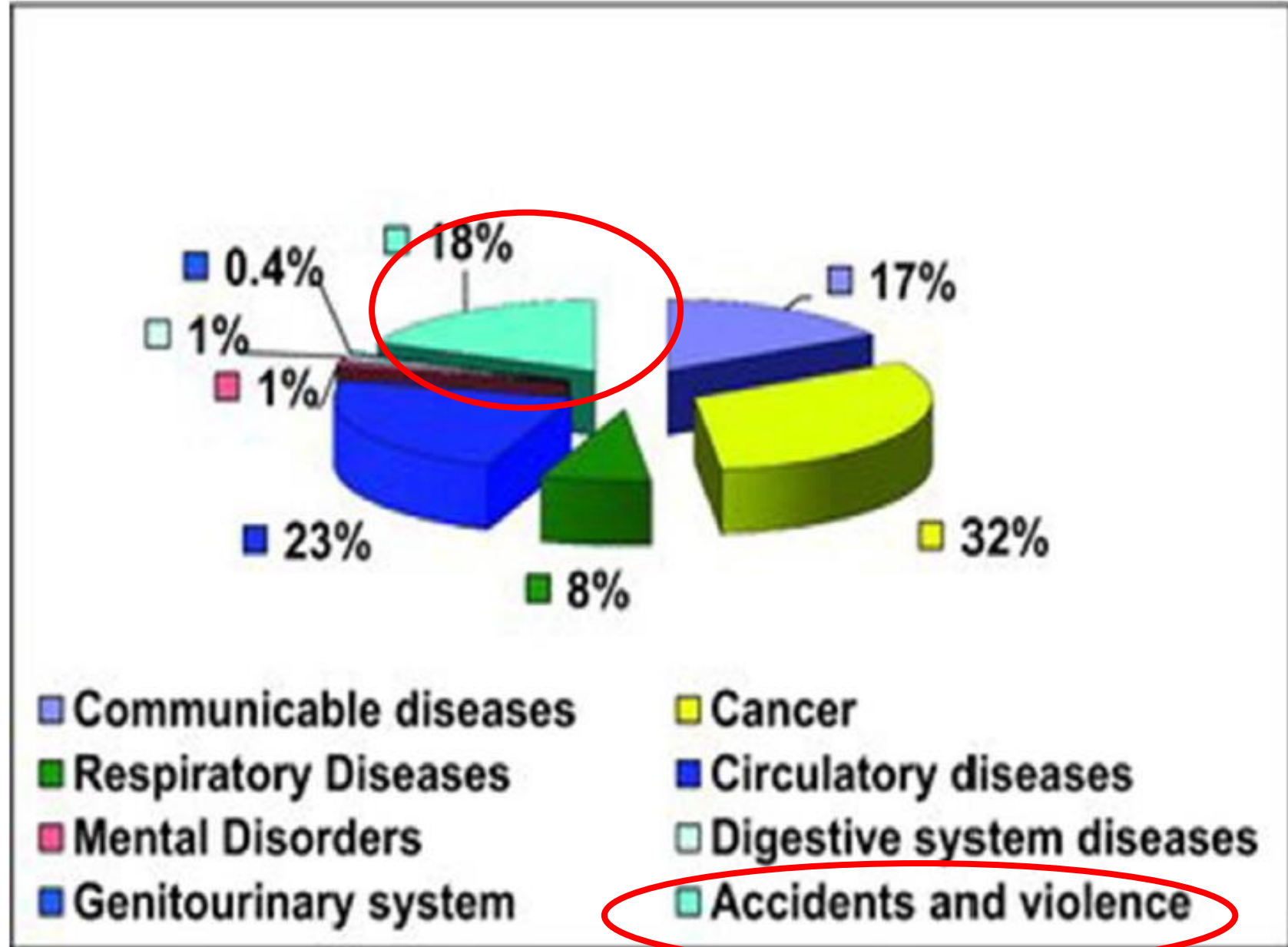
WPRO denotes Low- and Middle-Income countries of the Western Pacific Region

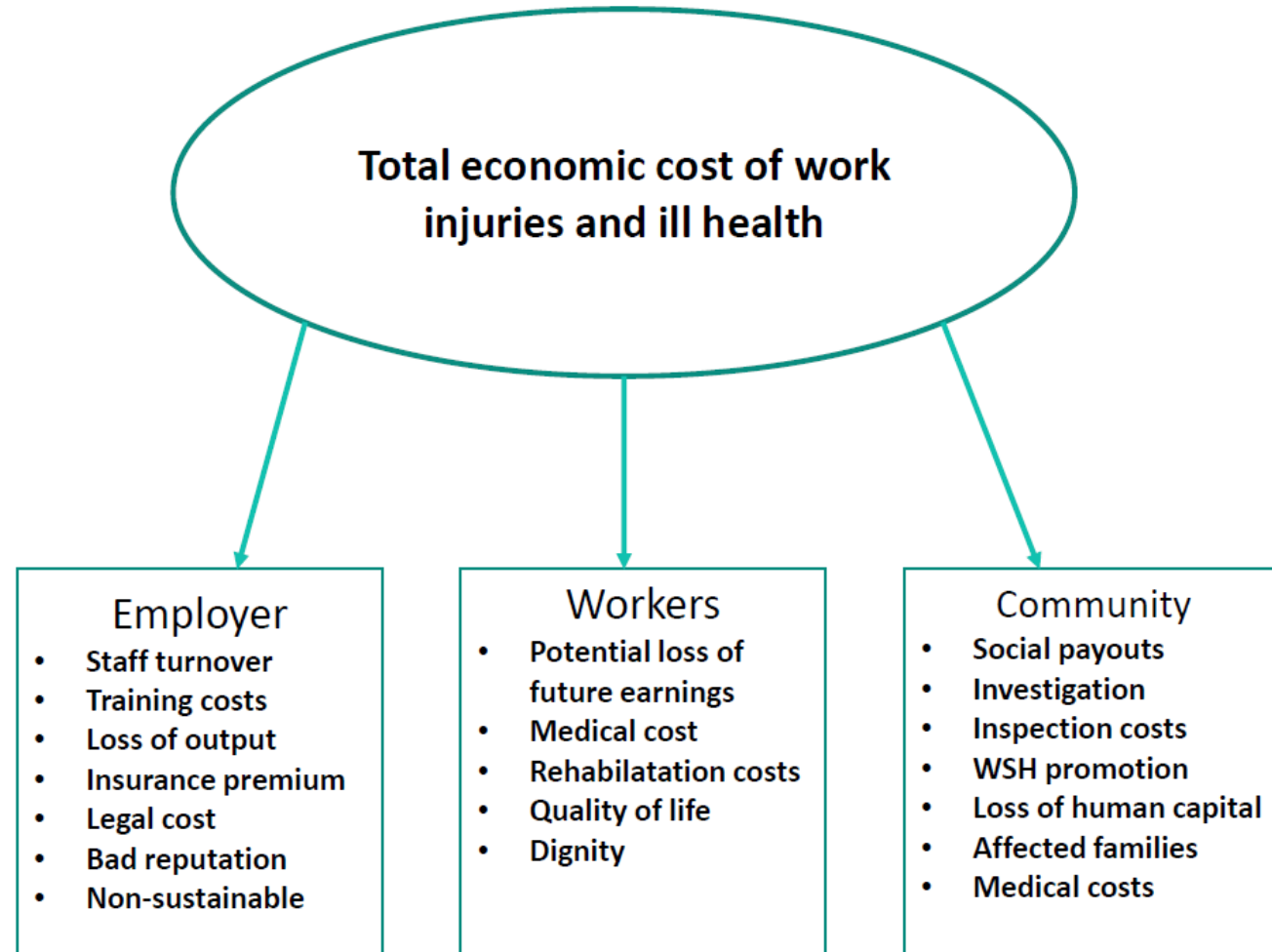
Work-related deaths (annually)

Health effects of shift work

- Reduction in quality and quantity of sleep
- Widespread complaints of “fatigue”
- Anxiety, depression, and increased neuroticism
- Increasing evidence of adverse cardiovascular effects
- Possible increase in gastrointestinal disorders
- Cancer?(nightwork and breastcancer)
- Increased risk of spontaneous abortion, low birth weight, and prematurity.
