Welcome to the ENOTHE Members' Newsletter!

Before we all take time for well-deserved summer break, we would like to share with you ENOTHE developments since the spring newsletter and upcoming activities.

As you might have noticed by now, ENOTHE's marketing and communication strategy is taking form with new information videos, changes in our website and the newsletter, and introduction of promotional items on our website. This strategy is also being shared to COTEC and ROTOS through Occupational Therapy Europe. More changes will soon come, which are intended to make ENOTHE more visible, information more accessible, and communication more contemporary.

Mid-year in the European Year of Skills 2023, the TUNING Taskforce continues strongly in their work over summer in order to finalize the reference frameworks this year. The taskforce is currently implementing a Delphi study, collecting data in July, to further develop the qualification reference framework as well as drafting the assessment reference framework.

Final preparations of the Annual Meeting in Oviedo are also under way. A preliminary program is available on our website. If you have not registered yet, the regular registration period is open now until 30th of September. Materials for the Pre-General Assembly are also in preparation and will be ready for distribution in September. We expect 123 members represented in the General Assembly this October. We are also expecting openings in the Board membership, so please start considering candidates for nomination.

ENOTHE is also active in the preparations for the first Occupational Therapy Europe Congress in 2024. The abstract submission will open in August and close at the end of October.

SIMULATION-BASED LEARNING IN OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

We are very pleased to share news of the SIMBA (Simulation-Based Learning (SBL) in Occupational Therapy (OT)) project, a three-year Erasmus+ funded project that aims to develop a package of evidence-based resources and tools for the application of SBL and evaluation in all phases of bachelor-level education in OT. The five acting partners are: project coordinator AP University College (Belgium); the University of Applied Health Sciences (Croatia); Turun Ammattikorkeakoulu OY (Finland); Istanbul Medipol Universitesi Vafki (Turkey) and FH Joanneum Gesellschaft MBH (Austria). We are currently in the first year of the project, in which the primary focus is the conduction of literature reviews and focus group studies to gather and validate information about the potential of SBL paradigm as a methodology through which professional competencies can be practiced, acquired, and evaluated during OT education. In the long term, this project aims to increase the quality, safety, and efficiency of OT service provision through the promotion of professional competency development using authentic, inclusive, and innovative simulation methodologies. All project results will be available on an open web platform: https://simba.turkuamk.fi/.

Call for SBL-experts – focus group

In this project a unified Framework of professional competencies in OT education and Guidelines for the implementation of SBL in OT education will be developed. To validate this framework/guidelines and to prepare for subsequent phases of the project, focus groups are planned to receive the input of experts in simulation and SBL methodology. They are planned to be held between August and October 2023, will be conducted online and will take about 90 minutes.

ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY AND OCCUPATIONAL PERFORMANCE LABORATORY



After several years of planning, on December 3rd, 2021, the School of Health Sciences from the Polytechnic of Leiria inaugurated the Assistive Technology and Occupational Performance Laboratory (aTOPlab). A structure that congregates research, training, and community support related to Assistive Technologies and Products. This laboratory is dedicated to the study, assessment, and counselling of assistive products to facilitate the occupational performance and engagement of people with any health condition to participate in their activities of daily living.

The aTOPlab also provides differentiated therapeutic and (re)habilitative interventions using technologies. It has a dedicated area, the "Espaço INCLUI", supported by Fundação Altice, where it is possible to promote digital equity and access to digital environments (social, leisure, work and educational). With specialised human resources and the latest assistive technologies for digital and communication access, it works on digital capacitation and augmentative and alternative communication.

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Equipped with assistive products of the different ISO classes, it has a comprehensive approach and performs holistic assessments of a person's needs in different areas of occupation.




FIGURE 1 - ATOPLAB' SYMBIOTIC WORK AREAS

Created to serve the whole community (students, faculty, and researchers from any organic unit) of the Polytechnic of Leiria, it is based on a synergy between the School of Health Sciences and the Center for Innovative Care and Health Technology. Students can have classes in the aTOPlab, using the different assistive aids to train and gain professional competencies. It can be a clinical placement for students from the educational program of Occupational Therapy and allow the students to develop and implement their final research projects using the instruments or software present in the aTOPlab. It establishes a symbiotic relationship combining community support, research, and training. While a person receives therapeutic intervention, they help the students with their professional development and research projects (figure 1).

EMPOWERING PUPPETRY

Milda Gintilienė, the head of the Department of Rehabilitation, Faculty of Medicine, Kaunas College, together with project coordinator Povilas Beseckas, lecturers Aiste Pranskaityte – Bielevičiene and Emilija Strimaityte, and first-year students of the Occupational Therapy program participated in the "Empowering puppetry" project week, which took place this year. on May 24-27.

Teachers and students from Finland, Latvia and Estonia also participated in the project together. During the project, students were introduced to various social risk groups, showing how difficult and complicated the situations and life stories of their clients can be. Creative storytelling through mediators provided students with useful and different knowledge and methodologies on how to approach the client, how to talk to him, how to open up and help solve the most difficult problems.



Participants of the "Empowering puppetry" project communicated with seniors from the Public Institution "Care Center". The goal of the students was to become familiar with the diagnosis of dementia, to reveal the experiences, stories, and condition of individuals. The elders of the Public Institution "Care Center" very willingly got involved in the discussion and conversation. With great motivation, they told the stories of their lives: funny, painful, sad and happy. They willingly got involved in joint activities, contributed to the presentation of the students' final projects, chose the music, and participated in the canine therapy session together.

HOME MODIFICATION PROGRAM AND AGING IN PLACE IN CANARY ISLANDS

People prefer to grow old at home (Aging in place) (Peek et al, 2016), in a familiar environment and surrounded – as far as possible – by their belongings and loved ones. This desire to grow old at home is not simply a personal preference. The World Health Organization highlights that the place where one ages has important impacts on people's health: doing so in a familiar place increases levels of confidence, independence, and autonomy (WHO, 2015).

The experience in caring for people at home, made us aware of the needs in terms of Accessibility and use of Assistive Technologies that exist in the homes of the older adults, and how these, added to social isolation, generate a significant decrease in people's quality of life.

The Accessible and Functional Home program began in January 2021 at the Association of Caregivers, Family Members and Friends of People with Dependency, Alzheimer's and other Dementias (Acufade) in Tenerife, Spain. This program offers free advice and provides "a hope for aging in place" to older adults in homes, through the practice of Occupational Therapy.

The general objective of the program is to improve the quality of life of people in situations of dependency, their families and caregivers, providing assessment, advice, resources and training in matters of accessibility, home modification and assistive technologies in order to build "homes facilitators" that promote personal autonomy.



The program takes into account the real needs at home of the person in a situation of dependency, their family and caregiver. That is why it offers a complete service, consisting of:

- Assessment of the occupational performance of the person at home.
- Assessment, recommendation and training in the use of Assistive Technologies for the home.
- Assessment and advice on aspects of physical, cognitive and sensory accessibility for home modification.



To date, more than 800 homes of people in a situation of dependency have been attended to on the islands of Tenerife, Gran Canaria and Fuerteventura.

The main team is made up of five occupational therapists and Acufade's social workers. The occupational therapists that are part of the team are: Cristina Perdomo (Project Coordinator), Raquel Duque, Victor Ferreras, Javier Pérez and María Jesús González. It is a committed and excited team that works in a coordinated manner to offer comprehensive care and bring the essence of the program with quality, creativity and professionalism to people's homes.

Older adults, their families and caregivers have stated that thanks to the program they have felt:

- Oriented and informed on assistive technology issues to facilitate occupational performance at home.
- Attended, listened to and helped regarding their accessibility difficulties at home.
- Informed about the support products that they can request from social security and other public institutions.





The committed program is interprofessional collaboration with occupational therapy, architecture and design professionals, generating collaborative ties during home modifications. The program offers a free, innovative and pioneering the service in Canary Islands, committed to improving accessibility and the use of assistive technologies in the homes of people in a situation of dependency and continues to work to reach all populations that need it.

THE UKROTHE PROJECT: JOBSHADOWING





















Five participants of the Erasmus+ Ukrothe Project were on jobshadowing in Belgium. This jobshadowing gave the participants the chance to implement their theoretical knowledge they gained in the theoretical courses within the Ukrothe project. Besides they experienced the implementation of occupational therapy in the multidisciplinary approach of people with an occupational question.

The participants were welcome in AZ DELTA Hospital, Covias and BC Spermalie. In AZ Delta they joined the teams on neurological and locomotory rehabilitation. Covias is an organisation focused on people with mental health problems. BC Spermalie is a school for children with special needs, especially multiple visual problems.

For the participants this was a very positive experience. Teachers of the universities gained new ideas on how to teach skills in the occupational therapy education. Participants of the working field took a lot of ideas with them to implement occupational therapy in practice.

The UKROTHE project is a very inspiring project for all participants and offered a large range of learning opportunities, also in the difficult situation in Ukraine on this moment.


"I was very pleased and informative to have an internship in this specialty, because, the staff was very friendly, attentive and professional in their work."

EUROPEAN MASTER OF SCIENCE IN OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY – FIRST TIME EVER IN SPAIN!

In June 2023, 20 students of the European Master of Science in Occupational Therapy were welcomed at University of A Coruña – the first time ever that the module "Socio-cultural perspectives of human occupation - Scientific and theoretical argumentation" was delivered in Spain!

The European MSc in Occupational Therapy consists of six modules, five of which are delivered by one of the five partner institutions that form the OT-EuroMaster consortium: Amsterdam University of Applied Sciences, NL (AUAS); University of Brighton, UK (UoB); Karolinska Institutet, SWE (KI); Zurich University of Applied Sciences, CH (ZHAW) and since autumn 2022, University of A Coruna, ES (UDC). Students spend one to two weeks at each of the partner institutions for intensive classwork. The fourth module, focusing on socio-cultural perspectives of human occupation, has now been hosted by the team A Coruña for the first time. Natalia Rivas Quarneti (module coordinator), Inés Viana Moldes (Board member), Lisette Farias and Lilian Magalhães are the new module core team. Their expertise in the field of social-cultural aspects of occupation and social transformation within OT fits perfectly to the scope of the module and enriches the multitude of perspectives within the international staff team.

At UDC, students explored Occupational Therapy and/or Occupational Science concepts and theoretical frameworks that illustrate the situated nature of occupation within socio-political contexts and cultural conditions. And consistently, the module supported their development of critical and reflexive skills related to scientific and theoretical argumentation and enabled them to position their practice and/or research within European and international contexts.

During the module, students had the chance to explore the local community with the NGO EcosdoSur and discuss with some very renowned guest lecturers: Hanneke van Bruggen, Denise Gastaldo, Antía Pérez Caramés, Salvador Simó and Inda Zango!



As SPOTeurope, we are very happy to take part in the meetings to be held every 6 months, where the negotiations on the targeted stages will continue.

In April, we made our SPOT introduction presentation for students in Postdam, Germany. Their teacher Patric Duletzki, who was also involved in ENOTHE, reached out to explain to students the history of SPOTeurope, our missions, and visions, the activities and projects we have done and plan to do, and much more.
