



WHEN YOUR STUDENT HAS **HIDRADENITIS SUPPURATIVA**

Your student has HS. This is important for you to know, since HS is a disease that often has a serious impact on patients' daily lives. For many patients the main concern related to the disease is how it affects their studies.





Having HS is compatible with being a student

HS is a chronic skin disease causing fluid-filled abscesses, odour problems and pain.

It may therefore be more difficult for students with HS than for their fellow students to complete an education. For example, your student may get into trouble when absence increases during breakouts, surgery, discomfort or pain. And your student may come under financial pressure because of the expenses for high-priced dressings and bandages and limited possibilities of taking a student job. But the disease

not only poses a physical challenge for your student. Because of its symptoms, the disease is tabooed and many live with the disease in secret. This is especially true at an age when your student is establishing an identity and is highly sensitive to the surroundings.

Support through dialogue and action

It is incredibly important that you are willing to to talk to your student about the disease and about how you can create the best setting together for a good course of study. But remember that entering into dialogue with you

I only got around to telling my principal and my fellow students about my disease after I had been in hospital for a long time."

may be hard for your student. The process of approaching you may have been even longer than you think. Therefore, it is important for you to show you understand, care and is willing to help when you talk about the disease.

"Luckily I've had a good talk with my teacher and my principal. I had severe pains in the second year of my upper secondary education, so I was absent a lot of the time. If I hadn't been open about it I would definitely have had to take my exam with examination requirements including the full curriculum and I might have lost my state education grant."


It is important that you consider the setting that would create the best balance between the disease and the course of study. Some students need a more flexible course of study, while others need compensatory classes or a solution to a high absence rate.


SUPPORT OPTIONS FOR YOUR STUDENT

Various support options are available, depending on whether your student is apprenticed or is taking a youth education programme or a higher education.



Special educational needs support

If your student needs special aids for his or her education, either due to physically or mentally reduced functional capacity, he or she may apply for special educational needs support. This option is available at some institutions of vocational and higher education.



Special educational needs support may include necessary assistive products such as compensation for additional teaching expenses, sit/stand desks, computers and other technical aids.



Examination assistance

If enrolled in a youth education programme, your student may be allowed to take an examination on special conditions if, due to HS, he or she is unable to maintain his or her usual level. The special conditions may include additional breaks, a longer examination period, practical assistance or the use of a computer. The special conditions must be agreed between the principal and your student before the examination. If enrolled in a higher education course, your student may apply for a number of exemptions.

Absence

In special cases, your student may extend his or her youth education programme education by completing the education in four years. In upper



secondary schools, the student may be offered schooling at home or at the hospital on grounds of illness. If enrolled in a higher education course, your student may apply for additional monthly state education grants.
