Reading	Practice reading your school reading book and others you have at home.
	Use Oxford Owl (https://www.oxfordowl.co.uk/) to sign up for a free account, which gives
	you access to a range of ebooks that match their school reading level.
	Online phonics games are available on Phonics Play <a href="https://www.phonicsplay.co.uk/">https://www.phonicsplay.co.uk/</a> they
	currently have all resources free when you use this login. Username: march20 password:

Writing	Practice spelling your Year 1 tricky words. As well as focusing on the spelling concentrate on
	forming your letters correctly and challenge yourself to join them together.
	Try writing these tricky words in a range of sentences, making sure you remember capital
	letters, fingers spaces and full stops. Challenge yourself by adding in adjectives (describing
	words) and extending the sentences by using "and" or "because".
	Some ideas for writing bigger pieces could be: A story set in a castle, a letter to a family
	member or friend, an Easter/Spring poem or a set of instructions for a game you like to play!
Maths	Practice adding and subtracting your numbers up to the number 20. For example, 7+9=16 or
	14-7=7. Use practical objects to support counting.
	Practice counting in 2's, 5's, and 10's.
	Group together objects as a way of doing, for example, 5 groups of 2 socks is 10.
	Remember to use Numbots to practice online.
Science	Go to twinkl (www.twinkl.co.uk) create a login (which is free for parents at the moment) and
	search for science experiments at home and find an experiment to try together.
	At school, we have done a material hunt finding objects and identifying what they are made
	of. Go on a hunt around your home and see what you can find.
Art	Log into your purple mash account ( <a href="https://www.purplemash.com/login/">https://www.purplemash.com/login/</a> ) please contact
	your teacher if you do not have the account details.
	When on the home page, click on the art icon and choose from a range of activities. Save any
	art work in your my work folder.
	Create a spring picture of things that you see growing or being born at this time of the year.
	This can be painted, drawn, collaged, or in any creative form.
History	We have previously looked at timelines and putting events of history in order of when they
	happened. It would be fantastic for the children to create one about their own lives. For
	example, when they were born, any brothers or sisters being born, when they started
	school, when they lost their first tooth, etc. This would be a fantastic time to look at old
	photos together and discuss things that have happened in their past.
Geography	We have started looking at the countries in the UK and seeing where they are on a map. Can
	they find out the capital cities of each country in the UK (London, Cardiff, Edinburgh and
	Belfast) and choose one city to make a poster with any facts have discovered.

fitness	some fantastic videos you can dance to as well as practice your counting skills. See what else
