SASNET Work Report 2014 now published

The complete SASNET Work Report 2014 was published on 11 February 2015. It contains an extensive summary of the work being done by SASNET at Lund University in 2014, in Swedish. An important issue during he year has been to revitalize the staff by employing young co-workers, A concious effort has also been to increase and support student activities, and also involve SASNET in the educational programmes at Lund Universuty. Besides a colourful 2014 Activity Report in English is enclosed, giving details about every single networking activity during the year. We organised 15 academic seminars by ourselves or with partner institutions at university or with external partners such at the Association of Foreign Affairs (UPF) and the Swedish Commitee for Afghanistan (SCA). SASNET also organised an international research workshop in Falsterbo. Besides, our student association SASA successfully organised eight informal fika without borders seminars, as these popular events are called, and other events such as movie nights.

A large number of Scandinavian and South Asian academics,



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
journalists and business people visited SASNET, and we made valuable networking tours to several universities in Sweden, Europe and South Asia, besides attending the 23rd European Conference on South Asian Studies in Zurich.

SASNET also administered the fourth and final Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR) visiting Indian guest professorship at Lund University, and acted as consultants to the university's

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Division of External Relations. With full funding from Lund University, SASNET also made efforts to increase South Asia related research at the university, and integrate South Asian studies into educational programmes. Finally, we continued to develop and update our extensive Internet gateway disseminating information on South Asia-related education and research being conducted at 300 Swedish university departments, and also publishing the monthly on-line newsletter that circulates to 3,000 recipients worldwide. Nine panels selected for SASNET 2015 Conference on Structural Transformation of South Asia





transformation of South Asia on 20-22 May 2015. The conference is entitled

"South Asia in Transformation: World of Slums, Global Power Houses or Utopias? Migration, labour, and family changes in a dynamic region". The conference will have nine panels, each one led by eminent researchers. The theme of the panels vary from "Urbanization and Social Sustainability", to "Ethnicity, Religion and Changing Caste Relations", and "Structural Transformation and Social Conflicts". Full papers of accepted abstracts are due on March 15, 2015 (5000-8000 words).

Keynote speakers are Gita Sen from the Indian Institute of Management, Bangalore, India (and Harvard School of Public Health, Harvard University); Ruth Kattumuri, London School of Economics, UK; Zoya Hasan, Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR); Abram de Swaan, University of Amsterdam, the Netherlands; and Geoff Wood, University of Bath, Bath, UK.

The purpose of the conference is to explore the social consequences of the transformation of South Asian societies (and by implication, the world). Structural transformations produce new opportunities and risks as job possibilities and wealth are created and redistributed unevenly. This may lead to the marginalization of some groups as well as social conflicts. The aim of this conference is also to map the social impact of South Asia's structural transformation so far, with specific reference to changes in labour migration patterns and in the composition of the care economy of families and households. Each of these aspects is often studied in isolation despite the fact that they are deeply interrelated. Full information about the conference.

Lund University organizes EASAS workshop in May 2015

On behlf of the European Association of South Asian Studes (EASAS), SASNET will host the Ninth European PhD workshop in South Asia Studies, to be held at Lund University, Sweden, on 18-19 May 2015. This is a two-day annual workshop for a maximum of 20 PhD candidates and six faculty members from European universities with an aim to give PhD students an opportunity to receive feedback on their theses from senior scholars and fellow PhD candidates who are also working on South Asian topics.



Participants should be PhD candidates in their second or later year at a European university, working on any topic that has a strong relevant to South Asia. SASNET/Lund University invites European universities to nominate a maximum of three students each for the workshop. Each university should, if possible, also be prepared to send a researcher who can participate in the workshop as a discussant, and (if possible) commit to assisting with travel and accommodation costs for their students. Lund University will provide board and lodging for students and guest faculty members. Sending universities nominated participating students till 31 January 2015. The names of selected participants will be announced in February 2015.

SASNET visit to University of Gothenburg, Friday 23 January 2015

On Friday 23 January 2015 afternoon, SASNET deputy director Lars Eklund visited Sahlgrenska Academy, as the Faculty of Medicine is called at University of Gothenburg, to meet some of the researchers there who are involved in South Asia related research. It was a kind of belated follow-up meeting of a SASNET visit to Sahlgrenska Academy in April 2008 (read the report from that visit).

The participants were Professor Alexandra Krettek from the Department of Internal Medicine and Clinical Nutrition, Institute of Medicine; Associate Professor Anna Lundgren from the Department of Microbiology and Immunology; and Associate Professor Sukanya Raghavan from the same department.

The reason behind the visit was to present what SASNET stands for today, being a network fully funded by Lund University but still keeping the national databases on South Asia related research at all Swedish universities, and to learn from the Gothenburg researchers their current activitues in order to update information on SASNET's extensive web site.

Prof. Krettek was till recently also connected to the Nordic School of Public Health (NHV) in Gothenburg. However NHV

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was closed down on December 31, 2014. Alexandra Krettek herself has been involved in collaboration programmes with Nepal, and supervised a number of sandwich PhD candidates from Nepal. Anna Lundgren and Sukanya Raghavan both work at a department with a strong South Asia connection, especially with Bangladesh and the highly reputed International Centre for **Diarrhoeal Disease** Research, Bangladesh (ICDDR.B) institute in Dhaka. The department owes its good reputation

to the eminent research work by Prof. Emeritus Jan Holmgren and Prof. Anne-Mari Svennerholm, both of them still active in research.

From Sahlgrenska Academy, Lars took a walk passing by Chalmers Institute of Technology down to the

House of Humanities (Humanisten) at Renströmsgatan, housing a number of departments within the field Humanities at University of Gothenburg. Here a meeitng was scheduled with Professor Åke Sander at the Department of Literature, History of Ideas, and Religion (LIR). Prof. Sander has been in charge of the Go:India project, a three year University of Gothenburg project (2011 –



2013, but extended til 2014), intended to build a platform for co-operation within the areas of research, teaching and education between its Swedish partners, also involving researchers at the Faculty of Fine, Applied and Performing Arts (School of Photography, and the School of Design and Crafts); Sahlgrenska Academy (Global Health, Institute of Biomedicine); and the Faculty of Social Sciences (Dept. of Social Work), and their collaboration partner institutions in India. Go:India was one of a number of international projects at University of Gothenburg, being part of what was called 'The Global University'. The Go:India project has now been closed down, but hopefully a new similar initiative may take shape during 2015. A proposal for a South Asia project awaits possible approval. presentation will be delivered by Aradhna Aggarwal, new Chair professor in Indian Studies at the Asia Research Centre (ACR) within the Copenhagen Business School (CBS). Prof. Aggarwal will speak about "".

Before joining CBS, Prof. Aggarwal worked at the Dept. of Business Economics, University of Delhi. Her research interests include industrial growth, entrepreneurship, globalisation, economic reforms, competition, international trade, FDI, technology transfer, technology

creation and innovations, export competitiveness, and WTO-related issues. She has several publications in other national and international journals and chapters in edited books. She has singly authored monographs: *The WTO Anti-dumping Agreement and Developing countries*; and *Social and Economic Impact of SEZs in India*, both published by OUP. She has also been the principal author of the "*Kerala Perspective Plan 2030*".

The programme also includes a couple of presentations by Indian students at Lund University, and a cultural programme in the form of a rabindrasangheet session by Bubu Munshi Eklund. Besides some deliciosis Indian snacks will be served.

Fika Without Borders South Asia events is a project started by SASA, in collaboration with SASNET, in which SASA organises a fika once a month, each time focusing on one of the eight South Asian countries. The 2015 series started wilth a Nepal fika on 5th February. More information.

· SASA launched 2015 spring semester with Nepal fika seminar

The first SASA 2015 Fika without borders seminar was dedicated to Nepal. It was held on Thursday 5 February 2015, The event was hosted by Noshan Bhattarai and Rubana Musharrat from the SASA board, and Lars Eklund from SASNET. Dr. Uddhab Pyakurel from Kathmandu University, during the early spring 2015 based in Copenhagen as a Danida scholarship holder and being connected to the Dept. of Education, Aarhus University, was the chief guest. 35 people came to listen to his presentation entitled *"Politics of Education & Marginalized Community in Nepal"*. Dr. Pyakurel has a PhD from Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, and is teaching Political Sociology as Assistant Professor in the School of Arts at Kathmandu University. He is also associated with various democracy forums i.e., South Asian Dialogues on Ecological Democracy (SADED), Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam (VK), and Network Institute for Global Democratization (NIGD). In 2007, he wrote "Maoist Movement in Nepal: A Sociological Perspective" (New Delhi: Adroit Publishers, 2007), and he has been the co-author of two books – "Dalit Representation in National Politics of Nepal" (Kathmandu: NNDSWO 2012) and "State of Conflict and Democratic Movement in Nepal: Inclusive Policy Guidelines" (Lalitpur: School of Arts, Kathmandu University & SNV=Nepal, 2014).

Lund University student and SASA board member Noshan Bhattarai also held an interesting presentation about his way from studying in Nepal to doing research in Sweden. Dr. Neil Webster from Danish Institute of International Studies (DIIS), but previously for three years working as regional technical advisor with the UN Capital Development

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Fund (UNCDF) in Kathmandu, who happened to be in Lund on this day – invited by SASNET – made some extremely relevant comments and summaries to the two Nepalese speakers presentations. Finally the Swedish NGO ABC with work being done in Nepal prresented themselves, and they also catered for the food being served. Read more...

 SASNET Networking Partner 14: Dept. of Urban and Rural Development; Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences (SLU), Uppsala

The Swedish University of Agricultural Science (SLU), based in Uppsala, Umeå and Alnarp, is a strong centre for South Asia related research in Sweden. The Division of Rural Development (LAG) within the Department of Urban and Rural

Development has interests and activities relevant both to rural development in the Nordic region

and in the 'south' (Africa and Asia). The research carried out is interdisciplinary and focuses on rural change processes within a comparative perspective.



The researchers include Professor Adam Pain, who has combined a career of working in theory and practice in Rural Development. From 1992 to 2000 he worked as principle advisor to the Minister of Agriculture in Bhutan on research and extension policy and natural resource

management including running a long term EU agricultural support services. In 2001 he rejoined Development Studies, UK as a Senior Research Fellow and since then has worked extensively in Afghanistan on rural economy and change and worked with research programmes on Natural Resource management (forestry) in Nepal and India. He has published extensively on Bhutan and Afghanistan. In August 2009, Dr. Pain was awarded a SASNET planning grant for a research project entitled "Development of a Rural Development Network between the College of Natural Resources (CNR), Royal University of Bhutan, and the Division of Rural Development, SLU, Uppsala". The project was carried out in collaboration with Mr. Dorji Wangchuk and Dr. Jamba Gyeltshen,



Recently, in November 2014, Professor Adam Pain was granted a development research grant from the Swedish Research Council for a project entitled "Thinking beyond REDD: analysing smallholder's motivation and actions for

ecosystem service management", involving research on deforestation in Brazil and Nepal, and the implementation of the the United Nations collaborative initiative on Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and forest Degradation (REDD).

Associate Professor Seema Arora Jonsson, defended her doctoral dissertation on "Unsettling the Order: Gendered subjects and Grassroots activism in two forest communities" in 2005. In August 2012, Seema published a book entiled "Gender, Development and Environmental Governance. Theorizing Connections", dealing with the diversity of the people involved at multiple levels – villagers, development agents, policy-makers, private resource users and others – and taking seriously their aspirations, conflicts and collaborations. It included insights from India.



Dr. **Ian Christoplos** has been a part-time non-resident researcher at the Divison of Rural Development. His work with the department primarily has consisted of contributions to the department's education programme in Vietnam, but he has also worked on extension service provision, dealing with agricultural rehabilitation and rural development in countries experiencing chronic conflict. In recent years he has completed issues papers on agriculture and livelihoods, commissioned by the Afghanistan Research and Evaluation Unit, AREU. Later on he has also been highly involved in the evaluation of

AREU. Since August 2009, Dr. Christoplos is also working as a part-time Senior Project Researcher for the Danish Institute for International Studies (DIIS) in Copenhagen. His role there is to analyze issues related to the role of local institutions in relation to poverty and natural resource management, with particular focus on climate change. . KTH researchers sign MoU on Arsenic mitigation centre in West Bengal



On 30 December 2014, the Department of Sustainable Development, Environmental Science and Engineering at the Royal Institute of Technology (KTH) in Stockholm signed a Memorandum of

Understanding (MoU) with the Indian state government of West Bengal, that also involves two other partners, namely the prestigeous Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Kharagpur, and the United Nations Children's Fund (Unicef). The MoU covers technical support in setting up an International Centre for Water Quality Research at Joka in the south-western fringes of Kolkata. It also involves also collaborative research for implementation of sustainable arsenic mitigation methods in the affected localities of Bengal. The

Centre will be funded by the Indian Central

government and be complete by 2016. Former finance minister Mr Pranab Mukherjee had made the announcement in the Union Budget of 2012-13 and had allocated Rs 50-crore as the first installment. Principal secretary of the West Bengal state Public Health and Engineering (PHE) department Mr Saurav Das signed the MoU. Afterwards he commented for The Statesman newspaper:

"This is for the first time that a state government department has inked a MoU with international agencies of repute. This will go a long away in tackling arsenic contamination in our state and ensure supply of quality drinking water to everyone".

The driving force behind the initiative on the Swedish side is Professor Prosun Bhattacharya, coordinator of the KTH-International Groundwater Arsenic Research Group, strongly involved in research on how to tackle the problem with Arsenic in groundwater all over the world. Read more...

Doctoral thesis on Street Children and Services in Bangladeshi cities

Md Munjur E Moula defended his doctoral dissertation entitled "Street Children and Services: A Qualitative Study of Street Children in the Context of Service Delivery System in Bangladesh" at the Department of Social Studies/Social Work, University of Helsinki, Finland, on 20 June 2012. Dr. Moula is now working as a post-doc at the Department of Energy Technology, Aalto University in Espoo. The thesis examines how the existing service system for street children is structured in two cities of Bangladesh and from the perspectives of street children themselves and from service providers perspective. Hence, the study analyses explanations for (1) how the children end up in the streets and their street-based livelihood system and surviving, and for (2) how it is written about the child perspective, child rights, service delivery for children and the elimination of street children from the streets by developing their livelihood conditions. Thus, these explanations were considered in this research combining and using ecology of



human development, poverty, social exclusion and Giddens structuration theory. The structuration theory offers the dimensions of child policy and service delivery system. The study explores its arguments through the situation of street children (beneficiary and non-beneficiary) and support delivery system for them in two cities as Dhaka and Bogra in Bangladesh. • Call for South Asian candidates to Swedish Institute Young Leaders programme



The Swedish Institute has issued a Call for applications to its 2015 leadership





programme entitled Young Connectors of the Future (YCF). This is an intercultural leadership programme that aims to lay a foundation for dialogue, mutual

understanding and knowledge sharing among young leaders from four selected countries in South Asia (Afghanistan, Bangladesh, India and Pakistan). The programme invites young leaders from these countries, representing different sectors of society, and who are actively working for social change in their respective contexts. Intercultural leadership training is combined with theory and practice in the fields of transparency, democracy and human rights. The programme aims at building a dynamic network of young leaders and connectors of the future in the region, promoting dialogue, knowledge-sharing and



openness. The YCF programme is designed to provide the participants with new skills, networks and innovative tools to strengthen their work to drive social change in their respective contexts. The participants are visionaries who are in a position to make a difference.

To be en eligible candidate you must be between 22 and 32 years old, be dynamic and open-minded and actively working for democracy, transparency and human rights within the spheres of society, culture, politics, entrepreneurship and media. This may include project managers, youth leaders, youth politicians, government civil servants, lawyers, journalists/bloggers, entrepreneurs, cultural workers etc. The programme will be held in English: proficient command of both written and spoken English is therefore a requirement.

There is no fee for the programme. Travel, hotel and food expenses are included in the programme. The deadline for applications is 3 March 2015. The first part of the programme (module 1) will be held in Sweden during the period 8–25 September 2015, and a second part (module 2) will be held at some other location (still not confirmed) 14–21 February 2016. · Lund University student served as intern for the Swallows in Madurai



Michaela Nummenpää from the Welfare Policies and Management program at Lund University has completed an internship by the Lund based NGO The Swallows India Bangladesh, an internship being financed by Sida. The internship included two preparation courses at the Lund office as well as one course organised by Sida in Härnösand. Then the placement in India itself and after returning to Sweden "informationsarbete" will take place. This year The Swallows have sent 10 interns, placed in either India or Bangladesh. They have been staying for 4.5 months, from the beginning of September 2014 to middle of January 2015. Michaela worked at Evidence in Madurai. Evidence is a human rights and social justice organisation working with Dalit and Adivasi issues. The organisation works towards effective implementation of laws and policies to protect and promote Dalit and Adivasi rights, especially to eradicate discrimination and atrocities committed against them. During the internship she worked with two major tasks. First, conducting a small review of one of Evidence's Dalit programmes and secondly, been drafting a potential project proposal. It has been great to be able to work with these tasks and gain better knowledge of how such tasks should be carried

out. In addition to this, it has been great to work closely with Dalit issues, a topic that has has been interesting me for for a long time.

One year earlier, in he fall 2013, Michaela did field work in India, based at the Kerala-based Centre for Research and Education for Social Transformation (CREST) in Fall 2013. CREST is an autonomous institution under Government of Kerala, India. It has been conceived as a national institute of humanities, science and professional studies, addressing the needs of the Dalits, Adivasis and other marginalized communities of India while integrating with the informational society. • Copenhagen seminar on Amritsar Massacre and Colonial Violence in British India



The Centre of Global South Asian Studies at Department of Cross-Cultural and Regional Studies, University of Copenhagen, invites to a public lecture on "The Amritsar Massacre. Genealogy of Colonial Violence in British India" by Dr. Kim Wagner, Senior Lecturer in British Imperial

History, Department of History, Queen Mary University of London. on Wednesday 25 February 2015, 14.00–16.00. Venue: Faculty of Humanities, Karen Blixens Vej 4, Copenhagen. Registration is not required. All are welcome. Dr. Wagner completed a Ph.D. in South Asian



history at the University of Cambridge in 2003. His recent publications include *The Great Fear of 1857: Rumours, Conspiracies and the Making of the Indian Uprising* (2010) and '*Treading Upon Fires': The 'Mutiny'-Motif and Colonial Anxieties in British India', Past & Present* (2013). In his Copenhagen presentation he will focus on the assumtion that the Inter- and post-war period saw an intensification of colonial violence, as imperial powers sought to maintain control in the face of increasing opposition from anti-colonial nationalism and other global forces. The late colonial state, however, only appears to have assumed more repressive forms, with increasing recourse to indiscriminate violence, if one assumes a perspective restricted to the twentieth century. This paper seeks to recast the Amritsar Massacre, and the violence of decolonization more generally, within the longer history of colonial spectacles of

Kalpana Kochhar is currently a Deputy Director in the Asia and Pacific Department of the IMF. Between 2012 and 2014, she was Deputy Director in the Strategy, Policy and Review Department. Between 2010 and 2012, she was the Chief Economist for the South Asia Region of the World Bank. Dr. Kochhar's research interests and publications have mainly focused on studies of

emerging markets, jobs and growth including gender issues and structural reforms, and Asian economies, including major reports on jobs, inequality and regional integration in South Asia. She holds a PhD in Economics from Brown University, USA. More information.

The convener is Dr Manpreet K Janeja. The two keynote speakers are Professor Willem van Schendel, University of Amsterdam; and Dr Lotte Hoek, University of Edinburgh.

For example continuing contestations, debates, and re-interpretations of Bangladesh's Liberation War in 1971 and the International Crimes Tribunal (set up to investigate alleged War criminals) reveal the fraught histories, representations, and perceptions of Bengali and Bangladeshi nationalism and identity, generated from within Bangladesh and from Bangladeshi diaspora groups in London, Dubai or Lisbon in dialogue with various local, national, and transnational formations.







Linnaeus Palme collaboration grants to 30 South Asia related programmes

In early March 2015, the Swedish International Programme Office for Education and Training decided upon the fifteenth round of Linnaeus Palme Exchange Programme grants, for the period 1 July 2015 – 30 June 2016. A total amount of SEK 41.5 Million was distributed to 212 projects at Swedish universities. The grants are funded by the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida). Out of 212 projects given grants, 3 are with Bangladesh, 22 with India, 2 with Nepal, and 3 with Sri Lanka.

Among new projects could be mentioned three India projects from Linnaeus University in Växjö/Kalmar; with the Institute of Management and Entrepreneurship Development, Pune; the Indian Institute of Management (IIM) Lucknow; and Sankara Nethralaya Medical Research Foundation, Chennai. Lund Unversity has two new India projects, with University of Kerala; and Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai. Mälardalens Högskola has three new India projects, two with Bharati Vidyapeeth Deemed University in Pune; and one with Birla Institute of Technolog and Science in Pilani. Stockholm seminar on Nepal politics 10 years after civil war ended

The Forum for Asian Studies at Stockholm University organizes an open seminar entitled "Nepal today: viewed from within and from outside" on Wednesday 25 March 2015, 14.00–15.30. The speaker is Dr Katak Malla from the Faculty of Law, Stockholm University. Venue: F 479 (4th floor, F-building, Stockholm University, Frescati).

Nepal is described by some as a "hotbed of communist revolution; a paradigm of failed democracy; a case study in bungled Western intervention; and an environmental catastrophe." In this talk Dr. Katak Malla argues that the current situation is based on a power balance (some may say terror balance) between the main political forces of Nepal, i.e. the Army, the Congress, the Marxists-Leninists and the Maoists. From a political science perspective, it may be difficult to theorize the current trends and events of Nepali politics. Nearly a decade after the end of the Maoist insurgency and transformation of the monarchical system into a republic, Nepal's political leadership class is still engaged in drafting a new constitution. But who are the political elites in current Nepal? And who are the winners and losers in the post-conflict negotiations between the Maoists and non-Maoists, and between 'liberal democracy' and 'people's democracy'?
