

REFLECTIONS

Growing and pain seem to be powerful images in the Letter to the Romans. Being part of creation can be a painful process for so many, especially, you may reflect, at the moment or in the last few months. Also, on another level, all of us, when we are aware of our own imperfections, know that admitting mistakes can be a difficult, painful mental process and saying sorry meaningfully can be a very humbling experience. But how often do we easily say the words of confession when we are in church without too much thought?

The Epistle also today, when talking about faith, talks to us about children, about growing up. As Christians, we endeavour to follow the life of Jesus by learning the lessons, teachings and examples given to us in the Gospels. We would like to be faithful 'plants' but often we are more like 'weeds'?

I have often reflected that, if we endeavour to match ourselves against the full maturity of Christ, we would perhaps, at best, be seen as adolescents with all the ups and downs associated with that stage of human development.

I may have used this example before but there is no harm in certain repetitions; there is a lovely twist on a well known saying that **'if at first you don't succeed, what a normal life you lead'**. That is our predicament as humans and, while thinking of quotes, Victor Hugo, the writer of Les Misérables, wrote **'the word God has written on the brow of everyone is hope'**.

So, as we read, reflect and hopefully learn the lessons we have in the Epistle and Gospel, we realise that these words are as fresh today as they were in the beginning and we have the mystery of a hope we cannot see, and yet we, through faith, are given ears to help us understand.

Collect

Merciful God, you have prepared for those who love you such good things as pass our understanding: pour into our hearts such love toward you that we, loving you in all things and above all things, may obtain your promises, which exceed all that we can desire; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading: *Romans 8.12-25*

Brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh - for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, 'Abba! Father!' it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ - if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labour pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Gospel: *Matthew 13.24-30, 36-43*

Jesus put before the crowd another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain then the weeds appeared as well. And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, "Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?" He answered, "An enemy has done this." The slaves said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?" But he replied, "No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'" Then Jesus left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, 'Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field.' He answered, 'The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!'

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends

As we read these words from the Letter to the Romans and then the words given to us by Matthew's Gospel, we have to do our best to put our minds back to the world from which they came. To put it graphically, the Resurrection experience for the disciples must have been, to put it mildly, a world turning upside down experience that literally 'launched' them out into their dangerous world, both frightened and invigorated by the experience they had had. We are people of faith and we are distanced from what happened then, but we can still, of course, read and read between the lines of what was happening.

Paul, living and working in a tense, dangerous world, under the domination of a foreign power and preaching his faith in the one God, so often in a polytheistic part of society, knew of the dangers.

Jesus' messages, parables and way of life were opening people's eyes and ears to new possibilities, new horizons of understanding, even to the point of God being spoken of as ABBA, father. After the first Easter, with all that had gone before for his followers, and there were of course, as we know, many more than that inner circle, the pennies - so to speak - started dropping!

Choices had to be made. In the world of faith, weeds had to become plants; children of faith had to grow into adults. Let's be honest then, in so many ways little has changed in the few years history-wise since the days we celebrate every time we gather for worship.

'If at first we don't succeed, try, try again.'

St James, Swards End will be open for private prayer on **Sunday 26th July 2.30-4pm.**

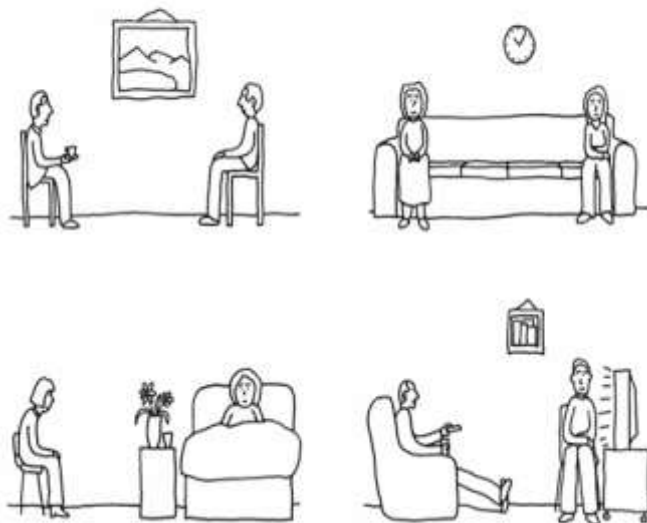
