REFLECTIONS

Many years ago I had a job which involved working in schools when I had to interview parents. The parent I dreaded was the "Pushy" mother. The Canaanite woman our Lord encountered in today's Gospel was persistent if not "pushy". It wasn't that she was a woman that was the problem it was that this anonymous woman was a Syrophoenician and wasn't one of them. And she was persistent. "Do something about this woman - she is driving us mad" pleaded the disciples.

I hope that you can admire her persistence. She was like the woman with the 12 year history of Haemorrhaging who pushed through the crowd to touch the hem of Jesus' robes, believing that she would be healed if she did so. This woman does much the same thing. She spars with Jesus until he can no longer ignore her desire that her daughter be healed whatever demon has gripped her. The woman recognised Jesus' connectedness to the glory of God in heaven and it resonated with her. With so strong a faith, it was all she could do but to come to Jesus for the sake of her daughter's wellbeing. She understood that through Jesus her daughter could be healed and whole again

There are certain things about this woman we must note. First and foremost she had love - she made the misery of her child her own. Second this woman had faith that grew in contact with Jesus. Jesus, as it were compelled her to look at him and in him she saw something that was not expressible in earthly terms but was nothing less than divine. We can see this woman's faith growing as she is confronted by Christ. It was a faith which worshipped. She began by following and ended on her knees. She began with a request; she ended with a prayer. This woman had the gift of cheerfulness. She was in the midst of trouble yet she could smile.

This woman brought to Christ a gallant and audacious love, a faith which grew until it worshipped at the feet of the divine, an indomitable persistence, springing from an unconquerable hope, a cheerfulness which would not be dismayed. That is an approach which cannot help finding an answer to its prayers.

Collect

Let your merciful ears, O Lord, be open to the prayers of your humble servants; and that they may obtain their petitions make them to ask such things as shall please you; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: Romans 11.1-2a, 29-32

I ask, then, has God rejected his people? By no means! I myself am an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin. God has not rejected his people whom he foreknew. For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may now receive mercy. For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all.

Gospel: Matthew 15.21-28

Jesus went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. A Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, 'Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon.' But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, 'Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us.' He answered, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.' But she came and knelt before him, saying, 'Lord, help me.' He answered, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' She said, 'Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table.' Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish.' And her daughter was healed instantly.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends

One of the changes that have been necessary in our "Zoom" services is the way we share the peace. It is usually by means of "an on screen" wave or smile. For some this lack of actual contact is a cause for sadness, for others I am told, it's a relief

There are references to the "Holy Kiss" in several Pauline letters. The exhortation to share the kiss without any further explanation indicates that this was widely practised among first century Christians. It is a sign of love and unity and remained part of the liturgy in the East but was lost in the West until revived in modern liturgies. So it is not some newfangled idea, Indeed Thomas Cranmer envisaged it in the sixteenth century when he intended communicants to "draw near" not just spiritually but quite literally.

The Eucharist is a celebration and in our day has included a greater sense of fellowship. However, fellowship is often seen as something that happens after the service (over coffee for example) but fellowship proper is in the service, around the table and what happens after is a natural extension of it. That is why it is so good that our clergy "go round the screen" after a Zoom service to extend that fellowship.

In some churches there is an undue emphasis on the Peace and inappropriate bonhomie at that point in the service. But the restoration of both the words and gesture of the peace is one of the great gains of liturgical renewal and although some people do not like it, it is now rightly established as an integral part of the liturgy.

The idea of the church, including its local expression, as a "sacred and wonderful mystery", bringing to the kiss of peace a reverence and awe that is quite different from back slapping bonhomie, needs to be understood if this attractive and powerful symbol is to retain its effectiveness.
