

REFLECTIONS

One of my favourite Collects today! A timely reminder to all of us of the gift and the value of God's Word in these testing times. For our loving Father delights to speak to us through the Holy Scriptures penned by about forty writers but all inspired and led by the Holy Spirit of God. And it is the same Holy Spirit who promises to 'help us to hear them, to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them.'

I sometimes ask myself how far do I go in this process? Yes I hear them, yes I read them, but to get value from these words, do I mark or note carefully what is being said, do I give myself time to learn the meaning of these words, and then do I really inwardly digest them?

The parable of the sower continues to speak to us doesn't it? How grateful we are that the seed is sown as we hear or read God's Word, but the challenge then is what is our response? It can be so easy to allow these words to go in one ear and out of the other, so to speak. Half an hour after a service or a time reading the Bible, how much have we taken in? And who among us is not guilty of allowing the 'cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches' to choke the Word. But let's be positive, let us pray this prayer every day this week and determine to find a space even for a few unhurried minutes to hear or read the Bible, to jot down the main point, and then to seek to find a way to put what we have learned into practice. How grateful we are that there are many aids these days to help us read the Bible every day [Bible Reading Fellowship, Scripture Union etc..] and we could do worse than take the two readings on the Grapevine and read and re read them alternatively during the coming week, jotting down what strikes us. It could give us half a dozen things to think about and to try to apply to our daily lives. May God's word be a real source of comfort and encouragement to us in this coming week.

The Grapevine

Collect

Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: help us so to hear them, to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them that, through patience, and the comfort of your holy word, we may embrace and for ever hold fast the hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: 1 Thessalonians 2.1-8

You yourselves know, brothers and sisters, that our coming to you was not in vain, but though we had already suffered and been shamefully mistreated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in spite of great opposition. For our appeal does not spring from deceit or impure motives or trickery, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the message of the gospel, even so we speak, not to please mortals, but to please God who tests our hearts. As you know and as God is our witness, we never came with words of flattery or with a pretext for greed; nor did we seek praise from mortals, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. But we were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children. So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.

Gospel: Matthew 22.34-46

When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.' Now while the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus asked them this question: 'What do you think of the Messiah? Whose son is he?' They said to him, 'The son of David.' He said to them, 'How is it then that David by the Spirit calls him Lord, saying, "The Lord said to my Lord, 'Sit at my right hand, until I put your enemies under your feet'"? If David thus calls him Lord, how can he be his son?' No one was able to give him an answer, nor from that day did anyone dare to ask him any more questions.

Post Communion

God of all grace, your Son Jesus Christ fed the hungry with the bread of his life and the word of his kingdom: renew your people with your heavenly grace, and in all our weakness sustain us by your true and living bread; who is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

As we approach the coming of winter, one senses that this could be quite a testing one for all of us. There is the prospect of a further lockdown and restriction of movement, this affects all of us in one way or another. I used to be a vicar in Islington where there are several high rise blocks of flats and one dreads to think what it must be like for parents with young children several floors up. We are, by comparison, fortunate to live in a part of the country where it is relatively easy to keep social distance and enjoy some freedom of movement. However, I am conscious that there are a number of people in our parishes who live alone, and who find the long hours of winter something rather daunting. The Government and political leaders are rightly concerned about the financial implications of lockdown, how we need to continue to pray that they may seek and find wisdom to seek the welfare of all people. It has been so moving to see how many have responded in our communities to provide services for the vulnerable in so many ways. I have been impressed by those who try to keep their eyes and ears open for those around them who are lonely, and who keep in touch on the telephone, or when the weather permits with a visit in a garden. Perhaps one of the greatest gifts we can offer is time for each other. Families and friends who have access to Zoom are grateful that this facility is available these days. Even a letter or a card can help to alleviate loneliness and a sense of isolation. I know someone who keeps a monthly prayer calendar with names of friends, family and others for they are concerned. And when they pray they consider whether it would be appropriate to make contact. At the end of our reading from 1 Thessalonians today, St Paul says, 'so deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the Gospel of God, but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.' These challenging days provide us with opportunities to continue to care and share with those who are very dear to us. It's not in the Bible but I've heard it somewhere....'every little helps' !!
