REFLECTIONS

When I first started work, training to be a marine underwriter at Lloyd's of London, I began to attend lunch time services at a well-known City of London church. I was soon "cornered" and taken to a church weekend at a Cambridge college and was required to stand up in front of 100 people whom I did not know to make a declaration of faith. I was urged to do the same in various ways at my place of work. It nearly drove me away from the Christian faith. By contrast, Mark, in his Gospel passage appointed for today makes much of what biblical scholars call the "Messianic Secret". This is the way in which Jesus conceals his divinity during his ministry of teaching and healing.

Those who are healed are often told not to speak about it though they usually disobey the command. All the three Gospels that tell of the Transfiguration report that the disciples said nothing about the amazing sight which they had just witnessed. There is, in many of us, an inherent reserve of speaking about our faith. This does not contradict the duty of mission, of working to bring others to Christ, but is a warning against speaking without consideration. A brash approach, demanding to know whether a person is "saved", has often done more harm and closed the ears to the good news of salvation. The Gospel is of course for all but it is received individually.

Temperament and circumstance combine to make the best opportunity. Holy wisdom should teach us when to speak and when to be silent - tact is a Christian virtue. It is the message of a loving, caring response without pious words that often prepares for the word to be spoken, as I found at the end of my secular career when I wore my clerical collar in the money markets of the City of London.

Collect

Almighty Father, whose Son was revealed in majesty before he suffered death upon the cross: give us grace to perceive his glory, that we may be strengthened to suffer with him and be changed into his likeness, from glory to glory; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: 2 Corinthians 4. 3-6

Even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. For it is the God who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

Gospel: Mark 9. 2-9

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!' Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them anymore, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

In the liturgical calendar the 14th of February is shown as "The Sunday Next Before Lent" and in the list of "Lesser Festivals" under the same date we also see "St Valentine, Martyr at Rome Circa 269". It is of course Valentine's Day that is widely marked in the secular world.

I know little or nothing about St Valentine so I looked him up in "Butler's Lives of the Saints", here we read that despite his popularity virtually nothing is known of the historical Valentine. For a long time there were apparently two, one a martyr at Rome, the second a bishop and martyr at Terni, north of Rome.

There are various possibilities connecting the feast day with lovers and one of these is that it could have been a Christian takeover of the Roman feast of Lupercalia. The massive card and flower industry of today may seem to have been with us forever but according to "Butler's Lives" it is a recent innovation. "Perhaps-dare one say? - its revival is more commercial than devotional and the Roman Lupercalia may have regained lost ground!"

The Greeks had several words for love which include Phileo affection for friends, Stergo - family affection, eros - sexual love, and agape which we may translate as "God's love to men". In Latin the word is "caritas".

In Christian thought, Agape is the essential quality underlying God's actions and our response to them. It is distinguished from dutiful affection and passionate emotion and is seen more as a matter of will than of emotions. It is selflessness from which the element of sacrifice is never far removed. For Christ, love was the basis of his commandments - love God, love your neighbour. In the early church there was often a common religious meal which was held either before or after the Eucharist (with which it should not be confused). Many of us, of course, have enjoyed Christian fellowship over an agape supper.

St Valentine's Day reminds us that the human heart was made for love. Our love of Christ transforms what we love and the way we love. When we live by faith it blesses us with the Gospel realism that we need to embrace Jesus Christ as our only Master and his cross as our true home.
