IDEP 2022

Amid a crisis amplified by soaring cost-of-living prices, it is time for action.

Enough is not enough, the slogan of recent protests and on this International Day to End Poverty focused on dignity APLE Collective are reinforcing the need to address poverty with lived experience. Without the expertise of lived experience poverty will never be solved.

The 17th of October is especially significant for the APLE Collective because it emphasises the importance of understanding the perspectives of those who have lived through adversity in order to develop effective social change.

The International Day to End Poverty was first intended to honour victims of poverty. This monumental day should be used to reflect on the causes of poverty and what may be done to address them.

The APLE collective, a collective of organisations and individuals committed to addressing poverty through lived experience, is concerned that people experiencing poverty will be pushed further into digital exclusion and isolation because unavoidable spending on energy and food will take up the lion's share of their budget.

The APLE Collective is worried that because of rising food and energy prices, those who already live in poverty will be digitally disenfranchised. We require a system that helps struggling families and fosters opportunity further.

Low and no income households need support now, the government must do what's right so that families can whether the cost of living storm and remain digitally included.

The government can choose to support people's digital inclusion in society so that no one is left behind.

POVERTY STRATEGY COMMISSION- APLE COLLECTIVE

Thursday 13th October we held an online one Hour Workshop followed by Q&A Conversation. The meeting welcomed the APLE Collective as we introduced ourself and our aims & values.

Topics included what does addressing poverty with Lived Experience mean? Taking Voice Seriously: For Change Making, Taking Voice Seriously: As an Epistemic Necessity and Taking Voice Seriously: As a Collective Action.

We also looked at how to work in creative and participatory ways to listen to the voice of lived experience. APLE Collective members with lived experience of poverty shared approaches to lived expertise that they find valuable.

This was a well attended event with a range of stakeholders, we are looking forward to progressing this work further.
