

# Borama's Historical Impact on Somaliland Statehood and Peace

## 1. The Borama Conference of 1993

### Context and Significance

- **Post-Civil War Scenario:** The Borama Conference was convened in May 1993 against the backdrop of a devastating civil war in Somalia that led to the collapse of the central government. This conference aimed to stabilize Somaliland, which had declared its independence in 1991.

## 2. Dahir Riyale Kahin: Third President of Somaliland
