Barmston Cricket Club's inaugural game against Bridlington, a two innings match which took place in 1863 and produced a quite remarkable scorecard.

Batting first, Barmston could only make 16 runs.

In reply, Bridlington made 92, amassing a lead of 76 runs, which proved a mountain for Barmston to climb.

The batsman fared worse than in the first innings only managing to score 11 on this occasion, ensuring Barmston fell to an innings and 65 run defeat.

THE VILLAGE POND

The Village Pond was maintained by the Women's Institute for 28 years as their project to mark their 21st birthday in 1974. However in 1998 they decided to give up their lease due to the costs involved. The Glendon Estate did not want the responsibility of the upkeep and insurance of the pond so they said it could be filled in or left to go wild, and they left it to the farmer, Martin Warkup, to decide what would happen to it.

Martin Warkup and Martin Wastling gathered a group of volunteers to ensure that the pond was saved for the use of the villagers. This band of volunteers emptied and cleaned the pond, bought the life belt and resurfaced the path and pond edges via donations. However the cost of the public liability insurance was beyond their means. Martin Wastling as a Parish Councillor asked if the Parish Council would consider adding the village pond to their insurance. The P C agreed to this and the insurance company saw no problem except that in the event of a claim some sort of paperwork would be necessary. All parties agreed that a 30 year licence would be in order and the P C agreed to pay for the legal costs.

On September 14th 1969 the licence was signed for the term of 30 years at the nominal cost of £10 per annum and the rest of the restoration on the pond was finished. Martin Wastling on leaving the village, donated the Barmston 2000 weather vane, that he had made, to be erected by the pond.

Just a bit of history, the village pond is marked on a map dated 1756 and the 1854 6" map shows that the village stocks were sited next to the pond, opposite to the local inn.

From the vicar, Richard Hare

I've worn a hearing aid for a few years now. You can pray in the garden, on a walk, or at home; standing, sitting or on your knees – it's communicating one-to-one with the Almighty that matters. Why not give it a go this month – and do let me know how you get on!
