# **Living Stones**

This is my final contribution to Village Voice before I hand back the responsibility to Rev'd Richard Hare, who returns from his three month study leave at the end of August. During this time, I have also been writing my dissertation, and my experiences at Barmston have been quite inspirational to me, so I thought I'd share with you my conclusion...

Every other Sunday morning, I open the iron gate of All Saints Church and make my way up the gravel path, prayer book and stole in hand. I pass the headstones of those who have journeyed through life before me. Some are neatly tended with fresh flowers, others long since forgotten, a footnote in time. Reaching the brow of the slope, as the path turns towards the church door, I can't help but take in the view. All Saints is one of those quaint rural churches that is seemingly in the middle of nowhere, serving the coastal village of Barmston, but physically on the edge of the village. So the view before me is one of open fields, trees and hedges, dissected by the stunning East Yorkshire skies. The fields are full of curious cattle who always come to the church wall to take a look whenever someone approaches their patch. In full voice, their lowing provides an accompaniment to each service, sometimes to the point where the congregants struggle to hear. I approach the porch as a swallow swoops in and swiftly back out again. Just inside the stone arch, I see the nest and the gaping mouths of the hungry chicks, their shrill cries competing for every morsel of food. I stand on the threshold of this ancient church building and I am surrounded by the presence of God.

As I unlock the padlock, I remind myself of Thomas Cranmer's journey through the liturgy. With the words of the Lord's Prayer in my head and on my heart, I draw back the mesh gate, designed to prevent the swallows from entering, not always successfully. I turn the handle of the old oak door and put my weight against it. It almost feels as if a confluence is taking place as God's presence both rushes in and out, like an ebbing and flowing tide. I journey into the nave, looking to the heavens, but only to check that no swallows or other birds have found their way in. I pause at the font, and look towards the sanctuary. The rising sun floods through the window, bathing the cool stones in a kaleidoscope of colour. In the silence of the space, my faith is renewed as the natural and physical worlds combine with a tangible sense of God's presence. I stride up the aisle, under the rood screen and up the step. The stalls of the choir, whose voices are no longer heard, enclose me as I make my way to the sanctuary. I pause again and focus on the brass cross standing on the altar. I silently remember Christ's sacrifice, making my own confession, and I offer my thanks.

Earlier this year, I unwittingly made the headlines. I tweeted a photo of an empty All Saints Church with the caption 'The table was set, but nobody turned up.' The Page 5
