From the vicar, Richard Hare

I'm enjoying the new series of The Apprentice on BBC1 – do you watch it? You'd be forgiven for dismissing it as a waste of time. 18 young and sharply dressed candidates make extravagantly boastful claims about their business prowess while competing to gain a £250,000 investment from the entrepreneur Lord Sugar. When we meet them in the first episode none of them seems very likeable. There are ridiculous squabbles, they won't listen to each other, and they are quick to pass blame onto someone else.



But over the weeks we see them change. One by one they face the pointed finger of judgement and the dreaded words, "You're fired." Slowly we watch the ones who remain mature, learn to work as a team and to make the most of each other's strengths. When we reach the final episode the two remaining contestants get to bring back some of their former rivals, who are now working as hard as they can for their woman or man to succeed

When Jesus picked his team of twelve he chose a similarly disparate pack of unimpressive people, with competing agendas, big egos and a breath-taking lack of understanding. VALENTINES DAY, 14th FEBRUARY

We all know nowadays that the 14th February means cards, supposedly sent anonymously, to our loved ones and those we would like to become our loved ones! Florists, gift shops, jewellers, etc also benefit from the pressure on us all at this time, However, do you know why we celebrate this day?

The true origin of the holiday is vague at best but the most widely believed version of its origin dates back to the Roman festival of Lupercalia which took place in mid-February. It celebrated the start of Spring and included certain fertility rites. By the end of the 5th century, Pope Gelasius had forbidden this pagan festival and it is thought that it was then replaced with St Valentine's Day.

There were a number of Christian martyrs with the name Valentine and the most likely one the festival is named after is that of a priest who was martyred by the emperor Claudius 11 Gothicus in about 270AD (or in modern parliance "CE"). Other versions refer to him being a bishop named St. Valentine of Terni who allegedly married couples in secret to ensure the husbands did not have to go to war. Another reason the feast is associated with love. It is thought possible that these two Valentines were actually one and the same person.

Formal messages, or valentines, appeared in the 1500s, and by the late 1700s commercially printed cards were being used. Valentines commonly depict Cupid, the Roman god of love, along with hearts, traditionally the seat of emotion.

The day is popular in Britain, the United States, Canada, and Australia, and it is also celebrated in other countries, Argentina, France, Mexico and South Korea. In the Philippines it is often a day of mass weddings of hundreds of couples.

So, when you are grumbling about the price of the obligatory red rose for your loved ones, spare a thought for the martyrs whose commemorative day this is and don't forget to get him/her that card – it will all help to get through the last days of winter in harmony with our loved ones as we look forward to the start of spring!!!

HISTORY PAGE

Schools and education - part 1

There are still residents of the parish who attended the last school in our immediate area, Lissett Church of England School. Les Wiles remembers having to walk to and from Barmston to Lissett school before any buses were running along the route and John Swift recalls that a few years later the bus fare was 2d each way (less than 1p in today's money) but as he grew older, if the weather was dry, he would be allowed to cycle each way. But first, we can look at the early schools in our area.

EARLY SCHOOLS

The first record of a school in Barmston was in 1726, It was situated on Sands Lane next to the Almshouses and also provided a house for the school master. Sir Griffith Boynton Bt.'s will left a stipend of £5 to be charged on his manor of Haisthorpe, These funds for a master or mistress of the school were to enable children in Barmston to be taught reading and the catechism free of charge. The maintenance of the house was also charged on Haisthrorpe.

By 1743, 20 children were being taught in the school but in 1764 it would appear to have been closed.

Sometime in the 1760's a private boarding school for boys was opened but no further information is known about this school.

In 1818 a new school was built by Sir Francis Boynton, Bt. It appears that this school was supported by the Boynton family, the rector and parents. At this time, children from Ulrome also were permitted to attend the school.

In 1833, a total of 30 boys and girls were being educated here but by 1871 the numbers had dropped to 18 and the school was finally closed in 1885. It was demolished around 1947 and the site used for housing.

LISSETT CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL – EARLY YEARS

Lissett Church of England Primary School opened in 1881. It was built in that year by the "National Society for Promoting the Education of the Poor in the Principles of the Established Church throughout England & Wales".

Catchment area of about 4 square miles included Lissett, Gransmoor, Barmston and a number of outlying farmsteads. With the closure of the Barmston school in 1885, the remaining pupils were transferred to Lissett school.

Headship of Regina Chant 1892 to 1922

Miss Chant held office from the 29th February 1892 to 22nd February 1922. During the eleven years prior to Regina's arrival, the total admissions to the school stood at 150 and by the time she left, this figure had risen to 523.

In 1901, Major Dent, a local landlord, built a new classroom for the infants. This enabled the two original classrooms to be converted into one large room. It did, or course mean that part of the original playground was then taken up with the new classroom.

By 1897, the school's report showed that "class subjects" had been introduced into the curriculum. However, the report showed that Miss Chant was not considered an excellent teacher as the higher grant given for the inclusion of these subjects was only "recommended with hesitation". The inspectors were not happy that the "quick children were permitted to answer the questions meant for the others". This report also demonstrated that it was also considered part of the school's role to discipline the children to an extreme degree. In 1904 it was recorded that J.A. and F.W. received their "merited punishment" for being absent for three days killing mice.

By the turn of the century the school had assumed the role of caring for the health of the children to some degree with visits from doctors recorded in the school logs. Outside of school activities had also commenced with a day's visit to Gransmoor Lodge for tea and games on the lawn on the 2nd August 1901.
