Thank you to everyone who supported the Spring craft fair on Saturday 18th March at Emmanuel church. A total of £185 was raised for All Saints church, Barmston.



Coastal Erosion

As reported in last month's issue, Barmston has lost 59 meters of land to coastal erosion since the start of the 21st century.

Barmston was recorded in The Doomsday Book when it was completed around 1086 and by the 12th century a hamlet of Hartburn had been established in the north east corner of Barmston next to Earls Dyke. By the 15th century, the hamlet was deserted and had disappeared under the sea – the first assumed effect of coastal erosion for residents of our parish.

The next recorded measured effect stated that between the mid 18th and mid 19th centuries, erosion took place at the rate of approximately 1 yard (0.9144 meters) per year.

Located at the original mouth of Barmston Main Drain, a life-boatman's house and lifeboat station, was built and later closed in the 19th century. Some sources state that this was partly due to coastal erosion.

1953 The Great East Coast Floods caused major damage to the sea front properties and a great deal of the cliff was eroded overnight. A local resident recalls how his father went to help his brother move furniture into the back of the house only to find themselves engulfed in water, mud and sand as a huge wave smashed into the bungalow and almost sucked them out as the wave subsided. These floods caused further erosion to the cliffs but there was still some 15ft of gardens left in front of the bungalows. Some residents tried building walls, etc to



try to stop further erosion but as we now know, without success.

In 1956, the Ordnance Survey Map shows the coastline around Barmston considerably further out into the North Sea than it had become by 2017. The yellow line on the map indicates the approximate coastline in 2017. During this period, many cliff top structures disappeared. In October of 1967, 35ft waves caused major erosion to the cliff top again and several bungalows collapsed as a result.

Erosion continued at a rate of 4yds (3.66 meters) per year and the gardens of the remaining bungalows gradually disappeared leaving the properties precariously close to the cliff top. In 1967 this bungalow finally started to fall over the cliff top.





A programme to demolish the remaining bungalows was embarked on and by 1973 the final bungalow had to be pulled down as it teetered on the edge of the cliff.

In 1978, the concrete blocks that had been erected during the 2nd World War as part of our coastal defences were re-positioned at the bottom of the

cliff at the end of Sands Lane. This caused local farmers to complain that much land was lost by this action.



Barmston Main Drain's concrete rectangular outlet tunnel was built in the early 1980's and an

area of large boulders placed at the land's edge to prevent ingress from high seas.

By 2018, much more erosion had taken place and the sea had swept round behind the 1978 defences isolating them on the beach.

The café, games arcade, etc which were once part of the entertainment to be had near the cliff top are now sadly just memories for some of the lifelong residents



of Barmston and the many folk who used to come and spend their holidays in some of the bungalows along the cliff top at the end of Sands Lane.
