Holderness Area Rural Transport started by Jane Evison, was officially launched in 2003.

The successful conversion of Jane Evison's vision into reality was enabled by her drive and hard work. Supported by a team of equally hard working representatives from some parish councils and the ERYC, an application for grant

funding was submitted to a government agency called The Countryside Agency. The application was successful and so the first vehicle was purchased and a part time driver was employed.

That first bus provided a Medibus service for Hornsea and surrounding villages. The service was so popular that it quickly grew & today H.A.R.T. comprises 11 vehicles, including an electric bus & an electric car. Last year it provided nearly 50,000 passenger journeys.

Jane said "as passenger needs change H.A.R.T. adapts as much as possible to deliver the service you ask for. There is never enough money & there are never enough vehicles or volunteers to do everything we want to at H.A.R.T. But we believe we are doing the best job we can with the resources we have.

Our ambition is to share the benefits that the H.A.R.T. service provides with more people; we want to give people with transport needs their independence back and the opportunity to do more community-based activities. But we need more volunteer drivers to help us offer this lifeline" Depending on the services volunteered for, requirements are a full UK driving Licence, a D1 entitlement on your driving licence or a PCV licence is a necessity.

HISTORY PAGE

FRAISTHORPE CHURCH



The chapel in Fraithorpe was originally built in the 12th (1100's) and 13th (1200's) centuries and dedicated to St Edmund. Edmund was King of East Anglia from about 855 until his death in 869 at the hands of the Viking Invaders. Included in the construction of the walls were glacial sea cobble-stones.

Not a lot of the history of the chapel is known but the size of the community in those days is reflected in the small chapel built on what could possibly be a man made mound.

Little remains from those early days. The pre-reformation altar stone was set in the floor beneath the wooden altar; the lower sections of walls are medieval (1066-1485) or possibly even Norman (1066-1154); the font also dates back to the Norman period.

In 1307, a dispute as to how the offerings made to an image of St Mary in Fraisthorpe Chapel should be used is recorded in the records of St Mary's Priory in Bridlington although no reference to the outcome of the dispute has been found!

In 1720-21 the chancel (the part of the church near the altar) was replaced.

In 1856, Mary Emily Simpson, the daughter of the then vicar of Boynton and Carnaby with Fraisthorpe, commenced to work with the farm servants in the parish. Her work was detailed in a book she wrote entitled "Ploughing and Sowing". In this book she described the plight of these labourers as follows: " I believe few of the better educated would believe, without an actual knowledge of the facts, how nearly approaching to heathenism is the state of at least nine-tenths of the 'farming lads' of this part of Yorkshire. Not only do they live entirely without prayer, or any kind of worship, but most of them are in actual ignorance of the first principles of Christianity, and totally unacquainted with even the outlines of the Old and New Testament History"

She worked tirelessly to educate and generally improve their lives and so in 1889, five years after her death, moves were set in place to create a memorial to her backed by many eminent bishops including those of Lincoln and London. After much discussion, it was decided that Mary Simpson would not have approved of any form of ornament and so it was agreed that the best memorial would be to restore the chapel in Fraisthorpe. Her sister wrote at the time "....a work my sister would have rejoiced in, and entirely approved of".

Architects Smith & Broderick of Hull's estimate for the work to restore and furnish the Chapel was £350 and so fundraising followed on apace with generous donations being given by notables from the fields of government, church, business and gentry across England, such was the respect gained by Mary Emily Simpson for the work she had carried out so diligently in her lifetime. Locally, those for whom Mary had worked donated items of work that were sold at a Sale of Work in the Summer of 1893.

In 1892, work commenced and by 1893, the work was complete and the Chapel looked much as it did in recent time. On the 16th October 1892 a Harvest Festival service took place and on the first Sunday in January, regular worship was once again restored with a monthly service being held at 3pm.



Archaeologically, the site could be of interest having been the site of a church dating back so far. Within half a mile of the chapel, iron age barrows exist and evidence of the Roman occupation have also been found.

In 2008, in excess of £35,000 was spent on replacing the roof but by 2019, the regular worshippers from the village having dwindled to one, the chapel closed for worship and planning permission was granted to convert it into a holiday cottage. Thus ended over 900 years of worship on the site.
