BARMSTON AREA HOME GUARD 1940-1945



This month, we continue to hear more of Jack Swift's memories of his time as Commander of the Barmston Area Home Guard. The 50 odd men of the platoon continued to protect our shores from the possibility of an invasion throughout the

Christmas periods.

Part 2

The Home Guard fully expected an invasion at any time during 1940 and 1941. A map was captured in Rotterdam by the British Secret Service which showed a landing on the low ground between Barmston and Fraisthorpe. The German idea was to make their way overland to Hessle, thereby cutting off the port of Hull so that they could then bring in their heavy equipment and troops through Hull docks.

There were several false invasion alarms – each day the Barmston Area Home Guard's Commander was given a code word which, if he received it again at any time during that day meant invasion. One very stormy night when the code word for that day was 'Cromwell' a dispatch rider arrived at a road block that Jack was manning at about 2am and gave an envelope to him which contained the word 'Cromwell'. The members of the Home Guard Platoon, apart from doing their normal daily jobs were on duty all night for one night in three. When Jack received the code word he ordered a full stand-to in the defense positions. At about 4am the Commanding Officer for the Bridlington area came along and reported that they had received information that the Germans had landed at West Hartlepool and if they were found to be moving South the Barmston Area Home Guard would receive reinforcements of approximately twenty regular soldiers. However, some time before this, Jack had been called into Bridlington along with other local Home Guard commanders to be told by a General that there was only one mobile armoured division in the north of England based at Catterick. This division would not be able to support the Home Guard however far the Germans penetrated inland until the Home Guard halted their advance. The General would then be prepared to attack with this division – he explained that as this was the only division available it had to do its job – if it failed to do so then that would have been that as Jack said!

Returning to the night of the invasion warning, nothing further happened and the men were stood down next morning. It was, in fact, never found out what had happened that night. There were reports of bodies floating in the sea but this was not confirmed.

This part of Yorkshire suffered from a number of air raids. At one point it was bombed every night for three weeks. Although throughout the war Flamborough lighthouse was flashing on reduced power, the German bombers still found it a very good navigational guide as they came over the North Sea especially to bomb Hull and other Yorkshire towns and cities. One night the Barmston Area Home Guard were able to watch a German Squadron Leader with a Junker 88 leading German bombers from Flamborough to their targets in Hull then coming back and leading another group. This went on all night. This area was sometimes defended against air attack by anti-aircraft guns and sometimes by fighters but never both at the same time. The British were very short of fighters at this time and there were periods when it was virtually impossible to mount any effective defense from the air – in fact sometimes the German aircraft would come over in daylight.

There is one more incident which should be remarked on. This was very early in the war on a beautiful moonlight night when the sea was like silver. A Junkers 88 came in from the sea, dropped a row of fire bombs across the main road near Fraisthorpe. These were supposedly the first bombs to be dropped on the main land of Britain during the 2nd World War

The Home Guard were stood down in 1944 when there was no longer any threat of invasion and they were completely disbanded in 1945.
