You will have seen in last month's issue that Mr Edgar Styan celebrated his 104 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ birthday on the $7^{\text {th }}$ December. His daughter, Lynda, kindly sent the following brief biography about Edgar to share with all our readers:
"He retired in 1982 from being the financial controller of a large group of companies. In the sixties his work took the family to live in Northern Ireland for several years and they experienced "the troubles" firsthand. When the factory was blown up by the IRA they moved back to England in 1971. He and his late wife, Margaret, have always liked the East Coast and they had a caravan near Sewerby in the early 1960's. They chose to come and live in Barmston in 1983 for their retirement.
He is now pretty much housebound and we use a wheelchair if we take him out as he has mobility issues, COPD, and his vision is very limited due to macular degeneration.
Apart from that his mind is still very alert and he keeps up to date with current affairs. He never misses Prime Minister's Question Time on TV and watches lots of quiz programmes. He says he is still learning even at 104! As a WW 2 veteran, he had a birthday visit from three Veteran Royal Engineers. He had an enjoyable morning chatting with them and sharing some of his war time experiences. In his younger days he liked going sea fishing in cobbles from Bridlington harbour and used to bring home huge amounts of fish.
 He used to be both secretary and treasurer of Flamborough Victoria Working Men's Club and he and his late wife spent many happy years helping to organise events there. The club put on his 100th birthday celebration, and he still enjoys occasional visits from a few of the members.

He is a real animal lover and has always had at least one dog, although at one time they had four - a Yorkshire Terrier, a rescued Greyhound, a Border Collie and an Alsatian cross. He also had a big ginger cat called Sandy whose mother was a feral cat that they adopted.

## NEW YEAR RESOLUTIONS

The tradition of making new year's resolutions has been traced back by our illustrious historians to the Babylonians some 4000 years ago. During a 12 day festival, the Babylonians confirmed their allegiance to the reigning monarch or crowned a new king.
