
Let us hope that, through the support of all residents, Paula can once again return the Black Bull to a place that all locals can enjoy.

The sale of the old almshouses in Barmston in the 1950s produced a capital sum which, invested in stocks and shares, produces an income of about £500 a year, which is to help people suffering financial hardship in the Barmston area. Traditionally grants have been made to about five people every Christmas, but the pandemic and the illness of the few remaining Trustees has halted this for a while. The Trustees have now decided to hand the responsibility to local charity 'Community VISION' (formerly ERVAS), who will be making the grants for us. There is a simple application form for anyone to use, and gifts are no longer limited to Christmastime. Please don't be shy in asking for a grant – the money was left to help you and cannot be used for any other purpose. Details in the box below.




Boynton Almshouses Fund For Individuals

Page 5 HISTORY PAGE FEBRUARY FESTIVAL DAYS

There are a number of days during February that historically are celebrated for various reasons. Let's hope that you will enjoy celebrating at least one of the days.

2nd February Today, Christians around the world celebrate the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple. In the past, mothers went to church 40 days after giving birth for purification. This tradition has largely died out. The day is also known as Candlemas when candles are blessed in church.

13th February Shrove Tuesday, now commonly known as Pancake Day. This day, as so many festivals celebrated around the world, emulates from the Christian calendar. It is the day before Lent begins. Lent lasts for 40 days during which Christians traditionally give up something to remember the 40 days that Jesus spent in the desert. In the past, meat and meat products were avoided during these 40 days and so on Shrove Tuesday, pancakes were made to use up the remaining butter, eggs and fat before fasting began the following day. Pancakes have been made for hundreds of years with the first recorded recipe in a cookery book dating back to 1439. Pancake races have been traditionally run in the UK dating back to 1445. The legend is that a woman was making her pancakes when she heard the church bell ringing to call everyone to go to the local church to make their pre Lent confessions. She ran to church still holding her frying pan and thus began the first "pancake race". I am sure many of our older residents will remember local pancake races, often with participants in fancy dress, that were a source of much amusement for both participants and spectators alike.

14th February Ash Wednesday. This is the day when palms that were blessed the previous year on Palm Sunday in Christian Churches are burnt and the ashes used to mark a cross on the foreheads of the congregation at Ash Wednesday services.

14th February Valentines Day, like so many of the "fun" days in our year, started as a Christian feast day to honour a martyr called Valentine. There are two Valentines said to have been executed in the reign of the Roman Emperor Claudius II, both supposedly on February 14th but in different years. According to legend, one of them had officiated at the weddings of Roman soldiers against the

wishes of Caludius. However, although the Catholic church is believed to have designated the 14th February as the Saints Day to commemorate St Valentine, with so little actual historical facts known about him/them, in 1969 they actually removed him from their liturgical calendar. He still remains a Saint to this day. Over the past years, the day has grown around the world from the sending of Valentines Day Cards anonymously into a huge commercial event benefitting not only the greeting card industry but florists, restauranteurs and the gift industry alike.

29th February This year, and every fourth year sees February with an extra day. These years with 366 days are known as Leap Years. An astronomer in Julius Caesar's reign worked out that Earth takes not 365 days to orbit the sun once but very slightly less than 365.25 days. Thus to "catch up" these quarter days, every fourth year has an extra day. The years when this happens are those divisible by 4 thus 2024 is one such year. However, to make up for the "slightly less than a quarter", over a period of 400 years, 3 extra "unwanted" days will have been added. To compensate for this, if Leap Year falls on a turn of the century year not divisible by 400, then that year will not be counted as a Leap Year and there will be no 29th February. The millennium year 2000 was divisible by 400 and so there was a February 29th but the year 1900 was not divisible by 400 and so there was no February 29th. The length of months varied and it was not until 1582 that the pattern of the number of days in each month was finally established. Tradition has it that on Leap Day women can propose marriage to men. This is believed to date back to an old Irish legend that St Brigid was concerned that young ladies had to wait too long for men to propose to them and so St Patrick decreed that ladies could propose to men on Leap Day.

In some places, the day is known as "Bachelors' Day". if a man refuses a proposal of marriage, he is expected to pay a "penalty" such as a gown or money to the lady. Another old tradition was that he had to give the lady 12 pairs of gloves, this was so that the lady could wear the gloves to hide the fact that she was not wearing an engagement ring!

Other old superstitions are that in Scotland it is was considered unlucky to be born on leap day and in Greece they thought it unlucky to marry in a leap year and even worse on a Leap Day.

So, all you unmarried gentlemen, beware any unmarried women approaching you on the 29th!!!!

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
