From the vicar, Richard Hare

There is something particularly awful about homelessness that just feels wrong. It's good to know that Barmston church is one of the 20-or-so churches in the area that clubbed together to form a charity, Hope Housing Bridlington, to make a difference. We are heading for our fifth anniversary and in the time since we were formed have housed about a dozen different men, some for just a few weeks and some for a number of years. We have two three-bedroomed terraced houses in town, leased from our national partner Green Pastures, so we can house up to six formerly homeless men at a time.

It's proved to be very hard work, but sometimes rewarding too. We've seen some residents move on to independent living, restore broken relationships or explore Christian faith. Others have refused to engage with our employed Housing Support Officers,



have fallen back into destructive habits or sadly have had to be evicted.

HISTORY PAGE

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, BARMSTON



The first mention of the village of Barmston (Beneston) was in the Doomsday Book of 1086. Back in those days, churches were usually built by the "lord of the manor" who had far reaching rights and obligations for their maintenance both financially and practically.

It is widely believed that Alan de Monceaux had a church built in the 1100's and evidence from some of the architecture of All Saints' (as it is now known) would support this belief. Shortly after it was built, he gave the church to Whitby Abbey around 1170. At that time, the right to appoint the priest (or vicar as we now call the incumbent) was in the hands of the Lord of the manor and it is thought that when Whitby Abbey became the owners of the church, this 'right of patronage' was retain by Alan de Monceaux.

In 1287, the then abbot of Whitby and Alan de Monceaux's descendent, Sir Ingram de Monceaux both argued that they were responsible for appointing the priest. Sir Ingram died in 1292 but must have won the argument as presumably after his early death and while his descendent, John de Monceaux was a minor, the Crown appointed an incumbent in 1292 and again in 1295. In the early 1300's, Sir Ingram's widow was known to hold the right of patronage and this was duly passed down through the family until modern times.

The church was enlarged during the 1400's and also has signs that some later alterations were made.


There are three notable items in the church – the Norman font, a large tombchest with an effigy of a man in armour – thought to represent William Monceaux who died in 1446 and an even older

hogsback dating back to Viking times. The first two items are native to the church but the hogsback that, until 1996 was in the rectory, is thought to have been brought to the parish by an earlier incumbent. These stones were part of religious monuments and date back to 875 to 1066

The earliest written records for the church are dated from 1571 when details of marriages, baptisms and burials commenced. There is a list of the church vicars on a board in the church dating back even earlier where the name 'Boynton' frequently appears. The Boyntons were descendants of the de Monceaux's and through whose line the patronage of the church descended.

There are some beautiful stained glass windows, mostly to commemorate members of the Boynton family although there does remain a tiny piece of medieval glass in one of the windows.

As can be imagined, with the churches having often been built by the lords of the manors and the patronage (right to appoint the priests) falling to them, the governance of churches was



closely tied to the governance of the villages – but more of this and of the church from the troubled years after the reign of Henry 8th next time.
