



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HISTORY PAGE

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, BARMSTON – Part 2



The early jurisdiction of settlements in England was in the hands of the Lord of the Manor and with his ownership of local churches led to the churches involvement in local governance - having responsibility for areas such as caring for the local poor, appointment of a local constable, deciding on the guilt and subsequent punishment of minor offenders, collecting contributions from residents towards the general upkeep of the area such as roads, etc., etc. From this developed the "Vestry

Meetings" so named as they were generally held in the room in the church where vestments, records, etc were kept. During the 19th century, the responsibilities of the vestry was gradually reduced until in 1894, the Local Government Act transferred the remaining secular responsibilities to newly elected parish and rural district councils. The annual vestry meeting is still held in Barmston with the sole purpose of electing the churchwardens – all those named on the Church Electoral Roll or listed on the civil Register of Electors are entitled to attend and vote at this meeting.

Returning to the history of the church in the 1500's – this century saw enormous changes, initially started by Henry VIII's efforts to have his first marriage annulled. Pope Clement VII's refusal to do so was the beginning of the English Reformation and by 1536, the Church of England had been formed with Henry as its head. All assets, including Barmston Church, previously owned by the Catholic Church in England and Wales was now declared to be owned by the newly formed Church of England. Catholic worship was replaced by the Protestant form,

monasteries dissolved and throughout the 16th century there was continued persecution of anybody still following the Catholic faith.

The removal of some of the finger tips and the tip of the nose of the knight on the tomb in Barmston Church was reputedly to have been carried out by Parliamentarian troops during the English Civil



War in the mid 17th century. Grooves in the stonework of the porch entrance to the church are also said to have been the result of the arrows of the Parliamentarian troops. It is quite possible that this is true as both Scarborough and Hull saw fierce fighting during this time and troops would in all probability have passed through the village. However, none of this can be proved and some scholars also maintain that much damage was done to church property during the Reformation. You may draw your own conclusions as to how the damage occurred!

Scrutiny of the knight's effigy will also reveal initials carved by vandals, some dating back to 1672. Vandalism is not only the prerogative of our generation!!

From 1291 when the value of the church was shown as £13.6s8d to the Reformation when it's value had increased to £123.6s0d, most of the income for the church was gained from tithes. Tithes were levies on produce or income derived from land owned by the church and let out to tenants. By 1958, all the church land had finally been sold and there is no longer any tithe income.

Next month – the final part will bring us up to more modern times
