
When there was concern the village church could end services not long ago as numbers had dwindled, he showed his support with a donation which he hoped would go some way to keep things going.

He would often point out his old house, (number 1 council house), tell me where Margaret Marshall lived a few doors up, show me where he played cricket in the village - those little trips out invoked many happy memories for him. I seem to remember on a visit down the village a couple of years ago he managed a few words with John Swift just outside the Black Bull.

HISTORY PAGE

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, BARMSTON – Part 3

During the 1700's and 1800's worship carried on attended by the families from the village and surrounding farms. The Boynton family's last resting place continued to be in the church and there are memorials to them around the walls together with some fine stained glass windows in their memory. The Hogs Back (mentioned in the March edition of the Village Voice) was introduced into the church in the 1700's and around 1720, repairs were carried out to the church and it was then also rendered.

In 1873, the tomb chest with the figure of a recumbent knight on the top that was originally situated in the centre of the chancel was moved to the north side where it was so close to the walls that two sides could not be seen, extensive damage was caused to the monument owing to the damp conditions. Around this time restoration and refitting of the church was also carried out.



The 1900's saw some beautiful stained glass windows installed. The one behind the altar in the south aisle was made by Jones & Willis in 1921. S Kent & Co made the window in the south wall of the lady chapel in 1929, it is this window that incorporates the only remaining pieces of medieval stained glass in the church. L C Evetts, one of the best 20th century stained glass window makers, made the east window in 1965.

In the early part of the 1900's Fred Robson who was the resident joiner in Barmston, made the board showing the list of Rectors. In addition to many general wood working tasks he carried out in the

church, he also made the carved wooden screen that now stands between the nave and the chancel. This was dedicated by the Bishop at an Easter 1915 service.

Lady Elizabeth Boynton paid for the nave and aisle to be re-roofed in 1938 and in 1986 some major repair work was carried out thanks to an anonymous benefactor. At this time, the path giving access to the church from Sands Lane was also created.



In 2002, thanks to the efforts of local parishioners who worked together, grants were raised to enable urgently needed maintenance, the installation of central heating and the long overdue restoration of the tomb to be carried out. Once restored, the tomb was re-sited on a base impervious to rising damp in its current position just inside the entrance to the church.

In September 2012, disaster struck in the form of thieves who returned three times in a week stripping the nave roof of much of its lead. A local builder quickly covered the roof with tarpaulins and the task of re-roofing it began. Specifications from the churches designated architect, permissions from the local council, agreement from English Heritage, Faculties (Agreements to carry out work) from York Diocese, Insurance claim, etc all had to be obtained. Once in place, these enabled grants to be applied for that, together with some very generous donations from residents past and present, enabled the work to be carried out and paid for by the end of the year.

In 2016, a grant from the Lissett Wind Farm Fund enabled the path through the churchyard to be re-laid and in 2018. The north boundary wall, also an ancient structure, was repaired courtesy of the Mr Chris Marshall and his siblings.

On the 21st May 2017 the Bishop of Hull presided over a service in the church. She, and many visitors from as far afield as Australia, Japan, America and around Europe and the UK have enjoyed the experience of visiting our parish church. With dwindling members of the congregation and thus dwindling income, the threat of closure of the church remains with us. Over the centuries, records show that this is not a current problem and it is hoped that like our previous generations, we too will also get through this period and that All Saints' will be a place to come to worship and celebrate family events for centuries to come.
