Scrapbook: Danish soldiers - Infantry

"Infantry" Scrapbook

The sheet, which is one of the four cut-out sheets with infantry from the "Danish soldiers" series, consisted of the drawings which are now reproduced on four A4 sheets and show participants in a parade.

The first group depicts a division commander and an accompanying officer. The soldier on the right carries the division commander's stand (Textbook for Hærens Menige, 1946). This is followed by a horn blower, a mounted officer, the unit's banner and two groups of soldiers.

The last sheet contains soldiers who were never cut out.

Uniforming

The soldiers are wearing Uniform M/44, which was a copy of the English battle dress. The steel helmet is also of English origin.

What made the cartoonist show the soldiers' thongs in brown, I don't know. The webbing would probably have appeared in a greenish shade, piped in the color that was now "in" in the device in question.

On the shoulder, the soldiers wear the so-called *shoulder title*, which bore the name of the regiment.

And that's how I also remember these figures. I can see that they have been mounted on wooden blocks, but I don't remember actually playing with them.


Now the pictures are passed on for the hopefully enjoyment of others.







Anti-aircraft gun under fire.
