

Introduction

In addition:

The information in the above table is based on calculations in Source 1 and Source 2. However, in relation to other information, here under the organizational breakdown, there are certain inconsistencies with regard to the number of people and vehicles, which today cannot be explained. The differences should hardly be given greater importance, as they do not change the general impression of the units' organization, function, equipment, etc.

Brigade staff

The actual staff consisted of: •

Officers available (2), Command Expedition (= Command Office) (4), Marine Department (3), Operations Section

- (2), Headquarters Commander (1), Materiel Section (2), Intelligence Section (8), Quartermaster Section (3), Brigade Telegraph Officer
- (1), Brigade Training Officer (1), Brigade Medical Officer (2), Brigade Field Chaplain (1), Press Officer (2)), Office and kitchen staff (15) and Motor vehicle drivers and orderlies (22)

The brigade's press quarter consisted of:

Press officer with assistants (3), Press staff (8), Journalist group (7), Photo group (7), Radio group (4), Swedish group (12), Allied group (12) and Custody group (4).

The staff division consisted

of: • Leader with assistants (4), 3 Recoil gun groups of 6 men (18), Machine gun group (9) and Ordnance group (10).

The communication division consisted

of: • Driver with helpers (4), Radio group of 3 SMO teams (sending and receiving teams) of 5 men (15), Signal group of 2 teams of 3 men (6), Telephone group of 4 teams of 2-8 men (14), carrier pigeon teams (4) and motor vehicle drivers (7).

The regiment

Chief with Staff included: •

Chief (1), Chief of Staff (1), Adjutant (1), Orderly Officer (2), Signal Officer (1), Pioneer Officer (1), Quartermaster (1), Typists (2), Doctor (1) and Motor vehicle drivers and orderlies etc. (11).

The staff company consisted of:

• Commander with command group (43), Liaison platoon (78), Securing platoon (17) and Ammunition column (69).

1st - 4th Battalion

The light battalions were organized as follows:

- Commander with staff (54) 3 recoilless fire
- companies (165).

The recoil plant companies consisted of: •

Chief with command group (27)

3 platoons, each with platoon sling (7), 3 recoilless rifle groups (8), machine gun group (8) and 47 mm mortar group (7).

5. Battalion

The brigade's heavy battalion was organized as follows:

Battalion staff: •

Chief with staff (34).

1st Company (Infantry Gun Company): •

Commander with command group (38) • 4

platoons, each with 4 infantry gun groups (9).

2nd Company (Machine gun company): •

Commander with command group (26) 3

platoons, each with 4 machine gun groups (9).

3rd Company (Mortar Company): •

Commander with command group (36) • 4

platoons, each with 3 mortar groups (11).

4th Company (Machine Gun Company): •

Commander with command group (25) • 2

platoons, each with 4 machine gun groups (9).

Pioneer Command

The pioneer command consisted of:

• Chief with command group (28), Park Platoon1 (77) • 4 pioneer platoons, each with platoon leader and platoon troop (9) and 3 groups (10) on bicycles.

120 mm mortar company The

company consisted of • Chief with command group (27) • 2 platoons of 2 groups (14).

Panzervärnkompaniet

The anti-tank company consisted of: •

Chief with command group (6)

• 5 divisions, each with 4 groups (5).

The motor vehicle company

The motor vehicle company

consisted of: • Chief with command

group (30) • Field workshop (30) •

Fuel command, consisting of: Drivers with helpers (2), 2 delivery points for the vehicle fleet of 6 men (12), 2 delivery points for single drivers of 12 men (24) • Spare motor vehicle fleet (47).

The sanitary company

The medical company consisted of:

• Commander with command group (28), •

Field hospital: Command group (5), Reception department (7), Dressing department (9), Surgical department (31), Medical of platoon (8), X-ray department (4), Field laboratory and field pharmacy (3), Blood Center A (7), Epidemic Command (15), Ambulance team (7), Evacuation department (4),

• 2 car parking spaces (with blood centers B and C) each for 10 people (20) • Ambulance convoy (8).

¹ The Park Division's strength figures include approx. 60 men, who made up the "loading and protection crew", but this force did not reach the Pionerkommando before the departure for Denmark.

The field police detachment

The field police detachment

consisted of: • Chief with command group (10), 1st Platoon (18) and 2nd Platoon (38).

The Order Police Department

The Order Police Department

consisted of: • Chief with command group (38) consisting of: Staff, order group and craftsman group • 2 half-commandos consisting of: Leader with assistants (10), 3 platoons of 4 groups of 6 men (72).

The fire command

The fire command consisted

of: • Chief with command group (38), 4 half-columns consisting of: Leader with assistants (4), Fire division of 3 groups of 10 men (30), Clearing division (17) and Depot division (8).

Other units •

Working command "Malmö" (80). •


Work command "Lund" (100) (this unit was not activated).




The brigade is ready to depart for Jutland, Copenhagen's Godsba negård, 8 May 1945.
