

Bugler and kettle drum. Part 3.




Bugler (trumpeter) same uniform as private, with the red plume as the only difference. This plume was reintroduced in 1962 after having been out of use for many years. The reason for buglers to wear red plumes, was that this helped the CO of the unit to easily identify the bugler, when he required a signal given. One of the buglers shown here, is a private first class, and squad leader ("overkonstabel af første klasse og"menig gruppefører").


Kettle drummer's horse. The drum horse is always a black and heavy horse; the drums (pauker) are rather heavy. The drum banners always wears the monogram of the ruling king or queen in . The drummer wears white plume, as he is not having the tactical function as a bugler. Further he always wears the pelisse, as he cannot operate the drums with the pelisse hanging from the shoulder.



This drum horse is the horse used today - a heavy Frisian horse.
