# Polish Cavalry in World War II

# About Polish cavalry on the Russian side

# 1. Independent Cavalry Brigade "Warsaw"

From June 1944, the brigade was part of the 1st Polish Army, which fought as part of the 1st Belorussian Front, and participated in the operations: Bagration, Vistula-Oder, Pomerania and Berlin.

#### **Units**

1st Cavairy Regiment 1)_
2nd Lancer Regiment 2)
3rd Lancer Regiment
4. Mounted Artillery Division (with 12 pcs. 76 mm cannon)
12. Engineer squadron

## **History**

The brigade was formed on 29 April 1944 at Zhitomir (in the Kiev Military District). The brigade had the 1st Cavalry Regiment set up in the autumn of 1943 as its basic unit. The organization followed the Polish 1939 organization, albeit with a greater number of heavy weapons. 1st Cavalry Brigade continued - perhaps to an even greater extent than other Polish units - the pre-war traditions; among other things, several of the unit designations correspond to Cavalry Brigade Suwalska.

After the end of the war, the 1st Polish Cavalry Division was formed, with the 1st Cavalry Brigade as the foundation. From 15 May 1945, the 4th Mounted Artillery Division was transformed into the 4th Mounted Artillery Regiment.

57. Anti-tank division was formed in 1945 by bringing together the anti-tank squadrons of the regiments. It is not known whether it is before or after the war.

- Each with 3 platoons (each squadron had a total of 18 light machine guns)
- Machine gun squadron
- 12 pcs. medium heavy machine gun
- Anti-tank squadron 4
- pcs. 45 mm anti-tank gun Mortar
- squadron 6 pcs.
- 82 mm mortar Cannon
- squadron 4 pcs.
- 76 mm "infantry gun"

In total: 1,165 men.

- 1) In Source 2's list of units participating in the Berlin operations, only the 2nd and 3rd are mentioned.
