








The Legislative Landscape

The Acts

Children (Scotland) Act 1995

- 78 sections (16 93) and two relevant schedules
- Seven sets of related Rules including 84
 Rules/Regulations in total
- SCRA 41 Practice Instruction Notes

Children's Hearings (Scotland) Act 2011

- 206 sections and six schedules
- Fifteen sets of related Rules including 286
 Rules/Regulations in total
- SCRA 29 New Practice Directions
- 45 Practice Directions & Notes (including 16 1995
 Act which continue to be relevant eg: victims of
 youth crime / death of a child known to the
 Reporter / sexual offending)








Referrals to SCRA
