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Rob Hughes Homily: Dominion.

I've just re-watched, for the third time, the latest instalment of the Jurassic Park / Jurassic World DVDs - **Jurassic World - Dominion.** To someone like me, it's absolutely terrific in terms of special effects (and I'll certainly keep a more respectful distance away from large animals, and fast-running smaller ones with teeth!). But the script could be accused of perhaps over-egging some of the messages that have been repeated throughout the previous five films.



Except for one new and sinister one - a stern warning! Picture the scene - Dr Ian Malcom (aka Jeff Goldblum) is addressing some new recruits into an organization run by the arch-villain from the first film, who still hasn't got the message - **that it's extremely dangerous to mess with genetics, and with the forces of nature**. Dr Malcolm says this (paraphrased):

"To human beings, a hundred years is a long time; to the earth, it's nothing; a million years is nothing. We've been guests here for the blink of an eye... we not only lack dominion over nature, we're subordinate to it... so if we want to instigate revolutionary change, <u>we must transform</u> <u>human consciousness</u>".

That seems to me to be massively true in the real world, too!

Now "having dominion" is generally defined as **the power**, **or absolute right**, **to govern and control**, **and in so doing**, **exercising absolute authority over territory**, **and everything (and everyone) in it!** In short, a single ruler holds absolute sway!! Ring any bells? And humankind seems to be generally of the belief that scientific advances enable us to do whatever we like with the knowledge hence 'we have dominion' over the natural order of things.

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In the first chapter of the book of Genesis (v 26), the Bible has something to say about 'dominion' in real terms - specifically where humankind should really 'fit' into (in with!) God's natural world:

King James Version: And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and <u>let them</u> <u>have dominion</u> over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth.



The New Revised Standard Version and English Standard Version concur, and also use dominion'. However, other translations use different terminology:

- The Good News Bible uses have power over
- The New Living Translation uses reign over
- The New International Bible favouring rule over

So, what are we to conclude from the Genesis account of creation? Did God 'really mean it' when He said we'd be granted 'dominion' over the whole world - does he intend us to have absolute authority and jurisdiction? I think <u>not</u>! So, we have to look at the whole context within the creation accounts, which mention that humankind was created 'in God's image'. Basically, this means He intends us to '**know**' (recognise and celebrate) Him as the one true God, and worship and respect Him; he wants us to be naturally loving and caring towards each other, and use and share all the earth's resources - to be good stewards within, and cooperating with, nature - and certainly not to manipulate it to suit ourselves!

Clearly, humankind has a God-given curiosity to 'find out' and learn more about the universe physics, biology and chemistry, outer space, and how to harvest and harness all the resources at our disposal. But the more-we-think-we-know, the more we find there is to discover, and to simply marvel at! So, increasing knowledge and understanding (as we perceive it) doesn't gives us dominion over anything. But we have, unfortunately all-too-often, discovered something new, immediately done something with it, and then simply hoped for the best.

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That's got to change, and it won't be easy after centuries of industrial, scientific and technological revolution. So, when Ian Malcolm unequivocally states "*if we want to instigate revolutionary change, <u>we must transform human consciousness</u>", I sense that will require a fundamental shift in humankind's ability to recognise past mistakes, learn from them, and learn to cooperate (as individuals, communities, nations, and international relationships) with each other, with nature and with God.*

It's no longer enough to merely fight the present symptoms of 'decline' in the many and varied political, economic, scientific and human relationship challenges of our time. We should be hoping and praying for a fundamental shift in the way we look at pretty much every aspect of our international, national, and, maybe even local-community relationships... and most of all, our relationship with God.

Whatever we try to do; whatever we choose to worry about; whatever hardships we may have to face, over the next few days, weeks, months or years, **the earth will, ultimately, be fine**. But if humankind can't learn to understand and embrace God's initial plan for us (to be loving-caring-and-sharing), **humankind may never be fine.** Unless, that is, we can make a fundamental shift in how, as a global community, we approach the issues that clearly affect us all. So Dr Malcolm's (albeit scripted) warning is that current challenges may yet be a necessary, a defining - next step in our own evolution.

Whether or not that concerns us, or inspires us, is entirely **<u>up to us</u>**, irrespective of how governments and leaders behave. But a truly peaceful and cooperative global society starts here-and-now with individuals - you and me included –

"Where there is righteousness in the heart, there is beauty in the character. When there is beauty in the character, there is harmony in the home. When there is harmony in the home, there is order in the nation. When there is order in the nation, there is peace in the world." – **A.P.J. Abdul Kalam**.

Can humankind transform the way it thinks? And find sufficient humility to care-and-share 'with righteousness in the heart'? It must all start here and now, which is why we pray:

Gracious and loving God, we understand that you call us to be the stewards of Your abundance, the caretakers of all you have entrusted to us. Help us always to use your gifts wisely, and teach us to share them generously. May our faithful stewardship bear witness to the love of Christ in our lives.

Amen.
