


Figure 1 Pulford Church



Rob Hughes Homily: Faith and Belief (Do actions speak louder than words?)



In my previous blog, I touched on the relationship between faith and hope - basically offering an opinion that both are about trust: faith being trust in the present, influenced by past learning and experience; and hope is also trust, but that something will happen (that you anticipate or "hopefor") in the future...

As you will no doubt have gathered, I greatly value and respect the New Testament's description about faith being: "confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what

we do not see". The Letter to the Hebrew Christians goes further and speaks about "belief" - specifically that: "without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him.... trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding." This text encouraged me to say something about belief this time.

I guess it's true to say that when we have faith, we trust or believe in someone, or something, very strongly - deep within ourselves and within our hearts. Faith comes from what we've been taught, and what we've experienced-in, and learned-from, life. But it's not necessarily based entirely on proof, as there's room for intuition - that niggling opinion we 'feel', deep down.

'Belief', on the other hand, refers to something that we consider to be true - here-and-now; 'deep-down', irrespective of the facts or any beliefs or opinions of others. And in this respect, it could be argued that belief comes first. It's that 'feeling' that actually enables us to have faith in someone or something. In a religious context, we're mindful that "he who comes to God must believe that He is".

Is this another chicken-and-egg situation? Does faith require belief, or is it vice-versa? I don't believe it's either of these, because it's next-to-impossible to convincingly argue that faith can exist without someone or something to have faith-in. Conversely, I really can't imagine a situation in which we, deep-down, believe in something unless we have credible experience or intuition that he/she/it exists. It doesn't make sense to separate the two, does it? Furthermore, the Bible teaches that God intends our faith and our actions to go hand in hand - "What good is it, my brothers, if a man claims to have faith but has no deeds?" (James 2:14).

In itself, this says nothing about belief... but it does beg the question, do our actions truly reflect what-or-who we actually believe in? It occurs to me that in order to be right with God, we have to not only have faith and **do things**, but what we **do** needs to be in tune with what we **believe in**. In short, neither faith nor belief mean all that much unless we believe the right things. Evidence about what 'these right things' are is clear to read-about in the Gospels, in the Acts of the Apostles and in the Letters to the early church. The early church, frankly, struggled to believe in the right things, and often strayed from 'the truth', so St Paul made many journeys to put them right!

Accepting for a moment that belief may be at the root of faith (and probably at the root of hope, as well?), if you were given a choice as to which takes precedence - "right action" or "right belief", what would you say?

- Some might mention ethical conduct;
- others might claim the important of moral high ground;
- many might come down on the side of faith, or grace;
- others might favour ritual, practices and rites
- How many would say "right belief"?

When push comes to shove, there is only One Truth - God's Truth, demonstrated in action by Jesus Christ, "lived" by the apostles - and by countless practicing Christians ever since. They, and we, believe in God the Father - first and foremost, and God, the Son, and God the Holy Spirit (who also enables and supports hope).

As practicing Christians our challenges include believing the right things, in order to do the right things:

- throughout our daily lives;
- in everything we say and do;
- whilst maintaining faith that we'll be loved and supported every step of the way during this difficult journey.

It seems to me that it's **right belief that sets the course** - from which right actions, living faith, and genuine hope then flow.

In his recent sermon at Pulford, Canon Ian Davenport quoted St Teresa of Avila which, for me, sums up our beliefs, and our potential for faith-in-action:

"Christ has no body now on earth but yours, no hands but yours, no feet but yours, Yours are the eyes through which to look out Christ's compassion to the world. Yours are the feet with which he is to go about doing good; Yours are the hands with which he is to bless men now."

Eccleston Church Vestry Stained-Glass Windows:


