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Rob Hughes Homily: Presence and Gratitude – the benefits...

I'm pleased to say that following my last blog, I've had a few conversations with people about my own more-recent 'spiritual development'. I'd intended to change the subject after last time, but from these conversations, it would seem appropriate that I might usefully explain a few more experiences.... Not so much about the thoughts and feelings that whizz around, but more from the point of view of the tangible benefits of going 'with the flow'. In saying that, I can't emphasis enough, this is a deeply personal point of view, and it would be lovely to hear about the different experiences of others - maybe as contributions for the Newsletter?

So 'here goes' with some of the of tangible benefits I've experienced by **inviting** spiritual awareness 'in' (rather than seeking it out), and letting God have His way (more than I perhaps used to):



Living in the present: I've finally got the message that this isn't about living-for-now, one-day-at-atime. I now have a much more deeply-rooted sense of the scriptures that relate to 'take no thought for tomorrow'. It's become more about not letting worries about the future rule how I simply enjoy 'where I am', what I'm looking at (or doing), and 'who I'm with', here and now... Albert Einstein put it very precisely and succinctly when he wrote:

"Life is a preparation for the future; and the best preparation for the future is to live as if there were none".

That's not to say that we don't need to plan for the future, and maybe consider potential issues that we might have to face (in business, that would be called contingency planning). But living more-in-the-present enables me to stop-short at the catastrophe- thinking stage, by recognising that's it's nonsense and counter-productive, and letting it be.

I believe I'm much 'better' now at recognising when I've done enough useful thinking, and then getting back to living in-the-day becomes more natural.

- Have I stoped having thoughts of catastrophe? No.
- Do they lead to obsessive worrying? **Not any more**, as they simply pass-on-by, because I've become more aware of "what's real".

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Being Grateful: I've never found it difficult to be grateful - simply because, thank God, there's so much in my life I can be grateful for. I've learned, the hard way, though, that I've never been all-that-good at remembering 'to feel gratitude', nor in behaving in a grateful way.

I've more recently learned much more about how to practice gratitude. That may sound like I've learned a technique. But that's not so. This has been as simple (for me) as, for example, learning to not just notice 'something nice', but to stop for a few moments and look-at- it, closely. When push comes to shove, it not only enables a deeper appreciation of 'life in general', it also gives my mind a rest. The transformation for me has been learning to (more often) simply stop what I'm doing or thinking-about, if only for a few moments, and allow gratitude to express itself. Gratitude for simply being 'alive' to experience these things.

I'm sure you'd find, for example, that concentrating more on what you're doing or speakingabout, 'here-and-now', can lead to better outcomes, and a deeper understanding of what's being spoken about. And for that we can all be grateful!

On a serious note, though. Psychologists tell us that people who regularly practice gratitude (by simply taking time to notice and reflect upon the experiences of everyday-living) became more thankful for what's happening, here-and-now. So, they become much less concerned about an unknowable future.

It's pretty much proven that being aware of what we can be grateful for, and behaving as 'grateful people', leads to more positive emotions, feeling 'more alive', and expressing more compassion and kindness. It even strengthens our immune systems.

There are many more examples of the tangible benefits of behaving more spiritually, and if there's sufficient interest, I'll expand in future blogs. But as Christians, we surely acknowledge the singly most important event for which we can all be (literally) eternally grateful for - and that's the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

As we prepare for the Easter season in particular it's the release of God's Holy Spirit that we should not only be grateful-for, but should express in our hearts, minds and activities.

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The Prayer of St Richard (the 'day-by-day prayer'):

Thanks be to you, our Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits which you have given us, for all the pains and insults which you have borne for us. Most merciful Redeemer, Friend and Brother, may we know you more clearly, love you more dearly, and follow you more nearly, day by day. Amen.

Responsible Email (How to spot fake emails).

Due to the ever-increasing amount of spam, scam and phishing emails that are prevalent these days, I thought it might be helpful to create a document outlining some helpful hints and tips on how to avoid falling a victim to spamming, scamming and phishing. The document is too big to include in this newsletter, so I have uploaded it to the church website under the heading "Responsible Email" in the Resources section:

Please feel free to download and read this document. I hope it is useful.

In general, if you receive an email that does not address you by name, and just says "Help I need a favour, please email me back" or asks you to click on random links, this is a scam. Even if the email looks like it is from a friend.

If you do reply, you will then receive another email from a different email address, asking you to purchase a gift card. (Gift Cards cannot be traced to the scammer).

Always check the email address of the sender, by clicking on the name field. This will show their real email address. Scammers can fake the "from name", but they can't fake the "from email address". This is a good way to spot if an email is genuine or not. There are 11 other tips in the document that I hope will help you stay safe online.
