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Rob Hughes Homily: Seeing and perceiving



As I get older, a saying of my dad's becomes increasingly true of my situation. He'd sometimes mention: "As I get older, I lose more things, and what I miss the most is my mind!"

Have you ever been frustrated looking for something, and failing to find it? Or perhaps looking for something, knowing you 'must be getting close', getting distracted, and then falling back to 'square one'. Or, maybe giving up looking for something for a long time, finding it accidentally, and being disappointed, or not needing it anymore?

In conversations I've had with non-Christians and waverers, over many years, some seem to have been put-off because, in their words: "I've been looking for God for a long time, and never managed to find Him". Rarely, some have then added, "but I'll keep trying". I've had conversation with others who have regarded themselves as Christians, but reckoned that "God wasn't around when I needed Him the most" (usually during or after some sort of crisis). Sorry to have to admit, "I've been there, too".

Sometimes such conversations can get a bit tricky... No matter how hard you try to explain that "God is always there"; it's all-too-easy to come across as pompous, patronising, rude, or unhelpful; and can even make things worse - as the more you try, the worse it can get!


But it's true; we don't have to send out a search party to find God. In the Person of The Holy Spirit, He is always within us. So, God the Father and Son is always alongside us, ahead of us and behind us. The issue then becomes - do we expect to see, or touch Him? Or can we 'see better' when we distance ourselves from our purely-physical senses?

The human side of our nature always looks for "that littler bit more" from God; perhaps seeking more proof of his existence. We're not alone - even such miracles as the disciples had seen for themselves never seem to have been enough - even at the time. Seeing and perceiving can prove difficult to reconcile. One requires facts; the other requires faith....

A while ago I came across a saying which helped me with this one: "We usually think of ourselves as human beings who <u>seek</u> to experience our spiritual nature; we are, in fact, spiritual beings who routinely experience our human nature" ...

- Our human nature prompts us to believe what we see (the disciples, in the storm, saw a ghost)
- Our spiritual nature dares us to perceive other truths (the disciples in the calm perceived Jesus differently "My Lord and my God"!)

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It occurs to me that throughout His earthly ministry (and beyond!), Jesus was there with the disciples, always looking out for them; He was always at the right place at the right time - not by coincidence, but because He was simply always there, and always will be there for us, too. Not by coincidence; not because we have to seek Him out; but because He is always there. So, we don't have to look-without; we have to perceive within... with faith that He's already there - within to comfort and support us...

He can't be seen, nor heard; nor can He be touched with our human hands. But our spiritual nature can enable us to perceive Him - anytime, anywhere (which can, or course, be particularly difficult in times of crisis and chaos - and not necessarily much easier in times of tranquility and stillness).


There is an old hymn that testifies, "Jesus calls us o'er the tumult of our life's wild, restless sea." But just as He instructed His disciples to face dangers (in the boat-in-a-storm, for example, and throughout their ministries), we must be prepared to keep the faith - not by "looking for Him", but by "perceiving Him", which is why we pray:

May we truly have faith that Christ will always 'be there':

- Above us to bless us:
- Below us to support us;
- Before us to guide us;
- Behind us to protect us:
- Beside us to comfort us:
- And inside us, to give us courage, strength and joy.



Jeanette Howe's Homily: A meditation from Mother Julian of Norwich.

650 years ago, 8th May, 1373, while seriously ill, Julian of Norwich received sixteen revelations of God's divine love. The final paragraph of the last meditation reads like this:



"So it was that I learned that love was our Lord's meaning.

And I saw for certain, both here and elsewhere,

That before ever He made us,

God loved us:

And that his love has never slackened, nor ever shall.

In this love all his works have been done,
And in this love, he has made everything serve us;
And in this love our life is everlasting.
Our beginning was when we were made,
But the love in which he made us, never had a beginning;
In it we have our beginning.
All this we shall see in God forever.

May Jesus grant this.

Amen"
