Rob Hughes Homily: Are We at Peace with Ourselves?

In their album recorded in 2000, the band U2 wrote and sang this:

"Heaven on earth - we need it now I'm sick of all this hanging around Sick of sorrow, Sick of pain Sick of hearing again and again that there's gonna be peace on earth."



Peace – world peace – most certainly seems to be a "long time acummin'...".

In the decades following the end of World War 2 there have only been about 26 days when there has not been a major war, or civil war, somewhere on the planet. And these days, we hear of little else. Even in nations that seem stable and peaceful enough internally (few and far between), there's a constant threat of terrorist attack. Terror weapons now include the internet, as well as the gun. Indiscriminate targeting of individuals, organizations and even economies affect all of us, one way or another, here and now.

And it occurs to me that in any conflict, each 'side' (for example in the current conflicts in the Middle East and Eastern Europe) blames the other for provoking armed intervention. YET each will insist on the other making some sort of 'first move' before ceasefire negotiations can even be contemplated! Then national pride and national ego kicks in, and no-one seems to ever be willing to make that first move. "Peace through superior firepower" seems to be the order of the day.

The book of Ecclesiastes (possibly written by Solomon, around 900 years BC) has this to say about life: There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens:

- a time to be born and a time to die,
- a time to plant and a time to uproot,
- a time to kill and a time to heal,

- ".... a time to tear down and a time to build....
- a time to love and a time to hate,
- a time for war and a time for peace

A couple of hundred years on (and 700 years or so before Christ's ministry), Micah predicted terrible times of war for the people of Israel. But then he goes on with this amazing vision of peace in the world:

"They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore".

And around 500 BC, it was Confucius (we think) who said this: "If there is righteousness in the heart, there will be beauty in the character. If there is beauty in the character, there will be harmony in the home. If there is harmony in the home, there will be order in the nations. When there is order in the nations, there will peace in the world." So:

- Solomon seems to be saying that there's a time for war and for peace, a time to live, and to die; a time to tear down and to build - and a time for joy and for sorrow. Which is pretty "real life", even now, is it not?
- Micah seems to be saying that whilst there have been, and will continue to be, times of war, we can, indeed should, always work towards a time in which weapons can be not so much destroyed, but be put to better use transforming items made for killing into items that will sustain life.
- Confucius seems to be saying, in no uncertain terms, that if we expect to enjoy peace on earth, it all starts with righteousness in the hearts of individuals, and <u>within</u> nations, before it can meaningfully exist <u>between</u> the nations...
- So, the peace process starts here and now... (yet it still has to be said that the U2 lyrics still haunt us we've not cracked it yet).

Of course, ultimate peace and justice and joy will come only in-and-through the Kingdom of God. But that doesn't mean that we just sit and wait – it's never too soon to start cultivating an oasis of peace in the desert of a war mongering world. It all starts 'here and now', and in the words of Mahatma Gandi, "**Peace is** not something that you wish for. It is something that <u>you make</u>, something that <u>you do</u>, something that <u>you are</u>, something that you give away."

Remembrance Sunday is upon us, a time for the remembrance of (in respect and thankfulness for) the lives of so many whose lives have been the price for our freedom. And if we really want to honour those who died in war, we perhaps owe it to them, to ourselves and to each other, to **make peace** make peace with ourselves, with each other, and with God - seeking, if you will, 'righteousness in the heart and harmony in the home'.

This would seem to be a prerequisite to creating order in the nation. But it's still up to us to do whatever we can wherever we can, whenever we can - and to set that example. Then to get the message out that we are a nation at 'peace-within' - to then promote 'peace-without'. The problem being there are few nations at peace within - yet. Let's set that example!

Christians have a part to play in any and every peace process (in spite of the headlines and newscasts that might make us feel powerless). The question remains for us, as individuals and communities, **do we**?

Night Church Chester – Are you interested in becoming a Trustee?

Introduction

One trustee has recently come to the end of their term of office. The remaining trustees are therefore keen to recruit one additional trustee to increase the total number of trustees from three to four.

What is Night Church?

Night Church Chester was launched in December 2010 by The Light Project, an evangelical charity based in Chester. In September 2015 Night Church Chester separated from the Light Project and became an independent small charity. Then in June 2016, as resources exceeded £5,000, it registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation with the Charities Commission. It operates from St Peter's Church, Chester.

"Night Church a sacred space in the centre of Chester open to everyone: where anyone in town on a Saturday night can experience something of God's presence. We welcome people of all faiths and none. We are seed sowers, participants in God's mission; trusting that God has planned our visitors' next step, but knowing that we may not see it"

Trustees are appointed by serving trustees, in accord with the Constitution and good practice set out in the Charities Commission. The structure of Night Church Chester is the Board of Trustees: a Project Leader and a Leadership Team and a Treasurer. The Project Leader works with a Leadership Team to plan and operate Night Church Chester at St Peter's Church. The Project Leader and Treasurer prepare reports for Trustees and attend Trustee Meetings. Trustees have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. We have a Memorandum of Understanding with St Peter's Church. This is the basis of our working relationship with St Peter's Church, what they provide for us and what we pay them. Night Church Chester has a very close working relationship with St Peter's Church we are very thankful.



Night Church operates on one Saturday night a month and remains open until the early hours of Sunday morning. We have an illuminated sign above the front door with the words "Night Church" which is very visible and so important in indicating our presence. Inside we have tables at a safe distance from each other and serve coffee and tea. There is a prayer corner where visitors can light a candle, pray or leave a prayer request; there is also background Christian music, at times with live music and song. Lighting in the Church is subdued. We have a minimum of 2 leaders and 8 volunteers each night along with musicians and a prayer team. (These numbers are based on a risk assessment.) One or two of the volunteers each night will have had first aid training. Our objective is to ensure that volunteers and visitors are safe. In total we have approximately 20 volunteers who come from a range of local churches.

We have Trustee Liability and Employer and Public and Products Liability Insurance. Buildings insurance is covered by St Peter's Church.

We begin each evening by setting up facilities for Night Church and then have a time of preparation when volunteers are reminded of safety procedures, safeguarding and possible risks. We then have a time of quietness, prayer and introductory words. This is good preparation for Night Church.

Two volunteers stand at the door to greet people passing by and invite people into Night Church. Other volunteers are at various places inside the Church. We are a place of hospitality and visitors are free to have a drink or sit quietly listening to music or chatting among themselves. Volunteers are always available to help or to have conversations on topics raised by the visitor. Each time we are open there are always amazing conversations. Very occasionally we have a difficult visitor, usually drink or drug related and we help as necessary, liaising with the police if needed. Our policies cover values, appointment of Trustees, strategic plan, safeguarding, volunteer policy and role, dealing with drugs and alcohol, health and safety,



dealing with incidents, risk assessment, prayer policy, and complaints policy which is on our website. They ensure that the Charity and its operations are on a secure basis and equip volunteers for ensuring a safe and friendly environment.

It was so good to re-open after Covid in November 2021 and since then we have welcomed an average of 80 visitors each night.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees recognise their responsibility under the Charities Act 2011 for the governance of the Charity in accordance with our Constitution, to prepare financial statements and a report for each financial year which gives a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and its surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements we are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis

We are also responsible for:

- good governance;
- keeping proper accounting records;
- safeguarding the charity's assets;
- taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud.
- ensuring the charity complies with relevant laws and regulations including Health and Safety, Safeguarding, Employment and Charity legislation.

Eccleston School Update

The Eccleston CofE School PTA along with staff, governors, pupils, parents, the local community and dignitaries, including Chester MP Samantha Dixon and High Sheriff of Chester Dennis Dunn attended an event to celebrate an investment of £15,000 in new play equipment for Eccleston CofE Primary School.

The PTA have been fundraising for improvements to the school grounds over the last seven years, largely through school events, such as a ball for the parents, sports day summer fair and the school nativity.

Katie Prescott, headteacher at Eccleston school said: "We want our playground improvements to be part of our 150-year-old story and so we are working towards that goal, but we are also appealing for stories and photos from past pupils, teachers and the local community. It would be great to hold a big celebration event in 2025 and invite past pupils to be part of it alongside our wonderful current pupils".

As well as the new play equipment, the PTA is also leading the transformation of a nature garden as part of the wider grounds in a piece of land 'donated' by the Grosvenor Estate.

Following a volunteer day organized by Network Rail earlier in the year, local grandad Paul Murphy is volunteering his time to drive forward the improvements and get it ready for the children to plant in the spring.






Figure 1 Remembrance Day 2023
