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Rob Hughes Homily: Can Love be defined?

As we're approaching Valentine's Day, I thought I'd reflect on this by revisiting its origins, and a couple of previous homilies about "love".

"Valentine's Day" dates back to 1st Century Rome, then under the rule of 'Claudius the Cruel'. A time when Roman men were hesitant



to 'join-up' because of their strong attachment to their wives and families. So, to get rid of the problem, Claudius simply banned all marriages and engagements!!! Then along came Valentine of Terni (who was said to have been a Roman priest at that time), and it's believed that Valentine defied Claudius, and continued to perform marriages for young lovers (in secret). But when this was discovered, Claudius ordered his imprisonment; he was eventually beaten to death and beheaded. The sentence appears to have been carried out on **February 14th**, 269 A.D. ... and to honour his Martyrdom, the 'Feast of Saint Valentine' was established by Pope Gelasius 1st, in AD496, to be celebrated on February 14th.

Fast-forwarding to the modern-day custom of sending cards as a token of love on St Valentines Day - this probably dates back to the early Nineteenth Century - though some accounts mention 'isolated incidents' as far back as the fifteenth century! These days, of course, Valentine's Day is specifically about romantic love!

Now the English word "love" is used to describe at least four types of loving relationships.

- The relationship between the members of a family, which is based on mutual respect, mutual care, mutual support - and loyalty.
- The relationship between friends is also about loyalty, but implies the
 enjoyment of each other's company socially, sharing common interests
 and simply 'caring'.
- The romantic relationship between couples has more to do with absolute commitment to each other's well-being, enjoying and satisfying each other's physical and emotional desires, and, usually, to create a family.

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- The relationship between Christ and His Church well, that's all about absolute commitment, loyalty, trust faith, belief... not in human-tohuman relationships, but in a personal relationship between 'us" and God.
 - one-to-one and this requires a 'surrender of self' to God's will for a 'greater good').

The consensus of modern scholars is that the New Testament was written in Greek, and that an Aramaic source text was used for portions of the it, especially the Gospels. Now in the Greek language there's a different word for each type of these 'love relationships':

- Storge: The relationship between the members of a family
- Philia: The relationship between friends
- **Eros:** The romantic relationship between a man and woman
- Agape: The relationship between Christ and his Church

So, when St Paul wrote that incredibly-beautiful 'poem' about love in his Second Letter to the Corinthians, he used the word **agape** - the fourth type of love; the love that Jesus Christ had for His church - not the institution per se, but for His 'people-the-church'.

Paul describes the qualities of Christ's love for us as: patience; kindness; not being envious or boastful, proud nor rude; selflessness; slow to anger, quick to forgive; sympathetic; truthful; forbearing; trusting; persevering and steadfast.



To my way of thinking, there's only one other 'definition' of love that makes the point more succinctly, written in the First Epistle of John, Chapter 4: Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love, does not know God, because God is love. Pure and simple... all love comes from God, as He is love.

We're not perfect; try as we might (and so many don't even try) we'll never succeed by our own efforts. In truth, human love has an end to it; marriages sometimes fall apart; family members can become estranged from one another; and friends can become foes. Such is the fragility of human love. But the love of God, and the **agape** - the Love of Jesus Christ for His people (the church) isn't like that. He doesn't take back his love when we fall short of his expectations - He continues to love us.

His is a Love that: 'always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres". That's why we're called not just to love one another (often seen as a summary of "all The Law"), but to love one another as Jesus Christ Loves us... Without condition, no matter what; on every occasion, without ceasing. And that's, often, very, very difficult, isn't it?

So, whilst Paul's poem refers to **agape** - the love of Jesus Christ for everyone who loves him - the virtues of patience, kindness, selflessness, apply to us all in any kind of human relationships, and over-arch every definition of love.

During the Lenten Season, may we examine how our conduct actually measures up to Paul's description of love? Are we 100% committed to **agape** ("The More Excellent Way of Love")? Or are we generally more focused on earthly love? When we fall short, it's then we remember, and should draw upon, the support of the Holy spirit, within- and between us, and strive towards **agape...**

"Love never fails...But now faith, hope, love, abide these three; but the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:1-8)

Dear God, thank you that you are a loving, gracious God. Thank you that you have offered us forgiveness and the gift of new life in you. Thank you that your love is perfect, it never fails, and that nothing can separate us from your love.

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Rectors of Eccleston part 5 – R.A Henry Wigley [1690-1701] & Samuel Tilley [1701-1704]

The evicted Ralph Lowndes was succeeded as Rector by Henry Wigley, and he was to see out the tumultuous and troubled 17th Century, though only just!

Wigley was a Cheshire man, son of the Rector of Warmingham. Educated at St. John's College Cambridge, he came to Eccleston at the early age of 28. He married one Anne Bradgate of Ullacombe, Leicestershire, and their son practiced as a physician in Chester. A memorial tablet to Ormerod, showed that he died of fever in 1701 at the age of 39.

He was succeeded, in 1701 by Samuel Tilley. The patron of Eccleston living at that time, was the Earl of Abingdon, and Tilley had been his Domestic Chaplain. Tilley left in 1704 to become Rector of Bladon with Woodstock, in Oxfordshire. I researched his reasons for departing so soon and to such a distance. The Rector of Bladon infomed me that the Earls of Abingdon, as High Stewards, had paid £20 per annum towards a Curate's salary from 1695 to 1702. Bladon is now in the gift of the Dukes of Marlborough, but Tilley was the last presentee of the Crown.

The Dukedom was created to reward John Churchill for his miliary career, and Queen Anne built Blenheim Palace as a further reward for his victorious career in the Wars of the Spanish Succession. It is said that the Duke and Duchess virtually ruled England, but they were, eventually, accused of misappropriation and fell from favour. They were, however, restored to favour later. Bladon is, of course, the last resting place of Winston Spencer Churchill, who was born at Blenheim Palace in 1874.



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Book Recommendation. The Hermitage Within.

"When self-advertisement is all the rage, here is a book by a man who will not divulge his name.



Not everyone can, or should, live as a hermit. Yet all Christians need an inner hermitage, a place apart where we come face-to-face with out true selves, and listen to the still small voice of God. It is a place of silence, or fear and fascination, of anguish and grace.

The writer of this profound yet simple volume encourages us to find our own inner hermitage - a place of calm and contemplation, apart from the demands of the modern world, a place so silent that we can hear God.

The desert, the mountain, and the temple provide the focus of the anonymous author's reflections. He meditates on the wilderness experiences of such biblical persons as Jesus, John the Baptist, and Mary Magdalen. He considers the place held in the Christian story by Mount Sinai,

the Mount of Olives, and Calvary. He ponders the idea of temples, using such images as our inner temple and Christ the temple, the foundation of the Church".

This review, from the back of book sums up the contents of this excellent book. I thoroughly recommend this book.



Reader/Intercessor/Sidesperson Rota

At the last PCC meeting it was suggested that Eccleston Church return to having a sidesperson. It was suggested that either the reader or prayer lead for the service act as sidesperson to make things easy. If someone is already available to read then it saves having to try and organize an additional rota for sidespeople.

Duties of the sidesperson include

- greeting people as they enter the church
- handing out hymn books/service sheets and collecting them at the end of a service.
- inviting people to communion (for Holy Communion Services)
- recording the total number in the congregation.
- Putting the correct hymn numbers in the hymn boards.
- Taking the plate money to the vestry for counting.
