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Rob Hughes Homily – Shepherds and Sheep.

Forgive me if you remember a story I've told before, about the time traffic had been stopped (on a local-ish North Wales country road) to allow a large flock of sheep to be rounded up for relocation from a very large field. They were to be walked down the road, a few hundred yards, to an open gate, into a slightly smaller field. There were, literally, 'many dozen' sheep, three shepherds, five dogs and a quad bike (with a driver who clearly had no idea what to do, except race around a bit, and make a lot of noise and pollution).

It was absolute mayhem, as you might expect. No sooner had there been some apparent success getting a single 'flock', than the still-bemused sheep split into two groups; then three; then four separate groups - scattering in unpredictable directions, but always ending up at the far corners of the immense field. All they needed (if you watch "One Man and his Dog' on the TV), was one experienced shepherd with two trained dogs, and someone to close the gate!

One of the readings for Easter 4 is the Parable of the Good Shepherd - and it occurred to me to mention how very different shepherding is in the Middle Eastern regions, where the role of the shepherd is to **lead** his or her flock - not to **drive** them. And in Palestinian villages 2000 years ago, it wasn't unusual to see sheep



from different flocks simply wandering around the streets together. As darkness closed in, and danger increased, sheep (often from mixed flocks) just huddled together, or even wandered into any of the houses in which the ground floor was given over to sheltering the family's livestock... the people slept upstairs. In the mornings, the sheep would wander out-and-about again - <u>until</u> they heard the voice of their own shepherd - usually calling them in order to move on to pastures outside the village, maybe on the surrounding hillsides. They would then gather together again, as one flock, and off they'd go.

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Clearly, this, in itself, is a lesson in trust - the sheep accepting that their shepherd-leader would protect and care for them, and would never lead then astray or let them down.

Once they'd reached the new pasture, there would be even more danger at night, from bandits, poachers and 'big cats' (Arabian leopards, caracals, even cheetahs being native to the region - all extremely dangerous!). So over- night, the shepherd would typically find or build a 'communal sheep-fold' - where other shepherds and their flocks might also congregate to take temporary shelter. Maybe this is a lesson, in itself, about being able to seek, and even take for granted, the mutual cooperation between shepherds and their flocks...

But we hear in the Bible about 'the **Good Shepherd** laying down his life for the sheep'. This isn't only an allusion about Jesus dying for the sake of us all, it's also, literally, true of the shepherds themselves. On the one hand, any decent shepherd would vigorously drive away, at considerable risk, wild animals and poachers, often with slings (simple and effective weapons of choice), sticks, stones, ersatz spears and firebrands. On the other hand, it's also literally true that shepherds would lie across the entrance of the sheep folds (no five-barred gates in those days!!) to dissuade anyone or anything trying to steal or kill their sheep - they'd 'lay down their lives', routinely and repeatedly, to protect the animals in the shelter - their own and anyone else's.

Surely, this is an amazing parable in terms of the length and breadth of the message. We can perceive lessons in, for example:

- the reliability of our Good Shepherd in terms of leading the way to safety and plenty
- His willingness to get involved, lead us on the right path, and protect us on the journey and at the end of it
- in being identified by our own Good Shepherd, and being able to identify His voice when He calls though we sometimes may not be as good as 'real sheep' at coming when He calls
- And even then, we're told about our Shepherd's willingness to seek us out when we stray away, and His equal delight in finding strays, as well as keeping the rest of the flock intact.

But it also occurs to me that as members of Jesus' flock, we have responsibilities, too:

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- To recognise our Good Shepherd, address Him by name, and to hear Him when He calls
- Make ourselves available to Him, and recognisable as members of His flock privately and 'out there'
- Respond to His call not so much in blind obedience, but in absolute trust that we are loved and will be protected and nurtured
- To expect Him to seek us out when we stray... but then it's up to us to return to Him and to each other
 - o we have that choice!
- Cooperate with Him, and with others who speak and work in His name, And, as importantly, cooperate with, and support, members of other flocks who are similarly loved and nurtured

Whether or not we respond to Christ's call is up to us - we are not **driven** by our Good Shepherd, we're lovingly invited, encouraged, supported and protected then **led** if we choose to follow. But with that free will we have awesome responsibility... As even as practicing Christians, we may well be severely distracted because of our business, and our concerns over our increasingly complex and dangerous world. It can be difficult to fully recognise when Jesus calls, and to then fully commit to being 'cooperative, trusting and trustworthy sheep'.

We have a choice on how we prioritise our time, and how we speak, and how we behave. Are we willing sheep, or do we expect to be driven?

Two collects from Common Worship:

Merciful Father, you gave your Son Jesus Christ to be the Good Shepherd, and in his love for us to lay down his life and rise again: keep us always under his protection, and give us grace to follow in his steps; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord.

Risen Christ, faithful Shepherd of your Father's sheep: teach us to hear your voice and to follow your command, that all your people may be gathered into one flock, to the glory of God the Father.

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Rectors of Eccleston part 10 (Clement Eustace Marco Wilson - 1912 to 1921).

The Reverend Clement Eustace Marco Wilson (15th May 1875 – 8th February 1944) was an English amateur first-class cricketer and Church of England clergyman.

He was born in Yorkshire and educated at Uppingham School where he was a phenomenon in batting. In 1893 he achieved consecutive scores of 117,145 and 183 not out! He was a Cambridge Blue as a Freshman, and eventually captained the University side against Oxford in the annual varsity match where he made scores of 35, 89, 77 and 115 not out.

Clement Wilson was chosen to tour South Africa on a two-Test tour in 1898 (without singular success) and, after he was ordained in 1899, he abandoned cricket. He became a priest in 1903.

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He was curate at

- Whitby, North Yorkshire 1901-1903.
- Dunchurch, Warwickshire 1903-1904.
- Rugby from 1904 to 1909.

He was vicar at Calverhill, Shropshire from 1910-1912 then Rector of Eccleston, Cheshire from 1912 to 1921 where he was also estate chaplain and librarian to the Duke of Westminster at Eaton Hall. In 1921 he became Vicar of Sand Hutton, North Yorkshire. In 1925 he returned to Calverhall as Vicar, holding the living with that of neighbouring Ighfield from 1928 until his death. He was later also Prebendary of Lichfield Cathedral, in whose diocese the parishes lie.

The Rector married twice. His second marriage was in 1912, the year in which he came to Eccleston, when he married a daughter of Lord Hamilton of Dalzell. They had one son, David Clement, who was born in 1916 who also played first-class cricket.

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Reader/Intercessor/Sidesperson Rota

It was suggested that either the reader or prayer lead for the service act as sidesperson to make things easy. If someone is already available to read then it saves having to try and organize an additional rota for sidespeople.

Duties of the sidesperson include

- greeting people as they enter the church
- handing out hymn books/service sheets and collecting them at the end of a service.
- inviting people to communion (for Holy Communion Services)
- recording the total number in the congregation.
- Putting the correct hymn numbers in the hymn boards.
- Taking the plate money to the vestry for counting.
