

Rob Hughes Homily – July 2024.

"Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it." Proverbs 4:23



The Book of Proverbs was written by King Solomon - King David's son, and generally considered (at least in the Bible) as the wisest of men. You may remember from recent Lectionary readings that when asked by God what he wanted most, Solomon asked for wisdom... specifically in order to rule his people wisely and well.

Clearly, this doesn't specifically refer to the mind, but most certainly alludes to it. In human terms, I'd say the tendency is to let our minds rule our hearts - especially when it comes to seeking the material things in life, and in the quest for power to rule or to dominate.

So where does this fit in terms of Silent Church? Well in western societies, we tend to regard the words *Mindfulness* and *Meditation* as synonymous. They are not!

- On the one hand, mindfulness here speaks about being mindful OF
 your thoughts, rather than filling your mind up with more! Unnecessary thinking is what needs to be 'noticed' and allowed to drift
 on by.
- On the other hand, in Eastern traditions (and in this context), no distinction is made between heart and mind. So, what we have interpreted as mind-full-ness can be more accurately interpreted as heart-full-ness!

Don't get me wrong - I've been grateful for 'mindfulness meditation' as an effective introduction to 'calming the mind down a bit' - decluttering the mind in order to better understand the implications and benefits of 'heartfelt stillness' (the words presence and awareness also fit here).

During Silent Church, I hope you might experience this sense of allowing intrusive thoughts from the mind to float on by - and simply allow them to be displaced by thoughts from the heart - and letting God have His say. When everything we think and do 'comes from the heart' surely, we're doing what Jesus consistently demonstrated throughout his life, and requires of all who chose to follow him ever since

Heartfulness (or lack of it!!) can influence what we say and how we behave.... We can, sometimes unwittingly, have powerful influence over others as a result of what we say, and how we behave. We're called to take care of others heart-fully; we can best accomplish that when we look after our own hearts (i.e. ourselves), too!!

To my 'mind', King Solomon summed this up quite succinctly: "Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it."

Eccleston Church History by Peter Jackson - Part 1

This article written by Peter Jackson originally appeared in the December 2010 Parish Church Newsletter.

Eccleston, as a village, is something of an enigma. Many Parish Churches are evolutionary. Many were built in the 16th and 17th Centuries, perhaps even earlier, and over the succeeding centuries they have been altered, reconstructed and regrettably in the 18th Century, neglected. In Eccleston, it has been different, rather than repair and extend, Churches have been demolished and replaced. It is as a result of this that the present Church is one of the most recent structures in the village. The present building is our starting point in a quest to determine how many such buildings have existed.

The present Church is reputed to be the third to have been built. The earliest reference however, is in 1188 which argues for five or six possible churches, since the advent of Christianity. *The name Eccleston has been defined as meaning "church-town"*.

In an effort to unravel this, I have looked at such evidence starting with the present and have endeavored to work backwards to the origins of the Church building, or even a "worship site" in the village. Thus, we pass from the factual present, via the recorded past, and eventually into conjecture and surmise. But the effort is worthwhile.

The present, and quite magnificent, Church was designed by G F Bodley at the behest of the 1st Duke of Westminster and, if a memorial to the Duke was needed, it would be this building. He is reputed to have asked for a small cathedral but Bodley achieved something closely akin.

The tower gives the impression of a massive proportion, but on entering the Church, one cannot help but be struck by its modest proportions. I use "modest" solely in reference to dimension, but the same term could not be applied to the interior furnishing, design and finish. It is easy to see why the cost of building was £40,000 (equivalent to over £3 million in todays terms), and this was at a time during the second half of the 19th century, when average Church building costs were between £7,000 and £10,000. The Church remains very much as originally built and Bodley's design shows a shrewdly designed balance between ancient and modern.

Eccleston Church History – Part 2

We now look at the previous church which was situated in the old Churchyard and which was demolished (except for a fragment which now backs the Grosvenor family graves) at the end of the 19th Century.

Just as the present Church is one of the most recently built in the Diocese, its predecessor must have surely been the shortest lived in the diocese, surviving from construction to demolition in 1899, for less than 100 years! It replaced a medieval structure (14th Century) which had become decrepit.

The architect on this occasion was William Porden (1755-1822), who had been appointed estate surveyor by the 1st Earl Grosvenor in 1784, with responsibility for the Estate in Mayfair. In the early 19th Century, he was appointed to reconstruct Eaton Hall which had been built to a design by Vanburgh. The result of Porden's work was, in Ormerod's terms, a "sort of church gothic". To the uninitiated, it might seem (from contemporary illustrations), to have been somewhat eccentric and one line of criticism being based on an excessive use of ironwork!

The 18th Century, however, was the age of iron which was the material of the age but which did not always chime, particularly in Gothic buildings, with stonework. Porden's other work included parts of the Brighton Pavilion for the Prince Regent. Again, to some, this style was somewhat eccentric although technically impressive.

Whatever the criticisms, however, it did not prevent Earl Grosvenor appointing Porden to design the new Church. This he did in red sandstone with a western tower and the result was pleasing. Ormerod almost waxed lyrical about it, but he did mention the ill-effect of ironwork employed in the stone mullions in the windows!

During its short existence, the Church was subjected to many revisions and reconstructions. A chancel was added in 1853, whilst side galleries were removed in 1869. A new organ and brass eagle lectern were donated by the 1st Duke of Westminster in 1874. There had been a complete renovation of the Church in the 1850's. There was even a Caravaggio painting in the church.

It has to be remembered that the Grosvenor family were rising in eminence in the 18^{th} / 19^{th} Centuries and they clearly wanted a Church which reflected their patronage. The 19^{th} Century may be seen in this light. This which came to final fruition in 1899 with the building of the present Church at the behest of the 1^{st} Duke. Additionally, we are looking at the Victorian passion for Church reconstruction. Much was necessary, of course, but in their zeal, the architects of the day sometimes failed to distinguish good from bad. In their defense, little had been done in the 17^{th} and 18^{th} Centuries which had, of course, seen the Civil War and the depredations of the Puritan movement.




Figure 1 William Porden Plans for Eccleston Church 1809

Reader/Intercessor/Sidesperson Rota

At the last PCC meeting it was suggested that Eccleston Church return to having a sidesperson. It was suggested that either the reader or prayer lead for the service act as sidesperson to make things easy. If someone is already available to read then it saves having to try and organize an additional rota for sidespeople.

Duties of the sidesperson include

- greeting people as they enter the church
- handing out hymn books/service sheets and collecting them at the end of a service.
- inviting people to communion (for Holy Communion Services)
- recording the total number in the congregation.
- Putting the correct hymn numbers in the hymn boards.
- Taking the plate money to the vestry for counting.
