Rob Hughes Homily – Shhhhh - Silence!

Having entitled my previous homily as 'final thoughts about thoughts', I came across something the other day that I wanted to share with you - this time not entirely in the context of Silent Church. This is about what the Bible has to say, specifically, about silence and stillness:

From the Old Testament: "Be still, and know that I am God" - (Psalm 46.10)

- Basically, the psalmist was saying (and the message to us) is that no matter what happens, God will always be there to guide, and protect, and support. So, we can wait on him even during chaotic times.

<u>From the New Testament:</u> Jesus Himself is quoted as saying: "Peace, be still" (Mark 4.39) - We know the story well - Jesus awoke and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, 'Peace! Be still!". After which the wind ceased, "and there was a great calm.

It's interesting to note that most Bible translations not only use the word 'rebuke' (or equivalent), they also include an exclamation mark... Jesus clearly commanded the storm to cease.

One school of thought says that this account is a metaphor for His power to bring peace into turbulent lives. I guess we'd all appreciate that these days!! Another possibility has been put forward that He was a bit miffed that the disciples were so afraid, in spite of His presence with them, and promises to them. Maybe He was a tad disappointed at their lack of faith (given that the literal translation of "Be Still", taken from the Greek, is: Hush! In modern terms: Shut Up!).

But in all honesty, how often do we ask God for something but don't stop to listen to Him in response? We have excuses to hand, don't we? Our busy-ness; our genuinely anxious thoughts (some understandable; others not so much), there is, <u>in fact</u>, little time to spare in this complex, often-dangerous, always changing, and understandably distracting world.

It certainly isn't easy to find 'stillness' - but we'd do well to remember that in the boat, in the storm, Jesus was probably exhausted, maybe even overwhelmed, by the crowds prior to getting away for some peace and quiet (and sleep) in the boat. Maybe we'd do well to wonder if He'd been a bit grumpy with the disciples for waking Him up through their continuing lack of faith.

It would seem reasonable to conclude that there's a message - a command - to us "be quiet" - be still - for Him. In saying this, believe it or not, it isn't 'yet another advert' for Silent Church.

It's a sincere attempt to offer this challenge: the next time you have fearful and anxious thoughts, that are bouncing around like a violent storm, do as Jesus did. Silence those thoughts by saying, "Peace, be still."

One thing's for certain: whenever we might need encouragement, support or inner strength in order to cope our daily living, we can surely rest in God, wherever we are, - at home, at work, at play. He will be there to be heard.

It's up to us whether or not we choose to listen.

St Mary's Eccleston - Saint #1 - St Cecilia

Looking up at the stained-glass windows of Eccleston Church, the North wall features a window dedicated to St Cecilia. It shows St Cecilia playing a portative organ.

St Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians after allegedly "singing her heart to the Lord" as the musicians played at her wedding.

Musical compositions are dedicated to her, and her feast on 22nd November is the occasion of concerts and musical festivals.

She was martyred in about 230, under the Emperor Alexander Severus. (There is also some evidence that instead she perished in Sicily under the Emperor Marcus Aurelius between 176 and 180).

The legend of Cecilia's death due to her faith and refusal to worship idols, include being condemned to be suffocated in the baths. Since this attempt was unsuccessful, she was then struck three times on the neck with a sword. She continued to live for three days, asking the pope to convert her home into a church.

The statue of St Cecilia in the church of St Cecilia in Trastevere, shows her extending three fingers with her right hand and one with her left, representing the Holy Trinity. The sculptor attested that this was how the Saint's body looked when her tomb was opened in 1599.

Eccleston Church History by Peter Jackson - Part 4

This article written by Peter Jackson originally appeared in the April 2011 Parish Church Newsletter.

The earliest reference to a Church in Eccleston is dated 1188 and we may conjecture that this is the building demolished in the 14^{th} Century to make way for that referred to in Part 3.

A much more difficult situation arises when we consider when the Church of 1188 was built. There was, it is true, a "rash" of Church building in the late 11^{th} and 12^{th} centuries, but it is necessary to go further back to attempt to establish a date.

The ancient villages of England set great store by the fact that their villages are included in the Domesday Survey. Such is the case with Eccleston, and the name Eccleston has been translated, by various authorities, as meaning "Church Town" or "place with a Church".

How odd, therefore, that the entry in the Domesday Survey makes no mention of a Church. Various possibilities present themselves. We might ask whether the Surveyors omitted it in error, though this would seem unlikely. It may be that, in fact, there was no actual Church building in Eccleston at the date of the Domesday Survey (1087). A learned article, submitted in the "Cheshire Sheaf" at the beginning of the 20th Century sought to balance and quantify the area of the Hundred. A discrepancy in the overall area has been suggested as relating (possibly) to Eccleston.

A much more sinister reason arises when the early history of the Norman invasion comes under the microscope. William is known to have mounted an offensive against the tribes on the Northern and Western limits of England. This occurred in 1069/1070, and has been referred to as "The Harrowing of the North". As with all such expeditions before and since, it took the form of "scorched earth". William is said to have apologized on his death-bed for the brutal aspects of his expedition. However, not much store should be laid on this: it has been the habit of all tyrants, before and since, to pray for redemption when facing death

Moran's excellent "Cheshire Churches" shows 3 churches in Chester, with only 9 churches in the rest of Cheshire in the Domesday Survey. It may be, of course, that "scorched earth" had accounted for others, but again, we have our favourite word, "conjecture"!

Prior to 1066, the Anglo-Saxon building, if it existed, would have been simple, little more than a cross and altar being the early manifestation of Christianity at the location.

I like to think that there have been 5 or 6 churches in Eccleston, and that with the sole exception of the present building, these all existed in what is now the Old Churchyard. Certainly, I believe that the first missionaries would have sited their cross and altar as near as possible to the old pagan meeting place, an early example of applied psychology, keeping the new faith as near as possible to their old "comfort zone".

The stones and timbers have not endured. What has endured, however, is the Christian faith, which shines as brightly now as it did some 1400 years ago when the missionaries first set up their cross and altar at Eccleston.

It is of course, the enduring nature of faith which overrides and is so much more important that the fabric of the successive Churches. We are bound to ask ourselves what it is that has made the faith so ensuring despite foreign wars, civil wars and strife, epidemics and the Reformation? It is this enduring quality that characterizes Christianity.

A reminder to anyone who might be interested in Eccleston Cemetery. The map of the cemetery is now complete. I have added the location and names of all graves. If anyone wishes to add a short tribute, or photo to the pin, please contact me at admin@ecclestonandpulfordchurches.org

It is interesting to note, that the name Eccleston actually means "Church Town". In 1929, an excavation at the church, revealed 20 bodies which are believed to date from 390 AD. They are the earliest known burials in Cheshire. Part of the churchyard is unusual in that it is circular in shape, which indicates pagan origins.

Reader/Intercessor/Sidesperson Rota

At the last PCC meeting it was suggested that Eccleston Church return to having a sidesperson. It was suggested that either the reader or prayer lead for the service act as sidesperson to make things easy. If someone is already available to read then it saves having to try and organize an additional rota for sidespeople.

Duties of the sidesperson include

- greeting people as they enter the church
- handing out hymn books/service sheets and collecting them at the end of a service.
- inviting people to communion (for Holy Communion Services)
- recording the total number in the congregation.
- Putting the correct hymn numbers in the hymn boards.
- Taking the plate money to the vestry for counting.
