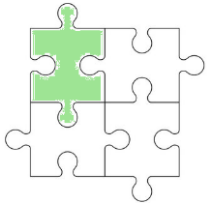

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Research objective + research question

What influence does mechanical restraint have on the therapeutic relationship between psychiatric patients and nurses?

secondary research questions + method

1. What is known about the effects of restraint on the therapeutic relationship?

- Integrative Review

2. From the patient's and nurses' perspective, what factors influence the therapeutic relationship when mechanical restraint is used?

- Critical incident technique (CIT)

3. How can the construct of the therapeutic relationship be theoretically substantiated in the context of mechanical restraint?

- *Synthesis* of the results from Integrative Review and the CIT

Critical Incident Technique (CIT)



Aim to capture negative and positive deviations from the norm through [single narrative-guided interviews](#).

CIT is a method of identifying behaviours that are particularly helpful or harmful for coping with complex demanding situations (Hößler, 2022; Viergever, 2019).

Critical Incident Technique

single narrative-guided interviews

Longitudinal process:

1. triggering phase

2. implementation phase

3. after-effect phase
