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


Indian Summer




Resting Rainbow

Because it is so varied, I called it 'Colours of Life'... life definitely has many facets, colours and shapes. And if we truly want it to be beautiful, we can choose to do so.







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


Water Sparkles

Suave


I collected this spear after a storm in the Mediterranean.

African Dream: Painted on a palm tree bark piece, it seems like it comes straight out of Africa. Its soft colors are pleasing to the eye and the details are interesting.



Thank you Caroline and Julen for exhibiting my work among all the other great artists including yourselves!








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










Armadura Amazona
