### Governance and Management

GUK has transparent and accountable governance system consisting General Council, Executive Committee and experienced & committed Programme Management Team.

#### General Council

GUK has a General Council (GC) consisting of 25 members which is the highest authority of the organisation. Presently 56% of total members in the GC are women. Usually members of the General Council meet once in a year where discussions held about different strategies, audit and major activities of the year. The General Council is also responsible for selection of Executive Committee members.

#### Executive Committee

The Executive Committee (EC) of GUK consisting 07 members elected for every 03 years by the General Council. Meetings of the Executive Committee held 4 times in a year. The Executive Committee supports the "Programme Management Team" for smooth implementation of activities. The executive Committee is responsible to the General Committee.

#### Programme Management Team

GUK has a Programme Management Team (PMT) consisting 9 senior members from different individual units. Members of this team have strong leadership quality, proven experiences and commitment. Chief Executive of the organisation leads the programme management team. This team is responsible for strategic direction to implement programme activities smoothly. This team also maintains communication and liaison with government, people's representatives and development partners.



## High Lights of the Year

#### GUK has Launched De-Addiction & Rehabilitation Centre in Gaibandha

On the birth centenary of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, with the aim of building a drugaddiction free peaceful and dignified society, Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) has established a De Addiction & Rehabilitation Centre in Gaibandha this year. Honorable Whip of Bangladesh National Parliament Ms. Mahabub Ara Begum Gini MP inaugurated the 'GUK De Addiction & Rehabilitation Centre' on 5th March, 2020 while present as the chief guest in the launching ceremony. In addition, honorable Deputy Commissioner of Gaibandha Mr. Abdul



Matin, Additional Police Super Mr. Moynul Haque, Civil Surgeon Dr. ABM Abu Hanif and Mayor of Gaibandha municipality Mr. Shah Masud Jahangir Kabir Milon were present as special guest in the inauguration ceremony. Moreover, officials from different government departments, electronic & print media representatives and civil society members were also present among others. GUK aims to bring back the drug addicts to the mainstream of the society through rehabilitation and creating employment opportunity for them.

## 2. Celebration of 35th Anniversary



Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) celebrated its 35th anniversary on 1st January, 2020. To mark the day colourful programmes as well as winter cake (pitha) festival were arranged at the premises of GUK head office at Nashratpur, Gaibandha. Honorable Deputy Commissioner of Gaibandha Mr. Abdul Matin cut the anniversary cake and expressed greetings. Government officials, Bankers, Development Activists and civil society members were present as invited guests in the event.

### 3. GUK Award

Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) launched 'GUK Award' in 2018 to recognize individuals for contributing various sectors of social development. In the launching year the organisation awarded 3 renowned persons of Gaibandha for their outstanding contribution in teaching, cultural field and health service in the year 2017. In 2020, GUK awarded 6 distinguished personnel for the year 2018 and 2020 respectively. Professor Firoza Begum, Journalist Mr. Gobindalal Das and Rhymist Mr.



Abu Jafar Sabu received the award for the year 2018 for their tremendous contribution in the field of education, journalism and literature respectively. On the other hand, Mr. Saroj Deb, Mr. Shah Moshiur Rahman and Mr. Ahammad Ullah were awarded for the year 2020 for outstanding contribution in literature, music and social welfare. Honorable Deputy Commissioner of Gaibandha Mr. Abdul Matin handed over crest and cheque of Tk. 15,000 to the awardees.



### 4. GUK in COVID-19 Response

GUK has been engaged in COVID-19 response since 20<sup>th</sup> of March, 2020 through different interventions. In close collaboration with district and upazila administration as well as health department, following initiatives was taken by GUK in 2020.

- Awareness raising: Reached 1 million people with awareness message in GUK working areas through distribution of leaflets, local newspaper, online TV, mike announcement, demonstration on sneezing and hand washing;
- Installation Hand Washing Stations: GUK has installed 75 permanent hand washing stations in northern districts and Cox's Bazar district. Moreover, 20 temporary hand washing stations were also installed:
- Agriculture labor sent: Total 1477 agriculture labor sent from Gaibandha to different parts
  of the country for harvesting the Boro paddy;
- Food distribution: Food items distributed among 7719 households;
- Hygiene kits distribution: Hygiene kits distributed among 10550 households;
- PPE distribution: Personal Protective Equipments (PPE) distributed to 300 Health Workers;
- Mask distribution: Total 200000 pieces of mask distributed;
- Hand Gloves distribution: 5000 pairs of Hand Gloves distributed;
- Staff salary contribution: 3 days salary of all staff contributed for COVID-19 response.











#### 5. Skill Development Training & Job Placement



GUK emphasizes to strengthen skills of poor youth girls and boys from disadvantaged families to transform them as skilled human capital. For this purpose, GUK has established skill development training centre adjacent to its head office. Around 300 participants can receive residential training at a time in well equipped training venues. The organisation provides 3 months long trade based training like mobile phone servicing, garments sewing machine operation, web & graphic design, IT support service, electrical insatllation

& maintainance and faciliates the trainees for job placement. So far, around 5066 youth have been provided with training on different trades and linked with jobs in various garment factories and private companies. In addition to job placement, the trained youths who want to be self employed get loan from GUK and in some cases GUK link them with financial institutions for financial

#### 6. 'Food Bank'-Very Useful Source of Food for the Rural Poor During Scarcity

Floods and river erosion are the common Phenomenon in the life of people living in Rowmari and Rajibpur upazila of Kurigram district. This year the Corona virus has brought new threats for them. In order to improve the living standards of the women in these disadvantaged areas, Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) has been implementing 'Resilience though Economic Empowerment, Climate Adaptation, Leadership and Learning- REE-CALL' project since 2010. By this project, Community Based Organizations (CBOs) have been formed in 35 villages of Rowmari and Rajibpur upazilas. Each CBO has an Executive Committee and the committees meet regularly to decide on various issues. As the areas are very much prone to disasters and people have to experience floods and river erosion almost every year, by the assistance of the project, the CBOs have established 'Food Banks' to address the emergency food crisis during disaster.

Each family picks up a handful of rice from their cooking rice and stores it separately in a container at home. At the end of the month, everyone gathers and deposits their deposited rice in the food bank. If a poor member has food crisis, she can borrow rice from the food bank and repay it at a convenient time. The surplus rice is sold in the market every month and deposited in the CBO's bank account. At present, there is a deposit of taka 17,58,115.00 (one million seven hundred fifty eight thousand and one hundred fifteen) in the bank accounts of the CBOs. During



COVID-19 pandemic, total 2360 kg rice distributed among 236 poor families from the Food Banks to meet their emergency needs. The Food Banks have ensured emergency food security for families associated with 35 CBOs. This process will continue and as a result, poor families will not have to take loans from anyone at high interest rates. Thus, food banks are playing a vital role in addressing the food crisis of poor families in the area during a nationwide disaster.



# 7. Improving the Living Standards of Rural Poor and Helpless Women

To improve the economic and social standards of rural poor and helpless women in Gaibandha district "Strengthening Women's Ability for Productive New Opportunities (SWAPNO)" project arranged capacity building training on cow, goat/sheep, poultry and pigeon rearing, small business as well as vegetable cultivation on homestead. The training was started simultaneously in 17 unions of Saghata and Fulchhari upazilas maintaining social distance.

The project is being implemented by the Department of Local Government and Engineering with the support of Marico, Sewden SIDA and UNDP for socio-economic development of 612 women participants while GUK is working as implementing partner.

#### 8. Adolescent Girls are Being Capacitated through Involvement with Songlap Centre

GUK is implementing a project namely 'Socio Economic Empowerment with Dignity & Sustainability (SEEDS)' in Gaibandha sadar, Fulchari and Gobindaganj upazila in collaboration with STROMME Foundation. Through this project a total of 18 Songlap Centre have been formed in three upazilas with the purpose to engage adolescent girls in different social awareness activities and develop leadership quality among them. Around 400 adolescent girls are involved with these Songlap centre. They gather in the Songlap centre on regular basis and discuss



on different issues such as child marriage, Violence against Women, eve teasing, child rights & child protection, their roles and responsibilities to the family and society. A trained animator conduct sessions on these issues. The girls engaged with Songlap centres have received training/orientation on various issues like advocacy, leadership, networking etc. They are now playing active role to raise awareness on various social issues by participating in different day observations, human chain, campaign etc. They have been aware about their rights and roles through involvement with the Songlap centres and able to raise their voice. Total 750 adolescent girls are involved with 30 Songlap Centre formed in Gaibandha sadar, Fulchari and Gobindaganj upazila.



# 9. ToT on Life Skill Based Education (LSBE):

Through the 'Skills for employment and Empowerment of Rural Youth (SEEP)' project, 3 days long residential Training for the Trainers (ToT) on Life Skill Based Education (LSBE) arranged at GUK training center, Nashratpur, Gaibandha. This training is provided with the purpose to enhance knowledge of project participants on different issues like self-awareness, decision making, emotional



controlling, effective communicating, inter personal relation, problems solving, negotiation, critical thinking, creative thinking, survive in mental pressure, kindness, child rights, human rights, women's rights, nutrition, reproductive health, primary health care, personal health & hygiene, birth registration, HIV AIDS, disaster etc. A total number 20 out of 20 producers group members including indigenous community received this life skill based education (LSBE). After receiving the ToT they conducted sessions on LSBE for their other project participants. After receiving this training the trainees will apply the acquired knowledge for their own life and at the community level will also discuss with producers group members to increase their life skills. The LSBE sessions are useful to enhance their confidence level and to make them able to adapt themselves in any situation.

### 10. GBV Survivors are Getting Various support through Women Help Desk (WHD)

A total of 1251 GBV survivors (women and girls) received legal aid support in 2020 through Women Help Desk established at Sonatala, Nandigram and Bogura sadar upazila police station and Bogura district court premises by the 'Strengthening Access to Multi-Sectoral Public Services for GBV Survivors in Bangladesh (ASTHA)' project. With the purpose to provide legal aid support to GBV survivors, Women Help Desks have been established at Sonatala, Nandigram and Sadar Upazila police station as well as Bogura district court premises. Female



Police Officials are assigned at police stations while female Legal Support Officer (LSO) of the project has been assigned at WHD of at the court premises to provide support to GBV survivors so that sufferers can easily share their issues with without any hesitation. They are getting support regarding First Investigation Report (FIR), General Dairy (GD), case filing, counseling and referral support from the WHDs.

#### 11. Established Women Led Community Centers (WLCC)



With the purpose to provide vocational and life skills training among women and adolescent girls of Rohingya and host community, Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) has established 10 Women Led Community Centers (WLCC) in Ukhiya and Teknaf upazila of Cox's Bazar district with necessary logistics and training equipment with support of UNFPA and WFP. Through these WLCCs, women and girls from Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMNs) as well as affected host communities are being provided with four months long vocational training on

tailoring and capacity building training on homestead gardening. In addition, they also received life skills sessions on basic literary, health & hygiene, nutrition and Gender Based Violence (GBV). Total 2000 women and girls are being supported through this intervention and they are gradually moving towards dignified life by engaging income generating activities. Awareness sessions also conducted for men & boys of families of selected participants with the purpose to reduce violence against women. A Self Help Group (SHG) has also been formed comprising with female members from the community so that they can address different issues by themselves.





### 12. Food Support for Anandalok Community School Children

Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) has established and operating 26 formal primary schools (Anandolok community schools) in Gaibandha. Nilphamari, Panchagar and Kustia districts. Currently, a total of 4385 children from poor families are receiving primary education (preprimary to grade V) in these schools. GUK has provided food assistance (rice, edible oil, wheat floor, pulse, potato, sugar, salt) to 2270 children

of whom parents lost income option due to COVID-19 pandemic. Food support was provided so that the children can meet their nutritional needs and continue study.

### 13. Women Members of Various Projects of GUK Received the 'Jayita Award'

On the occasion of Begum Rokeya Day-2020, under the programme titled "Bangladesh in Search of Javita", the women who are making significant contribution in various fields are given 'Javita' Award'. In 2020, six women members involved in projects being implemented in different districts

by Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) received the 'Jayita Award'. They are:

I) Hamida participant Begum, 'Strengthening Civil Society and Public Institutions to Address Gender Based Violence

and Build Community Resilience to Adopt Climate Change' project in Gaibandha Sadar upazila in 'Women who start life with new vigor by removing the horror of torture' category:



- Rupali Khatun from Nandigram upazila of Bogura district involved with 'Strengthening II) Access to Multi-Sectoral Public Services for GBV Survivors in Bangladesh (ASTHA) project in 'successful women in education and employment' category;
- Taslima Akter from Sonatala upazila of Bogura district associated with ASTHA project III) in 'economically successful woman' category;
- Kalpana Khatun from Sonatala upazila of Bogura district associated with ASTHA IV) project in 'The woman who started her life in a new way by removing the horrors of torture' category.
- V) Parvin Akhter from Bogura sadar upazila involved with ASTHA project in 'successful mother' category;
- VI) Amina Begum from Roumari upazila of Kurigram district, a member of 'Milk Producers Group' of REE CALL-2021 project in 'Economically successful woman' category.



## 14. Financial Assistance Provided for Income **Generating Activities**

A total of 180 women group members have been provided with financial assistance amounting BDT 6,75,000.00 (six lac seventy five thousand as revolving find for income generating activities e.g. goat/sheep rearing, small business, vegetable gardening, tailoring etc. This assistance is provided through the "Strengthen Civil Society and Public Institutions to address combating Gender Based Violence and Build Community resilience to Adapt Climate change" project. GUK is implementing the project in four unions of Gaibandha sadar and Fulchari upazila with financial support of Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (SIDA) and technical support of Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF).

### 15. Rohingya Youths are Engaged with Income Generation Activities at Camp Level

A total of 100 unemployed Rohingya youths were provided with two days long training on bamboo construction work through the Solidar Suisse supported 'Strengthening Resilience and Food Security of Rohingya Refugees and Host Communities In Bangladesh Cox's Bazar; Teknaf Upazilla' project implementing at Hnila Union of Teknaf Upazila in Cox's Bazar district for livelihood improvement of both Rohingya and Host communities. After successful completion of the training, different required materials for construction work like Vest, Helmet, Gum Boot, Hand Gloves etc. are distributed among trained



participants as start-up package to open the window to be involved with income generating activitities as construction worker. Afterwards, the project team linked them with different actors who are asigned to implement construction related activities at camp level. According to a survey conducted later, it is evident that 65% of the trained beneficiaries are involved in the camp level construction works implementing by the CiC & Site Management. On the other hand, 35% trained participants have been self-employed using their learning from the training. They are now earning around taka 12,500 per month on an average and contributing their family.

## 16. Construction of Disability Inclusive Handwashing Stations in Cox's Bazar



To curb the spread of Novel Corona virus a total of 45 disability inclusive handwashing stations with water facilities have been constructed at 45 school cum cyclone shelters in Cox's Bazar sadar, Ramu, Teknaf, Kutubdia and Maheshkhali upazila under Cox's Bazar district. There are 5 units in each handwashing station- 4 units for man and women and 1 unit for persons with disabilities. UNDP is implementing a 3 year project on disaster risk management in Cox's Bazar district. GUK has constructed these HWSs through UNDP supported Disaster Risk Management programme in Cox's Bazar. In addition, Cash for Work (CfW)

intervention for disaster risk mitigation is also implemented at Matarbari, Hoanak and Dhalghata Unions of Moheshkhali upazila under this programme.

#### 17. Youth Forum Members are Engaged in Local Level Advocacy and Social Mobilization

A total of 152 Youth groups have been formed in three upazilas of Gaibandha district With the purpose to empower youths and create social cohesion engaging them in different social activities. Total 5000 youths (including students, youths from dalit community, Youth with Disabilities, Trans-gender, Youths who are in work) are involved with these groups and they have been provided with different capacity building training, orientation, leadership training, Life Skills training & sessions, IGA training,





awareness sessions and skills development training. They are now aware on different issues. Leadership quality among them developed and volunteerism attitude grown by receiving training & sessions. They are now playing active role voluntarily to contribute in the society.

## 18. Assistance Provided to the Cyclone Amphan Affected People



In collaboration with German based organisation AWO International GUK provided emergency assistance to the Cyclone Amphan affected people in Satkhira district. A total of 1500 most affected families of Protapnagar union under Assasuni upazila of the district have been provided with food items to meet their emergency needs. Hygiene materials are also provided to these families so that they can keep themselves safe from COVID-19 infection.

## Strategic Objective-1: Human Resource Development and Sustainable Institution Building

## Case Story

## Rumina- a Girl from Indigenous Community is now Engaged with Decent Job

'I am very proud as I am now engaged with a decent job and earning money which me or my family could not even think'-Rumina Murmu says. She also added, 'I am from an indigenous poor community living in a village of Gobindaganj upazila in Gaibandha district. My father is a day labour and only he was the bread earner of five members' family. We have no a single piece of land, even we live in a small hut on other's place. Hence, it was so difficult for my father to maintain the family expenditure by his limited income. I am the eldest among



my siblings and amongst this kind of poverty, I tried to continue my study but could not after S.S.C due to financial crisis. Me and my mother used to work as day labor sometimes to support my father. In this circumstance, I came to know that GUK is implementing the project 'Skills for Employment and Empowerment of Rural Youth (SEEP)' through which skills training on 'Garments Sewing Machine Operation' will be provided for youth. I become interested to take this opportunity as I was thinking to do something for my family. Afterwards, I was selected as a trainee and received three months long residential training at GUK which was free of cost. After completion of the training, GUK project team supported me to get the job.

I joined as an "Assistant operator" at Dutch-Bangla Pac Ltd. in Munshiganj district on November 20, 2020. Presently, I am getting salary of BDT 8,300 per month and sending BDT 4,000 for my family in each month. I am now fully confident to build up a bright future. I have a plan to purchase a piece of land for living. I also want to support for continuing my younger siblings' education. I am very grateful to GUK for providing this kind of support which brought a remarkable change in my life."



#### Key Achievements:

#### Formation of Producer Groups

Through the project 'Skills for Employment and Empowerment of Rural Youth (SEEP)', a total of 20 groups have been formed consisting 15 youth girls in each group. Total number of selected girls is 300 who are from extreme poor families including indigenous community. There are one President, one Secretary, one Cashier and one Entrepreneur in each group. They have been provided with skills training on entrepreneurship and business management for operation of group-based business.

#### Market Oriented Skills Training Provided

Three months long non-residential training on different market demanded trades like Jute bag making, Karchupi, Cap making, Block butik, sweater making etc. have been provided to 210 youth girls of Gaibandha sadar, Palashbale and Gobindaganj upazila of Gaibandha district who are associated with 20 producer groups formed by the 'Skills for Employment and Empowerment of Rural Youth (SEEP)' project. Group wise skills training on selected trades conducted by hired resource persons and they will be provided with start-up capital support by the project.

#### Support Trained Youths for Job Placement

Total 75.youths received three months long residential skills training on various trades e.g. garments sewing machine operation and Electrical Maintenance & Installation in 2020 through different project interventions. These trainings were arranged at GUK training center in Nashratpur, Gaibandha. The trained youths are also facilitated for job placement including salaried job as well as self-employment.

## Training Organised for Capacity Building

Training/orientation for capacity building of people associated with organisation's programmes organised through different project interventions. Project participants including Group leaders of different forums, associations, youth groups and/or different committees received these trainings. A total of 3678 women and men received capacity building training on different issues in this reporting year. Knowledge of participants enhanced by receiving these training and they have been able to play role for development in the community.

#### Strategic Objective-2: Quality Education for All Children

With the purpose to create an enabling environment for education of all children, Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) is implementing different interventions since 1989. Interventions implemented by the organisation in this regard include formal & non-formal primary, secondary and technical education. In addition, GUK also undertake intervention for adult education to reduce illiteracy rate in the poor community. Another key focus of GUK education programme is 'inclusive education'. Currently, the organisation is operating following educational institutions which have created access to education for children from marginalized families.

- 1. Pre-primary School
- NFPE (Non-formal Primary Education) School
- 3. Formal Primary School (Anandolok community schools and others, pre-primary to grade V)
- 4. Secondary School
- Technical & Vocational institution

Moreover, with the purpose to improve capacity and quality of education, GUK is working with 38 government primary schools and providing technical support.

#### Key Achievements:

#### Pre-primary School

GUK is operating 10 pre-primary schools to provide education to the children from poor families in the hard to reach areas in Gaibandha district. Total 274 (girls-179, boys-95) children (age 5+) are getting pre-primary education in a friendly environment in these schools.

#### Non-Formal Primary School

Currently, GUK is operating 9 Non-formal Primary Education (NFPE) centres with its own initiative in Gaibandha district for providing primary education to the drop-out children from marginalized families living in the remote areas of Gaibandha district. A total of 270 (girls-133, boys-137) children are receiving primary education.

#### Formal Primary School

GUK is operating 26 formal primary schools (Anandolok community schools) in the remote areas of Gaibandha, Nilphamari, Panchagarh and Kushtia districts. These schools have been named in the name of renowned personalities of Bangladesh like Begum Rokeya Anandalok School, Kabi Sufia Kamal Anandalok School, Rabindranath Anandalok School, Dr. Mofizar Rahman Anandalok School etc. With the purpose to make rural people aware about language history, Shahid Minar (Monument) have been constructed in the premises of all these schools. Presently, a total of 4385 (girls-2148 boys-2237) children from poor families are receiving primary education (pre-primary to grade V) in these schools.



#### Secondary School

The organisation has established three secondary schools namely Kunderpara Gana Unnayan Academy, GUK Junior High School and Chandershar Secondary school in the remote locations of Gaibandha district. Chandershar secondary school and Kunderpara Gana Unnayan Academy have already been enlisted in the government MPO. More than 1500 students from hard to reach areas are studying in these schools at present.

#### Support to Government Primary Schools

GUK is providing technical support to 38 mainstreaming government primary schools in Gaibandha sador, Fulchari and Gobindaganj upazila for improving their capacity and quality of education. Consequently, dropout rate has been reduced in these schools and quality of education also improved as well.

#### Adults' Literacy

The organisation is implementing 'Basic Literacy Project (64 districts)' project in Sundarganj upazila of Gaibandha district with the support of Ministry of Primary and Mass Education of Bangladesh government. A total of 340 learning centres have been established by the project through which total 20400 illiterate adults (women-10200, men-10200) will receive education on basic literacy.

#### Supplementary Food Support for Anandolok School Children

GUK provided supplementary food support to all children studying in it's Anandolok community primary schools. The children received supplementary food (egg, edible oil and wheat flour) at their home due to closure of schools for COVID-19 pandemic. This support is provided to help them to maintain nutrition so that they can pay heed to study.

#### Health Camp Organised for Anandalok School Children

Health camps are organized for Anandolok school children and they are provided with free medicine support. In some cases, referral support for better treatment is also provided. Family members of school children are also provided health support through these camps. Generally health camps are organized twice a year in each school. However, due to COVID-19 pandemic, in this reporting year, health camps are organisaed once in all Anandalok schools.

#### Case Story

## Harlal Roy Anandolok School — a Hub of Primary Education for Marginalised Children



GUK established a Community Anandolok primary school in the village of Nimoskhana in Domarupazila of Nilphamari district. The school has been named after Harlal Roy Anandalok School. There was less opportunity of primary education for children from marginalized families living in the hard to reach areas in the village of Nimoskhana. Once the children of the village had to become sufferer of child marriage and child labor. Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) has established a formal Community Anandalok primary school in the village in 2013 through NETZ Bangladesh supported education project for ensuring quality education for children from poor families. The

school is situated a suitable environment surrounding by various trees. Presently, a total of 195 children (girls-87, boys-108) are studying in this school from pre-primary to grade-IV.

Teachers of the school are well trained and they are able to teach in innovative ways. There is very pleasant education environment for children. In addition to academic learning, the children participate in different extracurricular activities on regular basis. A Shahid Minar (Monument) has also been established at the premises of the school with the purpose to pay homage to language



martyr and make rural people aware about language history. The School Management Committee (SMC) is very active as initiatives are taken by GUK to enhance capacity of SMC members and raising awareness among parents. As a result of establishing this school, child marriage and child labor has been reduced in that area. It has been a hope of better life of children of the village.

#### Strategic Objective-3: Sustainable Livelihood for Poor and Extreme Poor

#### Case Story

#### A Story of Defeating Poverty

Once Firoza Begum (49) used to work in other's house. Her husband Golzar Hossain used to catch fish and sell in the monsoon and used to go to Dhaka / Tangail to work as a day laborer for other time. In 2014, Firoza Begum was selected as a member of 'Resilience though Economic Empowerment, Climate Adaptation, Leadership and Learning (REE-CALL)' project implementing by GUK in Rowmari and Rajibpur upazila of Kurigram district in collaboration with OXFAM. She Participated in various trainings including income generating activities



organized by the project. Later, as she was interested in milking cow rearing, she became a member of 'Shurjomukhi Milk Producer Group' and received special training on cow rearing from the project. In 2015, she received taka 15,000 from the project and adding her own taka 46,000 she bought a cross-bred cow with a calf for a total of tk. 61,000 (sixty one thousand).

Some days later, she sold the calf for taka 40,000 and took loan of taka 30,000 and again bought another cow with a calf at the cost taka 80,000 (eighty thousand). Again the previous cow gave birth to calf and she gets 40 liters of milk per day on an average from the two cows. With the money from selling milk, she managed to feed the cows and maintained family expenditure well. The number of her cows gradually increased. Currently, she has 6 cows and 8 calves of which present market value is around taka 13,00,000 (one million and three hundred thousand). In addition, 5 cows will give birth again. She is currently getting an average of 40 liters of milk per day from the cows, and earning about taka 1,600 a day. She has been linked with Upazila Livestock office through the project. Now if there is any problem with the cow, she herself contacts the Livestock Officer. She bought 33 decimal of land from the income from selling milk and gave marriage their son and daughter. Her son is currently studying B.A. (Hons) at Kurigram Government College. She has become self-sufficient by overcoming poverty and is living happily with her family. Her dignity has been increased in the family as well as in the society.

Like Firoza Begum, 180 families of flood prone Baishpara village in Bandaber union of Rowmari upazila are currently involved in cow rearing where the total number of cows is 400 and around 1200 liters of milk is being produced daily. Firoza Begum is currently performing as the President of 'Surjomukhi Milk Producer Group'. "We are proud because we are earning, our opinions are valued in the family and in the society, and above all we are living a dignified life," she said.

#### Key Achievements:

#### Capacity Building Training Organised

GUK provides capacity building training to project participants for enhancing their skills on different Income Generating Activities (IGAs). These training include homestaed vegetable gardening, cattle (cow, goat, sheep) farming, poultry rearing, climate adaptive agriculture technology, business plan and management etc. A total of 6970 female and male participants received capacity building training in this reporting year. Knowledge participants are enhanced by receiving these type of training and they can contribute in their family income which help them to have sustainable livelihoods.

## Linkage With Financial Institutions

The organisation sometimes provides start up capital support through the project intervention and sometimes link the beneficiaries with different financial institutions for financial assistance. For this purpose GUK organises workshops with financial service providers including banks. Cosequently, a total of 197 beneficiaries have received loan support from banks and other financial institutions amounting BDT 1,24,39,433.00 (twelve million foru hundred thirty nine thousand and four hundred thirty three) this year.

#### Nursery Establishment for Vine Multiplication of Orange Fleshed Sweet Potato

A total of 150 nurseries have been established for vine multiplication of Orange Flashed Sweet Potato in this reporting period by the 'Development and Delivery of Biofortified Crops at Scale' Project' in 5 upazilas of Gaibandha, Kurigram and Rangpur districts. Four BARI released varieties e.g. BARI SP 4, BARI SP 8, BARI SP 12, BARI SP 15, were produced in the nurseries.





## Established Commercial IGA Villages

GUK has established 6 comercial IGA villages through the project 'Socio Economic Empowerment with Dignity and Sustainability (SEEDS)' in 6 unions of Gaibandha sadar, Fulchari and Gobindaganj upazila under Gaibnadha district. Total 2500 project participants (Self Reliance Group (SRG) members) are directly involved with this initiative collectively by following their Production and sales planning management (PSPM). The SRG members discuss among them about the situation and context and also their ability to promote IGAs and commercial IGA village considering the season and local context following the market demands. Then they select the products for cultivation based on discussion among themselves. Then they analyze the process and support of service providers discussing with the concern. They also make a projection of profit at the end also the roles and responsibility of individuals during the implementing period. To do the initiative smoothly, they prepare a joint plan accordingly. Through this process, the project participants are hopeful to get significant benefit by producing different products collectively.

Orientation Provided on ZWM, i-SME and usage of bio digester to Dairy Enterprises

GUK organized orientation on Zero Waste Model (ZWM), i-SME as well as usage of bio digester for Dairy Enterprises (DEs) developed by the REECALL project in Rowmari and Rajibpur upazila of Kurigram district. Selected 125 beneficiaries (female-121, male-4) received the daylong orientation facilitated by hired resource person from Bangladesh SME Corporation Liited (BSCL). By receiving this orientation the participants have gathered knowledge on i-SME registration, agent banking account opening, zero waste model and finance literacy. Each beneficiary has completed i-SME registration and opened bank account.

## Case Story

#### 'I am on the Way to Defeat Poverty'- Tasmin Ara

'I live with my husband and two children at the village of Nayapara, Hnila in Teknaf upazila of Cox's Bazar district. My husband is a day labor and only the bread earner of our family. He used to earn tk. 500-600 per day before Rohingya influx by which we could manage our family expenditure well. But, after Rohingya influx, my husband's earning reduced to less than tk. 300 per day and we were facing difficulties to maintain family cost. In this circumstance, I was selected as a beneficiary of GUK's "Strengthening resilience and food security of Rohingya refuge es and host communities in Bangladesh Cox's Bazar; Teknaf Upazilla" project.



Then in July 2020, I received 2 days long training on homestead vegetable gardening and also received vegetable seeds from the project. Afterwards, I prepared my 5 decimal of land at my homestead for vegetable gardening using the knowledge learnt from the training. Food Security & Livelihood Officer of GUK facilitated regularly in vegetable cultivation.

I cultivated Sweet Pumpkin, Brinjal, Lady's Finger, Bean and some other vegetables and earned more than tk. 35,000 till October, 2020 after fulfilling my family needs. We are now very much happy because we are getting own produced fresh vegetables which is the source of nutrition and also earning money by selling the additional quantity. We are really grateful to GUK for extending this kind of support for poor families like us" says Tasmin Ara.















#### Strategic Objective-4: Gender Equality and Women Empowerment

Gender equality and women empowerment is a major focus area of GUK's interventions. The organisation is working on gender equality and women empowerment issues from its inception. Gender is a cross cutting issue of GUK and it considers different issues by gender lens during designing or implementation any project.

#### **Key Achievements:**

#### Courtyard Sessions

In this year GUK conducted 1233 courtyard sessions to aware community people on available services for survivors and their rights. A total of 18725 people (Women-14499, Girl-2604, Men-1110, Boy-512) participated in these sessions. The participants have been aware about what to do to prevent COVID-19, Multi-sectoral services for GBV survivors and the Govt. helpline numbers through these sessions.

#### Capacity Development Training and Sessions for Thematic Group

There are 131 different thematic groups (women, girls, men, boys) formed both in Rohingya and host community under 'Community Engagement in GBV response and prevention in Cox's Bazar for Rohingya and host community' project. Purpose of formation of these thematic groups to involve community people in GBV prevention activities. Capacity building training and sessions are conducted for the groups members which include gender equality, life skill, GBV prevention and response, disaster preparedness and early working among community members. development trainings and community sessions conducted on gender equality, life skill, GBV prevention and response, disaster preparedness and early working among community members. In the year of 2020 104 batch training organised and 2479 sessions conducted for 2620 group members.

## Arranged Radio Programming

To aware and prevent Gender Based Violence (GBV), two radio program broadcasted on GBV in this year. One is drama and another one is magazine program. Program broadcasted for both Rohingya and Host communities.

Capacity Development of Community Volunteers and Community Activists on PSEA

To increase knowledge on Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) for humanitarian



workers, capacity development training for Community Volunteers and Community Activist conducted. Total 200 female community volunteers received the training. After receiving the training they have been confident to prevent themselves from sexual exploitation and abuse.

### Capacity Development of Project Staff on PSEA

To ensure the accountability towards the community in prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse, GUK organized training for project staff. total 47 (female–29, male-18) staff members received the training. Through this training staff members have attained a clear concept about sexual violation, sexual exploitation and sexual abuse and know about PSEA guidance. Now, they are more aware about PSEA guidance and maintaining work considering this issue.

#### Organised Capacity Development Training on SASA! Together

In this reporting period, GUK organized 03 batches capacity development training on SASA! Together for humanitarian NGO staff in Cox's Bazar. The Specific objective of the training was to enhance the knowledge and skills on SASA! Together for smooth and quality implementation of SASA! Together community mobilization approach to prevent violence against women. Total 74 participants from CARE Bangladesh, Mukti Cox's Bazar and GUK participated in these training which were facilitated by GBV Social Mobilization Specialist of UNFPA.

#### Case Story

## Moumita Stopped Her Own Child Marriage

Moumita (pseudonym), a teenage girl from Subgram Union of Bogura sadar upazila. She dreams to be a nurse and to serve people. To make her dream true she was very attentive in her studies. But Moumita's poor father was not interested in her education. Ever since she was in eighth grade, her parents have been thinking of marrying her. After hearing this, she told her parents that she would not get married now. But her parents did not care. One day in the evening, they secretly arranged her marriage. Listening to this, Moumita can't think what to



do. On the one hand, the marriage was being arranged at home, on the other hand, Moumita was planning to stop her marriage anyway. Then Moumita could remember the video show in her school organized by GUK im plemented 'Strengthening Access to Multi-Sectoral Public Services for GBV Survivors in Bangladesh (ASTHA)' Project. The video showed the harmful features of child marriage and what to do to prevent child marriage. Helpline numbers and ASTHA project staff numbers were also disseminated through the video. Moumita wrote down those numbers in her notebook at that time. She came out of home at 9:00 pm and phoned the Case Worker of ASTHA project from a nearby shop.

The Case Worker informed the Project Coordinator about the matter. The Project Coordinator suggested Moumita to make a phone call to the helpline numbers that showed by the video for preventing the marriage. Moumita then went back home and told her parents to stop the marriage and if they do not stop, she would call UNO. Hearing this, her parents were frightened and apologized to the boy's parents and stopped the marriage. Moumita is now very happy as the marriage has been stopped. Strong confidence gave her strength to stop her child marriage. She is now studying attentively and dreaming to do a job and help her family. She is also committed to work for stopping child marriage in her locality as well.

## Case Story

'I am Shapla Begum from the village of Char Ratanpur under Uria union in Fulchari upazila of Gaibandha district. I was married in 2007 with Fuad Mia, a day labour in the same village when I was only 14 years old. We had to shift our houses 7 times due to river erosion in last 14 years. We were living struggling with river erosion and flood disaster as well as poverty. My husband sometimes used to go outside in search of work. We were facing much difficulty to maintain family expenditure with my husband's limited income. We had limited skills to cope with disasters. In this circumstance,



I was selected as a participant of GUK implemented 'Strengthening Civil Society and Public Institutions to Address Gender Based Violence and Build Community Resilience to Adopt Climate

Change' project and involved with the 'Gandharaj Women Group' formed by the project in 2017. Then I participated in group meetings regularly and received different trainings including income generating activities arranged by the project which was helpful to increase my knowledge and skills.

Then I took loan of tk. 6,000.00 from the emergency IGA fund managed by the group and bought two goats and cultivated vegetables. Now I have 6 goats. Later, I took loan of tk. 7,000.00 and using my skills gained from the trainings, I cultivated sweet pumpkins and chilli on sandy char in a disaster tolerant manner. I have already earned tk. 15,000.00 by selling sweet pumpkins and chilli after meeting the nutritional needs of our family. I believe that I would be able to earn more tk. 40,000.00 which will be a great support for my family. We are now in the way to overcome poverty. My acceptance in the family as well as in the society has increased.

I am deeply gratitude to GUK for supporting us to find out the way for reducing poverty.'



#### **Adaptation Fair**

Adaptation fair arranged at the premises of Char Kabilpur government primary school in Uria union of Fulchari upazila of Gaibandha district. Objective of this fair is to community mobilization and awareness raising on climate change adaptation and demonstrate climate adaptive technologies for people living in the riverine areas. Project participants from Uria and Fazlupur union demonstrated cluster village, homestead gardening, disaster tolerant crop variety, climate adaptation crops, and new agriculture technologies. There was also a stall from Fulcahri Upazila agriculture department. Officials from different government departments including livestock and agriculture, local government representatives and community people were attended in the fair.

#### Community Capacity Building on CCA and CBCA

In this reporting period GUK organised two days long training on Disaster Management and awareness building on CCA and CBCA. Total 50 CBO members (female-31 and male-19) have received the training which mainly focused on type and causes of disaster, impact, how to get prepare at community and family level, how to access & disseminate early warning, to whom communicate for information and services. As a result of this training knowledge of the community people enhanced and participants were able to better adapt with prolonged floods in 2020 and saved their livestock and livelihood.

#### Organised Village Group Meeting on CC and DRR

Meetings on flood preparedness, recovery, mitigation, climate change adaptation, climate related gender & GBV, disaster and our responsibility, climate resilient IGA activities, services from Govt. service providers, gender based violence during disaster and our responsibilities, women participation in different standing committees of Union praised & Upazila praised etc and COVID -19 awareness are conducted at village group level. Total 450 meetings were organised during this reporting period.





Organised Adaptation Fair at Union Level for Community Mobilization and Awareness Raising

Adaptation fair was organised at Uria & Fazlupur unions in Fulchari upazila under Gaibandha district for community mobilization and awareness raising on climate change adaptation and climate adaptive agriculture practices by the 'Strengthening Civil Society and Public Institutions to Address Gender Based Violence and Build Community Resilience to Adopt Climate Change' Project. Farmers' Groups formed by the Project demonstrated their climate adaptive agriculture activities in the fair. Community people, union parishad representatives and government officials from agriculture, livestock, social services and women & children welfare department were present in the fair. Government officials disseminated information about their services to the community in the fair. Around 300 people gathered in the event.

Training Organised on GBV Related to Climate Change and Disaster for Potential Women Leaders In this reporting period three days long training on Gender Based Violence (GBV) related to climate change and disaster organised in Uria Union and Fuzlupur unions under Fulchai upazila of Gaibandha district. Discussion on women rights, leadership, gender, human Rights, GBV, Gender in Emergencies, domestic violence etc. held in these trainings. Total 60 potential women leaders from the community received the training in two batches. Knowledge of the participants on the issues increased through the training and they are committed to play active role in the society to reduce vulnerabilities.

#### Conduct Participatory Community Risk & Vulnerability Assessment

Total 10 meetings on Participatory Community Risk & Vulnerability Assessment (PVCA) were conducted in this reporting year. A total of 320 participants from the community participated in these meeting. Disaster risks and vulnerability of the communities identified through participatory discussion and group work. Action plan and seasonal plan are prepared through these meetings and presented to the respective Union Parishads to consider these for reducing disaster risks and vulnerability.

#### Operation of Child Protection Hub after Flood

GUK established and operated a total of 08 Child Friendly Spaces/HUBs in Kurigram sadar and Chilmari upazila of Kurigram district. Total 9098 flood affected children were involved with these HUBs. The children get important information about protection and health hygiene. The kids get information how to assure safety from snake biting, drowning and health hazards emerging waterborne diseases during floods. Community volunteers were deployed to perform day to day activities in the HUBs to make the children conscious about safety, causes of risks, and many other issues regarding safety in the time of flood, earthquake, storm, and oppression. The importance of using mask, hand washing and uses of hand sanitizer discussed and demonstrated. Due to COVID-19 pandemic the children were depressed. So, there were arrangement of different playing materials in the Hubs for their recreation.

#### Child Case Management

Vulnerable, underprivileged and extremely poverty stricken 670 children identified through survey and validation by three times monitoring. Considering severity of flood impact, extreme poverty, and women headed, children with disabilities, depressed children for parent's separation, abused etc. total 500 children were listed for case management under 'Provision of WASH and child protection supports to the flood affected people amidst COVID pandemic in Kurigram district during 2020' project. These children are provided educational materials, warm clothes for winter, treatment support and umbrella, shoes, assistive device, spectacles, mattress and fishing net. In addition, 51 children were referred to hospitals and community clinics for treatment.

#### Community Awareness Meeting

Total 160 community awareness meeting on different issues oragnised by 'Provision of WASH and child protection supports to the flood affected people amidst COVID pandemic in Kurigram district during 2020' project. These meetings were arranged at Mother group, Father group, Couple



group where total 1600 community people got awareness messages about child protection, child exploitation and abuse against children. The participants have been aware about causes and remedy measures on child torture, oppression, and harmful behavior against children. Due to COVID-19 pandemic participants in each meeting was limited to 10.

#### Agriculture Labor Sent to Different District for Harvesting Boro Paddy

In collaboration of Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK), Gaibandha District administration, District police and Department of Agriculture Extension arranged to send agriculture labor in Sunamganj, Gazipur, Cumilla, Bogura, Natore and Naogaon districts following the instruction of honorable prime minister to meet up the crisis of agriculture labor for harvesting Boro paddy. A total of 1477 labor were sent through this initiative. Consequently, the farmers of that areas got the opportunity to harvest their paddy in right time, on the other hand, temporary employment opportunity was created for agriculture labor during the pandemic situation.

#### Strategic Objective-6: Health, Nutrition and WASH

## Case Story

#### Double Platform Tube Well- A Source of Safe Water for Flood Affected People

People living in the riverine areas of Gaibandha and Kurigram districts have to experience floods almost every year. During floods they face immense difficulties due to scarcity of safe water as almost all water points are inundated by flood water. They have to use unsafe water for various purposes including drinking and household works during floods. Consequently, they suffer from different water borne diseases. Considering this issue, GUK has installed double platform tube wells through different project interventions to ease the sufferings of the flood affected populations.



More than 300 double platform tube wells have been installed in different community places of flood prone areas of Gaibandha and Kurigram districts. During dry season, heads of these tube wells are set on the lower face and during flood, these are set on the upper face. As a result, affected people from the surrounding areas can collect safe water from these tube wells during flood and normal time as well.

Sajeda Begum, from the village of Pepulia at Fulchari union of Fulchari upazila in Gaibandha district says, "Once we had to use dirty water during floods and suffered from various diseases. But, now we are getting safe water round the year from double platform tube well installed by GUK. Now we are feeling safe from water born diseases".

#### **Key Achievements:**

#### Awareness Raising Initiatives Considering COVID-19

Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) undertook awareness raising initiatives on COVID-19 since 20th of March. In the reporting year, the organization reached over 1000000 people with the awareness message in it's working districts through distribution of leaflets, local newspaper, online TV and mike announcement, demonstration on sneezing and hand washing system.

#### Hand Washing Points/Stations Established

With the purpose to contain the spread of COVID-19, total 75 permanent Hand Washing Points/stations have been installed at different public places including district social service office, Police stations, upazila land office, Banks and market places in Gaibandha, Kurigram and Cox's Bazar districts. In addition, total 20 temporary Hand Washing Points/ stations were established and operated by GUK own initiatives.

#### Distribution of Food Items Considering Child Nutrition

Considering child nutrition, Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) distributed food items (rice, pulse/dal, potato, sugar, suji, salt and soya bean oil among 2270 students' households of GUK operated 23 Anandalok Community primary schools in Gaibandha, Nilphamari, Panchgarh and Kustia districts. Besides, Vitamin-A enriched & Orange Fleshed Sweet Potato have been distributed among 400 families having school going as well as under-5 children. Moreover, food items have been distributed among 5049 vulnerable households in collaboration with different donor agencies and GUK own initiatives.

### **Distribution of Hygiene Materials**

The organisation has distributed hygiene materials (Bucket, bathing soap, detergent powder, sanitary cloth/napkin, masks, hand sanitiser etc.) among 10550 poor households in Gaibandha, Nilphamari, Panchagarh, Kushtia, Cox's Bazar and Satkhira districts with the purpose to prevent the spread of Corona virus.

#### Organize Health Camp

GUK organize free of cost health camps for its Livelihood Microfinance Programme's members and their family members on regular basis. Health camps are conducted by GUK Diagnostic & Physiotherapy Centre. In 2020, total 8 such health camps are organized. Moreover, this year a total of 26 heath camps were organized for children of GUK operated Community Anandalok primary schools and they are provided with prescription medicine support free of cost. In some cases, children are referred for better treatment. In addition, the organisation arranged 2 health camps at Rohigyna camps in Cox's Bazar in collaboration with Spreeha Bangladesh where around 1500 people are provided with treatment and medicine support.

#### Conduction of Health and Hygiene Sessions Considering Corona Virus

With the purpose to make people aware on health and hygiene issues considering highly infectious Corona virus, the Organisation organized 9791 sessions on health & hygiene for project participants in different working locations in 2020. Discussions on personal health & hygiene including hand washing procedure mask wearing, social distancing, menstruation, reproductive health, care of lactating & pregnant mother, proper use of WASH hygiene kits etc. are held during these sessions.















#### Strategic Objective-7: Good Governance and Democratic Environment

Gana Unnayan Kendra (GUK) works with local administration, Local Government Institutions (LGIs), government and non-government service providing Organisation s through advocacy, motivation and civic education with the aim to establish good governance and democratic environment. Government officials and local government representatives are engaged with its field level activities to ensure transparency and accountability.

#### Key Achievements:

#### Election of Upazila Agricultural Producers Association (UAPA)

Upazila Agricultural Producers Association elections held through formal democratic election process in seven upazilas (Gaibandha Sadar ,Fulchuri, Sundarganj, Saghata, Gobindhaganj under Gaibandha district and Rawmari and Rajibpur upazila under Kurigramm district) in arrangement by 'Empowering Smallholders to Strengthen Local Democratic Governance (KHAMATAYAN)' Project. There are 300 Agriculture Producers Groups consisting of 9000 members in these seven upazila formed by the project. Total 7890 members of these groups casted their vote to elect President, Vice Presidents-2, Secretary, Joint Secretary, treasurer, Organising Secretary, Office Secretary and Executive members-3 for each association. The elected UAPA representatives will act on behalf of agriculture producer groups so that they get appropriate services from different service providers and get fair prices of their products.

#### Election of District Agricultural Producers Association (DAPA)

District Agricultural Producers Association elections were organised through formal democratic election process by the 'Empowering Smallholders to Strengthen Local Democratic Governance (KHAMATAYAN)' Project. Two DAPA have been formed in Gaibandha and Kurigram districts respectively. The DAPA members (President, Vice Presidents-2, Secretary, Joint Secretary, treasurer, Organising Secretary, Office Secretary and Executive members-3) are elected by the votes of President and Secretary of 300 Agriculture Producer Groups. The DAPAs will be responsible for ensuring relevant services from service providing organisations for marginal farmers in coordination with the UAPA.



#### Organised Public Meeting

With the purpose to make common people aware about their rights and sensitize respective government officials/departments so that people can get proper services, the organisation arranges public meeting at community level. Respective government officials, local government representatives and community people participate in these meeting events actively where officials brief about their services through question-answer sessions directly to the community people. In the year of 2020, 2 public meeting events arranged where around 500 people participated.

#### Farmers Dialogue/ Gathering

Two Farmers Dialogue organised in 2020 at Uria, Fuzlupur, Kamarjani and Mollarchar unions under Fulchari and Gaibandha sador upazilla. Government officials from agriculture, livestock, social welfare, women welfare, LGIs departments attended in these dialogue. Officials from agriculture and livestock department answered questions raised by participated farmers about their services.

#### Organised Legal Camps

GUK organises legal camps with the aim to provide legal advice/support to poor people who become sufferer of various type of violence. The legal camps also aims to raise awareness on different issues like domestic violence, early marriage, gender based violence etc. In the reporting year total 9 legal camps were arranged and a total of 937 (female-571, male-366) people participated in these events.

#### Facilitation in Organising Arbitration (Salish)

With the aim to ensure social justice for disadvantaged poor men and women, the Organisation facilitates human rights groups in organising ideal arbitration (salish) at community level. A total of 65 Adarsho Salish were arranged in 2020 where 51 complaints are settled and the rest 14 sufferers are linked with government legal aid support.

#### Formation of Human Rights Groups

The organisation has formed and revitalized different human rights groups at union and upazila level in Gaibandha district. These are Manobadhikar Sangrakkhan Parishad, Manobadhikar Nari Samaj, Manobadhikar Natto Parisha, Manobadhikar Lawyers Forum, School Theatre Group, Samajik Uddakta Dal etc. Members of these human rights groups are actively playing significant role for human rights protection. Regular meetings are arranged with members of these human rights groups. In the year of 2020, a total of 52 meetings arranged where discussion on human rights situation, child marriage, divorce, dowry, violence, day observation, human chain & rally, cooperation to sufferer etc. are held.





#### Memorandum Submission after Fact Finding on Human Rights Violation

A human rights task force has been formed by GUK in Gaibandha district which is working for fact finding on human rights violation incidents. The task force collect information and submit memorandum to concern authority if any incident of violence occurs in the catchment area so that the sufferer gets justice. In the year of 2020, upon fact finding the task force submitted 8 memorandums to local administration, police administration and other service providers on different incidents.




## Micro Finance & Economic Empowerment:

GUK is operating Livelihood Microfinance Programme (LMP) for economic empowerment of disadvantaged people especially women through inclusive financing. It is the core programme of the Organization. It was initiated in line with other development projects with the aim of bringing sustainable development in the lives of women and disadvantaged. Currently, the LMP is being operated in 8 districts under Rangpur and Rajshahi divisions through its 53 outlets. Around 60500 households are currently involved with this programme and among them 52552 households have received loan support for different income generation activities. GUK LMP provides three types of financing options for its group members. These are 1. Jagoron (Awakening), 2. Agrosor (Move forward- a programme for enterprise development) and 3. Sufolon (Promoting livestock and agriculture). A total of BDT 723,47,21,000.00 have been disbursed as loan under above three components so far. In addition, GUK also provide loan for house construction to its group members and skills development loan to trained youths for self-employment.


- Jagoron is the name of a credit instrument of GUK LMP to initiate household based enterprise
  development. GUK LMP extended its financial services for the rural poor through this programme
  from 1991. Under this programme, borrowers are encouraged to undertake family-based income
  generating activities. Major sectors covered under Jagoron are crops, livestock and small trade.
  Duration of this type of loan is 1 year and borrowers can repay by weekly/monthly installment.
- Agrosor is an effort to develop Micro Enterprise and contribute to employment generation
  and economic development. The programme was developed to extend its financial services to the
  members who are undertaking economic activities that require bigger amount of capital. Borrowers
  can take loan for the maximum period of 1.5 years and repay by weekly/monthly installment.
- Sufolon is the seasonal agriculture loan product which is to provide support for different agricultural activities mainly for crop cultivation and beef fattening. The highest loan ceiling is 75,000 taka. Maximum duration of the seasonal agriculture loan is 6 months and the farmers repay the total loan amount by a single installment after harvesting the crops/selling the product. The provision of the loan repayment in a single installment after the sale of the product has made it very popular among the borrowers. So far, a total of 20057 marginal farmers have received agriculture loan amounting taka 97,81,92,000.00 through Sufolon.

#### Case Story

#### A Tale of Struggling with Poverty

Shahin Mia (46), the 2<sup>nd</sup> child of late Nuruzzaman from the Paikpara village of Sadar upazila of Rangpur district. Late Nuruzzaman was a mason and it was very difficult for him to maintain the family of 12 members with his limited income. So, he could not make his children educated. Shahin started to learn tailoring in a shop just after completing grade three. Shahin Mia worked as a tailor in others shop for long days. He got married at the age of 23. Shahin Mia started to dream to have a own tailoring shop. Afterwards, he rented a small



shop in the market adjacent to Binodpur Railgate in Rangpur and started tailoring. His wife used to help him. Shaheen's new path begins. In the meantime, shahin becomes father of one daughter and two sons. He already has given marry to his daughter. He could not study due to poverty but he us determined to educate his sons. His elder son has already completed secondary education and the younger son completed primary education.

Once Shahin Mia was thinking to start a clothing business beside of tailoring. But he did not have required money for that. In this circumstance, he came to know about GUK's loan facilities. Then contacted with GUK staff and took loan of tk. 20,000.00 from Rangpur branch in 2017 to invest his tailoring business. start the business. Afterwards, he took loan again amounting tk. 30,000.00 by which he bought new sewing machine and started clothing business in 2018. After repaying the loan he again took tk. 80,000.00 and bought sewing machines as well as expanded the clothing business. Once the loan is repaid, he again took tk. 100,000.00 and invested in business. At present there are 6 sewing machines at Shahin's shop and alongside his wife, 5 persons are working on contractual basis. Presently, his monthly income is around tk. 30,000.00 from which after repaying installment of loan, he is maintaining his family expenditure very well. His dignity has been increased in the locality. He has plan to expand the business more in future.
