The Bezalel Academy of Arts and Design, Jerusalem has joined forces in an International Training Network ITN HERILAND with partner institution TU Delft, the Netherlands. HERILAND is a pan-European research and training network funded by the European Union's Horizon 2020 research and innovation program under the Marie Sklodowska-Curie grant agreement No 813883.

The HERILAND program began in October 2019, with two Ph.D. Candidates recruited as Early Stage Researchers with Bezalel Academy of Arts and Design. This three-year program ended in September 2022 with many interesting collaborations, master classes, study tours, conferences, and publications of the research and findings.

During the three-year program, our researchers were based in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, and Haifa. Though we faced some difficulties due to the Covid pandemic, thanks to technology and our strong professional network, our researchers had the opportunity to carry out fieldwork and meetings with our experts, professors, and institutional partners in Tel Aviv-Yafo and Acre, across the three years and when the situation was convenient.

Theme:

DEMOCRATIZATION



Introduction of HERILAND project by VUA, ESRs and coordinators and participating universities was organized, where each participating university presented the works undertaken in past and their role and contribution towards this project. The 14 ESRs presented their past academic and work experiences and their ambitions and ideas towards the individual project.

An ice- breaker assignment and interactive session on the National Military Museum, Soesterberg was organized to introduce the cultural landscape of Netherlands, and open the floor to discussion about modern architecture in a former airbase and natural heritage within the site and to debate on the apparent perceptions of users and visitors.


This work package trains ESR's to identify how approaches have evolved, to critically examine them and to test and innovate best practice models, procedures and tools. The master class sessions aimed at introducing the current concepts, tools and procedures for democratization in the access to and definition, appropriation, management and planning of heritage.

The ESRs were introduced to different theories and principles of democratization and public participation in planning processes.

An interactive game to demonstrate the theory and effectiveness of 'Democratic approach' in decision making was devised by the ESRs at TU Delft.

Intriguing revelations came out through the discussions about planning process in heritage conservation, urban renewal and casting of votes and reaching consensus. An analysis of effectiveness and value of votes of different stakeholders affecting the decision process showed that how consensus may or may not be reached.

This was an important aspect of learning, as planning process in heritage management may be highly influenced by economics and the political preferences, hence a crucial aspect for all the ESRs to consider in their individual projects.

A visit to the World Heritage city of Akko, north of Israeli was undertaken with Prof. Michael Turner and the Ph.D. candidates (Bezalel Academy of Arts and Design in consortium with TU Delft) Komal and Ana, to get introduced to the cultural heritage and also discuss the heritage and city management practices, tourism activities with the primary stakeholders.

The project is under process.




Figure 1: An extract of the GIS map of Jerusalem city, with selected layers on display of historic properties and neighborhoods having documentation available. This GIS is available freely and encouraged to be used for planning purposes in the city of Jerusalem.

An exhibition on Ottoman Jerusalem at Kadir Haas University, Istanbul, was held in November, which showcased archival documents and photographs. This was curated by the research partner of the Jerusalem Archives project, Prof. Yonca Erkan.

The exhibition is envisaged to travel to Jerusalem in March 2020.

The Jerusalem Archives Project aims at generating a large database of archives (photographs, maps, and 3D models) digitally linked to the GIS of the city and experts to develop a web-based application to make this data available for the citizens, planners, and practitioners, and aid in decision-making processes. The Jerusalem Urban Design Center will be one of the secondments and case studies for the Ph.D. candidate for her research 'Datascape methods for heritage planning professionals' aiming to inculcate this project and its findings and include innovative methods of using digital interventions for planning processes in collaboration with the Municipality.

The Jerusalem Municipality with its Urban Design Center (JUDC) and the GIS unit facilitates the management of new development and provides guidelines and critical support to maintain the urban design guidelines in the historical city of Jerusalem. The center also holds training sessions in GIS for its workers as well students. The JUDC is one of the potential secondment for the PhD candidate to explore the potential of use of digital tools for urban heritage management along with its collaboration with the Jerusalem Archives Project.



A physical model of the city of Jerusalem (Partial) used as a reference for assessing the new development projects and its effects on the urban fabric. This model is now available in 3d digital format and is extensively used as an assessment tool. This aspect will be explored further in the research collaboration.

Meeting with Chief Knowledge Officer Mr. Zohar Sharon

The meeting was held at the office of Mr Sharon in the presence of Prof. Michael Turner. The aim was to introduce the PhD thesis which targets the use of digital media for informing planning process. Mr. Sharon gave an overview of how the DigiTel mobile application that his office is working on has been a model for engaging the citizens in an effective manner and also how the rust factor between the citizens and the City managers impacts this process. He shows great inclination towards engaging in the PhD thesis for the case study of Jaffa which can help data collection for various attributes and determinants and the how various departments in the Tel Aviv Municipality can supply data critical for this analysis.

Dr. Arch. Ona Vileikis is an architect and heritage specialist, with ample work and research experience abroad. Ona is currently a research fellow at the Institute of Archaeology, University College London (UCL) and the Central Asian Archaeological Landscapes (CAAL) project. She is also postdoctoral researcher at Carleton Immersive Media Studio (CIMS) at Carleton University and has worked in the past on Silk Roads CHRIS a geospatial CMS tailor-made for the UNESCO nomination.

Ona is interested in exploring how technologies can be used for the management of cultural heritage. She was invited to conduct a workshop and share her experiences of curating projects on World Heritage nominations, geospatial content management systems and share good practices. She demonstrated her current project at UCL IoA of the Central Asian Archaeological Landscapes (CAAL) where satellite image analysis, incorporating existing data sets, and scanning monument records and archives is being analyzed. The meeting also saw presence of team working on Jerusalem Archives project, Government officials from the PMO working in the Heritage and planning department. This was a great opportunity to exchange knowledge and also learn from the ongoing and past projects that Ona demonstrated over period of two days. She also spoke on her work experience with the online platform of Arches with multilingual thesauri, manuals and procedures for digitization and metadata.

The Cultural Landscapes workshop was a great opportunity to delve into this fascinating subject hand in hand with two professionals in the matter: Patricia O'Donnell and Nuria Sanz. Visits to different sites in Israel were organized to understand the numerous and varied landscapes this country has to offer. Being the host of the area where agriculture started it gifts us with a wide range of flora, fauna, rooted history and multicultural heritage.

The invitees gave two interesting presentations during the colloquium, Patricia explained the role of cultural landscapes for sustainable development, emphasizing the importance of integrating culture for rural and urban conservation. During her extent career in international agencies such as ICOMOS and IFLA, she has built an integrated vision of development and sustainability, being the overlap of biological diversity and cultural diversity the base of her discourse, which encourages to look beyond silos and start talking about assets and solutions. Nuria is the former director of UNESCO field office in Mexico, and she is currently working at FAO in a joint project with UNESCO. She is passionate about cultural heritage beyond the WH conventions. Having worked on the nomination of the Qhapaq Ñan Inca road, involving 6 countries, multi-level stakeholders, and various types of intangible and tangible heritage; she advocates for culture as a driver for sustainability, as well as interdisciplinary collaboration among agencies and themes to actually have a positive impact in people's lives.

The workshop finalized with the visit to Ramat Ha Nadiv, as a synthesis of the week. This landscape showcases how agriculture, nature and people can coexist and how research is essential to learn about people's presence and their perceptions of the landscape. A discussion among different Israeli authorities and the invitees served as an ideal platform to discuss Israel's position towards cultural landscapes and broadened the possibilities for innovative and intersectoral collaborations and approaches.

Theme: Changing Environment

This course introduced doctoral students in heritage planning to overarching themes concerning heritage and changing environments. The course also presented different approaches to case study methodology and survey techniques. The participants were presented to different responses to change in the environment both on a practical and theoretical level. The overarching question is "How can heritage professionals respond to environmental change". Examples covering a wide variety of situations, combining questions about the past with questions about the future were discussed. In the specific case of post-industrial-landscapes, the participants were made familiar with two different perspectives connecting pasts with future, those of heritage ecologies and human rights.



Landscapes are perceived as spatial and temporal palimpsests of memories and meanings, socially constituted and continuously redefined and co-designed. In the planning of landscapes for the future, landscapes of heritage are often considered building blocks and sources of inspiration with which to guarantee place making, community cohesion and economic sustainability, all vital elements in several UN Sustainability Development Goals.

In this Masterclass, the ESRs were introduced to practical issues and methods relating to how heritage shapes places and landscapes. Training focused on qualitative and quantitative approaches to mapping heritage in landscapes, and the extent to which it is possible to integrate information from different sources.

Launch of OurWorldHeritage Initiative: A civil society movement to mobilize, to renew and reinforce heritage protection for the next 50 years.

"OurWorldHeritage aims to protect heritage, support sciences-based decision-making and engage civil society."

Doctoral candidate: Komal Potdar and core team member of the Transformational Impacts of Information Technology and Policy team.

This program was officially launched in 2020, to initiate a yearlong debate in 2021 addressing key issues. The policy document to be submitted to the World Heritage Centre, UNESCO in 2022 in underway and part of the 50th anniversary of the 1972 World Heritage Convention.

OurWorldHeritage intends to reach this objective through:

- 1. Integrate effective participation and dialogue in World Heritage activities and ensure a balanced geo-cultural and bio-regional representation;
- 2. Encourage and influence reform in World Heritage implementation processes and expand the role of civil society by improving accountability through transparent assessment practices;






Managing multiple identities through assessment and evaluation of design scenarios: Jerusalem case-study of Lifta. The increasing complexity of contemporary urban environments brings up not only the necessity to broaden the participation and engagement of multiple stakeholders in regeneration-conservation projects, but also to develop evaluation frameworks that monitor the process and outcomes, and eventually re-evaluate and refine the initial project goals. This becomes especially crucial when dealing with contested and complex historic environments, where the existence of multiple identities translates into a different sense of place belonging, heritage values, and use of public space. Thus, through the case study of Lifta, this masterclass focused on alternative narratives, interventions, and evaluations in multi-cultural environments.

The case study of Lifta was first introduced including:

- i. A historic overview of major developments through time;
- ii. The current context;
- iii. Different intervention scenarios that have been proposed for Lifta, namely:

REtire	Let go of it and forget. Let nature take over it –To be addressed with a nature and environmental approach.
REmember	Preservation as an archaeological site –To be analysed with an archaeological approach.
REuse	Independent living town –To be evaluated through the NGO, tourism lens
RE-link	Integrate the area as a living neighbourhood –Applying a municipal perspective.
RE-develop	Process of gentrification to generate resources needed for the redevelopment of Lifta.

The participants were divided into teams, each linked to one stakeholder community group: Development Agency (corporate), Save Lifta (an NGO including original Palestinian owners), City Neighnourhood Planners (Jerusalem municipality), Urban Biosphere -Jerusalem Green Fund (an NGO). The teams utilised the background study, consultation with the representatives of the Municipality and Planners from community centers to assess the ground realities, challenges and methods of functioning. The review of the value statement included in Lifta's Tentative Listing as World Heritage was studied as a preliminary assessment of the Intervention scenarios from the perspective of each stakeholder community.



Participants completed preparatory readings assignments on theory, tools & research methodologies, and context, through another case study central to the Master Class. Activities included several keynote lectures on concepts and methods related to design and evaluation in the context of contested historical environments; a colloquium where a panel of experts debate issues related to the Master Class; team work activities on the case study including online meetings with stakeholders, team discussions and exploration of documentation and data; presentation sessions, including of final results in front of a panel of international experts.

HERILAND Masterclass #5: Digital Transformations and Heritage Planning

Masterclass outcomes:

- Discuss governance models for, and governance models with digital data, services and tools.
- Explain the impact of the increasing availability of digitised data and information on local/ regional and global communities that form around heritage sites and practices.
- Design and run a multi-stakeholder participatory workshop for heritage planning supported by a digital map tool.
- Evaluate the main insights from the Master class for their own research and professional development.

The tremendous growth and dispersion world-wide of digital data sets, tools and services have a transforming impact on how humans relate to one another and their living environment, including their heritage. It has also given rise to innovative digital methods (e.g. citizen science, gamification, digital twinning and datascaping) that provide new opportunities to recognise, analyse and visualise how citizens and other stakeholders value the current heritage landscapes and involve them in the planning of the future.

The first part of the Master Class addressed these fundamental questions:

• What were the key features of these "digital transformations" of society, and what drives these changes?

• What were the implications for governance? How to govern digital transformations with a view on ethics and fairness (not only benefitting Big Data giants like Google, Facebook, Amazon and Apple)? But, also, how to utilise digital data sets, tools and services to govern society and the living environment in a more evidence-based, transparent and participatory way?

The second part looked more closely at the relevance of digital methods to heritage planning. The participants brought examples related to their own work to the Master Class with the aim to map out together how digital approaches can transform existing, and give rise to new lines of research and professional practice.

The third part was dedicated to hands-on training in designing and running a multistakeholder participatory heritage planning workshop supported by a digital map tool (Geodesign). The VUA teams shared its experience with this research methodology in various planning contexts. Then, the participants together applied and evaluated it in the context of a heritage landscape in Apulia, in the South of Italy.

The Master Class concluded by a round-table discussion in which the participants reflected on the major insights derived for their own research and professional development.

- How can they take digital methods on board in their further research?
- What skills are needed to apply these methods in research and practice?

The Master Class ended with a discussion on views and take-aways and methods of incorprating the digital turn within research and pracitce.




The **Rome Living Lab** is a key part of the HERILAND training programme. The aim of the Lab was to bring all ESRs and their theoretical knowledge and practical skills together and to make a collaborative effort in tackling a specific planning and design assignment. In this effort, the team operationalized and testes all different (inter)-disciplinary and sectorial perspectives and skills in interaction with each other.

Case study: The study area to work on was situated along the Tiber River between the Testaccio/Marconi and the Ostiense San Paolo/Portuense districts;

The objective was to prepare a Master Plan for the reconnection and regeneration of the two riverbanks, in which cultural heritage has a central role. The challenge will be to jointly carry out analyses (e.g. area descriptions, interviews, value assessments or archival research) and prepare concrete plans and recommendations to guide the local spatial (heritage) transformations. To that aim, the ESRs cooperated with public and private stakeholders, including citizen groups. They were also responsible for communicating and disseminating the results to the stakeholders during the final presentation.

Ongoing Research (August- December 2021)

In the context of her PhD research, Ana J. Yarza has conducted a series of interviews with stakeholders working from Acre. The aim of this fieldwork was to better understand the perceptions of these actors about the city, as well as to challenge them to evaluate a series of scenarios proposed in different areas of Acre. The interviewees ranged from Israeli Antiquities Authority (IAA) staff to members from the civil society. The diversity of views and openness shown by the interviewees positively contribute to the PhD research.

This project kickstarted in 2020 to ensure in situ conservation of important highly diverse species of important crop wild ancestors. The project aims to identify Crop Wild Relatives (CWR) hotspots that will be the basis for proposing a World Heritage Tentative Listing linking culture and nature, and creating management instructions for area-based conservation.

The program was divided into two main parts: the first two days included tours to different cultural landscapes all over the country; and the last day focused on a series of presentations by all the participants and invitees, and a final discussion, the main outcome of the workshop.

ESR Ana Jayone participated in the field visit and the discussions in this project and contributed to the report.

Bezalel Academy of Art and Design, Jerusalem, in coordination with TU Delft and Liebling Haus – The White City Center, Tel Aviv, organized a final dissemination event of a three-year research project on urban heritage and spatial planning funded by HERILAND, a pan-European research training network and innovation program under the Marie Curie grant agreement and EU Horizon 2020.

Secondments

Within the HERILAND program, the researchers are encouraged to take up secondments at other HERILAND partner institutions, notably outside academia, to put theory into practice and increase job opportunities. These secondments offer extra facilities and training options.

Liebling Haus, Tel Aviv-Yafo (White City Center)

Liebling Haus, Tel Aviv Historic Preservation Department, Tel Aviv-Yafo Municipality was one of the institutional partners with Bezalel Academy and hosted Komal for her secondment from April-September 2022. During this period, she had full access to the library, research rooms, and lectures and had interactions with the team engaged in various activities for heritage awareness, dissemination as well as art exhibitions. As Liebling Haus has many associated partners and architects, this was helpful for Komal to connect to the experts and architects in the field of architecture, heritage, and social studies. The following is the gist of activities conducted by her during the secondment:

- i. **Conducting ongoing research on grounded theory analysis** on 'Datascaping historic urban landscapes: An operative tool for sustainable and resilient planning and assessments. Case of Jaffa, Israel' required her to conduct expert and stakeholder interviews. It was possible to connect to experts associated with the Liebling Haus in an individual capacity.
- ii. 1-week intensive workshop with students of Bezalel Academy, Department of Architecture with Elad Horn and Ariel Peremen

Title: Critical inquiry of urban heritage and Digital Humanities- A Spatial Humanities Approach to Architectural Historiography.

In historical disciplines, spatial humanities research uses Geographical Information Systems to manage, present, and analyze spatial data, as well as explore how digital quantitative tools can enhance the scope of knowledge and understanding of historical phenomena beyond the range of "conventional" historical sources (such as non-digital archival documents). In this workshop, we examined diverse contemporary methodologies for quantitative and historical trend analysis in order to analyze, describe and explain urban and architectural development processes. For this purpose, we built historical and contemporary geographic information systems based on aerial photographs, and historical mapping; review historiographical discourse based on quantitative content analysis of textual data, and examined various quantitative and spatial indices based on integrated knowledge systems (e.g.: proximity, density, prices and demographics). The historical/ archival maps and photos were analyzed based on extensive attributes of the UNESCO Historic Urban Landscape Recommendations, which is important for mapping and connecting with the development processes and issues.

The test case for the workshop was the city of Tel Aviv-Jaffa, where we explored and identified patterns of development throughout history using digital tools while relying on existing data. We asked what factors influence urban development, and distinguish recurring trends beyond a specific period or location. With the help of GIS and data science tools and a subject of their interest, the students examined how spatial phenomena have developed throughout history.

At the end of the workshop, the students were equipped with sufficient skills in order to collect and analyze historical and contemporary data and present it through digital and traditional means and reach new historical or future insights. The final presentation was attended by Sharon Golan, Program Director, Liebling Haus; Dr. Jeremie Hoffmann, Head of Preservation Department, Tel Aviv- Yafo Municipality; Dr. Noah Rubin, cultural geographer and a town planner, Bezalel Academy. The students presented their outcomes of the intensive 5-day projects and were engaged in a fruitful discussion.

iii. Dissemination event in collaboration between Bezalel Academy, TU Delft, and Liebling Haus. Title: New Approaches to Urban Heritage Futures - the Case of Tel Aviv – Yafo

Bezalel Academy, in coordination with TU Delft and Liebling House – The White City Center in Tel Aviv, hosted a public event for our three-year research project on urban heritage and spatial planning funded by the HERILAND program.

We aimed to present new ideas and tools, and propose innovative strategies to create sustainable future landscapes, based on deep history and spatial heritage approaches. The event was planned in two parts:

- Ongoing doctoral research was presented focusing on Tel Aviv- Yafo as a case study
- Second session was a panel response and discussion of experts engaged in urban conservation, planning, design, and academics.

The discussions addressed the following questions:

- What do sustainable urban heritage futures look like: socially, economically, and ecologically?
- What important lessons can history teach us, to guide future practices and interventions?
- Which new methods and tools can support sustainable urban heritage futures?



The event was attended by around 30 participants which included professionals, researchers, academics, and students.



Israel Antiquities Authority (Acre)

During the HERILAND research program, Ana J. Yarza did a secondment with the Israeli Antiquities Authority (IAA) in the city of Acre. The collaboration with the IAA has been and still is highly enriching as the Old City architect and the Acre office staff are really engaged with the work in this UNESCO World Heritage city.

Since the beginning of her research in October 2019 various activities have been carried out with the IAA. On a monthly basis, Ana joined the Conservation Committee of Akko, a platform where different stakeholders in the city discuss and approve projects in the old city. Moreover, the IAA shared material and data related to the old city's heritage, essential for this PhD research. This was not only useful for the study but it was also reviewed and the results were shared back to the IAA. Finally, in the last months of the secondment, the Old City architect and the researcher have been jointly writing a paper on Acre, focusing on the old city's buffer zone. With the intention of bridging theory and practice, their paper has both a theoretical approach and also a practical one, as it explores the possibilities of materializing the paper results into a real project for the city.

HERILAND hosted the international conference on Cultural Heritage and Spatial Planning, organized by the EU Marie Curie Innovative Training Network HERILAND. The conference was successful with over 200 participants with varied backgrounds in practice, academics, and research.

Day 1-2: Training sessions on Historic Urban Landscape

The aim of this training was to introduce participants to the concepts and guidelines of the HUL recommendations and methods of Impact Assessment.

- Present the case study of the Amsterdam World Heritage site and elaborate on the attributes of values. This is primarily to explain the narrative of the HUL and its attributes and values beyond the boundaries.
- The issues: Tourism and cultural infrastructure and associated management issues. In the city, the economic model of monoculture mass tourism has seriously affected the city center. Due to the corona crisis, the government developed new policies and action plans to revert the imbalance between residents and tourists. The participants were required to assess the attributes and their relevance to various scales and propose a strategy for developing the cultural infrastructure for the historic urban landscape. (World Heritage site, buffer zone, city level, regional level)

The training included: Small group work around the case study / key challenge, to define a HUL- SAP, a strategic action plan, applying the HUL approach, and present it in a 2 min pitch "Preparation required for the workshop: To assess the HUL attributes with respect to developmental challenges (Infrastructure, social, economic) for the selected case study and assess the impact on the HUL Attributes."
