For Voices, live interactive Conductor and Electronics





Duration c.a. 15 - 17 min

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Performance instructions.

The score is written on fifty two cards, thirteen for each voice. The cards should be sorted in numerical order from 1 - 13. Each card should be performed repeatedly until the conductor gives a sign of change. Then each performer should finish up his musical material and go to the next card. There is no need to rush to finish a card when the conductor gives a sign and there is even a good idea to take a short rest with silence between cards. Most important is that there is a musical overlap between the cards. When a card is finished the performer should let it drop on the floor with theatrical gesture.

The conductor conducts card changes by raising his hand an pointing out fingers from one to ten. After that he has to give a sign from one to three to indicate eleven, twelve and thirteen.

It is totally to the conductor to indicate with hand gestures total volume and dynamic levels between groups. If the conductor decides he can give the performers a sign of rest (silence) or to move away from the microphone to lessen the feed into the computer system.

The conductor starts the piece by pointing at each performer one by one or a group and he ends the piece the same way.

It is very important for every performer to listen carefully how the computer responds to his musical material and the performer has a full right to improvise if he feels a good respond. The same way he can stop if the respond is not to his liking.

System requirements

- 7 Loudspeakers
- 2 Audio-cards for 7 in and outs RME Fireface 800 preferred
- 7 Microphones (Cardioid or even Super-cardioid Condenser)
- Personally like DPA.7 Microphone stands
- 1 Mac Pro OS X 10.8 or higher (if not using my own laptop) Ableton Live v. 8.4 or later with Max4Live (if not using my own).
- 1 Mixing console

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Instructions

Singers should be staged around the audience in group of two,

each group under one of the seven loudspeakers.

The conductor stays on a podium in the middle of the space. Sound moves from each voice group to the loudspeaker stationed above and

is heard in stereo from left to right thus forming a sense of surround sounding atmosphere. The audience stand on the floor and are free to move during the performance in order to hear different sonority.
