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In the Moment Planning

A few parents have been asking about the way that we plan at Hulme Hall Pre-School. As the development of your child is at the heart of everything we do, we prefer to use a combination of adult-led and child-led planning which is also known as 'In the Moment Planning'.

What is In the Moment Planning?

"Let the children choose what to do, join them and support them in their pursuits. Then write up what has happened."

The natural desire of children to learn and explore is at the basis of this process. Instead of holding their hand through a variety of pre-set activities, we allow them to find their own interests, and use this to enhance and build upon their existing knowledge.

It is often broken down into three stages:

The Child's Spark – This is when the child first shows an interest in something. There should be an air of fascination around the object and concentration in what they are now doing.

The Teachable Moment – The Practitioner will notice this and approach the child. This is the opportunity to extend their interest, by asking open-ended questions and considering ways to apply this interest to other options within the environment.

The Documentation – At a later date, we document the observation, including *the spark*, the *teachable moment* and what we did *next*. This helps us map out each child's interests and plan an environment that works for them.

It is an effective way of engaging the children that fits well within the Early Years Framework and leads to a more a inquisitive learner.
