A Safety Reminder

I would like to remind parents and pupils of the need for pupils to wear face coverings in corridors and communal areas around the school. This week, we have had a significant number of pupils each day reporting to the office as they have forgotten to bring one in. I would respectfully ask parents to ensure that your child has their face covering with them each day as they leave for school.

On a similar theme, pupils are reminded that they must wear a face covering when using public transport to and from school and should refrain from mixing with other pupils from outside their year group bubble. I know this is very difficult for them but please remind your child that the guidance is in place to minimise the risk of transmission of Covid-19.

United Against Bullying

Anti-bullying Week Assembly 16th-20th November 2020

As Assistant Headteacher responsible for Safeguarding and Pastoral care in school, I often get asked by prospective parents whether any bullying goes on at Hulme Hall. My response is honest, considered – but always the same. 'Where there are children, there will be bullying.'

We are not afraid to talk about bullying here. It's not a topic that we brush over or 'tick box' once a year during a national campaign, but a conversation that we have daily with our young people to ensure that they are safe, happy and secure in school. Do be reassured though that deep–rooted or repeated bullying, for us, is uncommon! This is because our 'caring, nurturing, achieving' ethos is at the heart of everything we do in school and we encourage our pupils to recognise and aspire towards these qualities.

In any organisation, however, where a diverse group come together, there will always be instances and situations where children behave unreasonably towards one another. There will always be occasions where pupils 'feel' bullied. So, for us, every week is anti-bullying week.

If a pupil reports bullying or feels bullied, or threatened, targeted or isolated we will investigate. In most cases, these instances occur between friendship groups. Pupils can feel pressure from a friend who goes too far with 'banter' and singles them out for teasing 'just for a laugh.' Like all schools we get the fallout from social media disagreements that start in the evening or at the weekend and spill into school. Very often, the person who is perceived to be the bully is not aware of the consequences of their actions.

Bullying in any form is unacceptable and whilst we investigate, our main focus will always be to educate. Children need to learn social cues. How to speak to each other with respect. How to resolve their differences without causing pain, worry, anxiety or upset.

As with anything, learning these skills doesn't happen overnight!

My message at this week's assembly was clear. That whilst teachers and parents do play an important part in dealing with reports of bullying, it is actually the pupils themselves that possess the power to make a difference! Put into practice the skills that the NSPCC suggest and that I spoke about:

Build your resilience – with **Passive Coping**. Walk away. Ignore, and when the dust settles, try to reconnect in a positive way. We

all say and do things we shouldn't, so sometimes we need to forgive and forget.

Use **Communicative Coping** to tell your peers / 'friends' how their behaviour is making you feel. Talking (not shouting!) or writing it down for them to read may be useful.

Proactive or Problem-solving Coping may make a difference. Block a number; delete the contact from your phone book; report any persistent cyberbullying to the social media platform; inform your parents; put time and space between you and the perpetrator; move to a different social group.

That said, always let your teachers know if you are struggling to resolve your differences, or if you are unhappy, as we are always there to help.

Brilliant Books


Congratulations to Willow in Year 7 who has just published her first book at the age of 11!
