Cameron Zandi came to Hulme Hall in 2006 and left in 2010 after finishing his GCSEs. He went on to study A levels at Aquinas College in Applied Business and Government and Politics, gaining two As and a B which enabled him to go to Newcastle Business School where he studied Business Management. In his second year, he was placed on an internship for four months at Pareto Law, which is where he went on to work. His current role is Senior Business Development Manager.

What was pupil life like at Hulme Hall?

Hulme Hall was all about inclusivity and support, both academically and pastorally.
