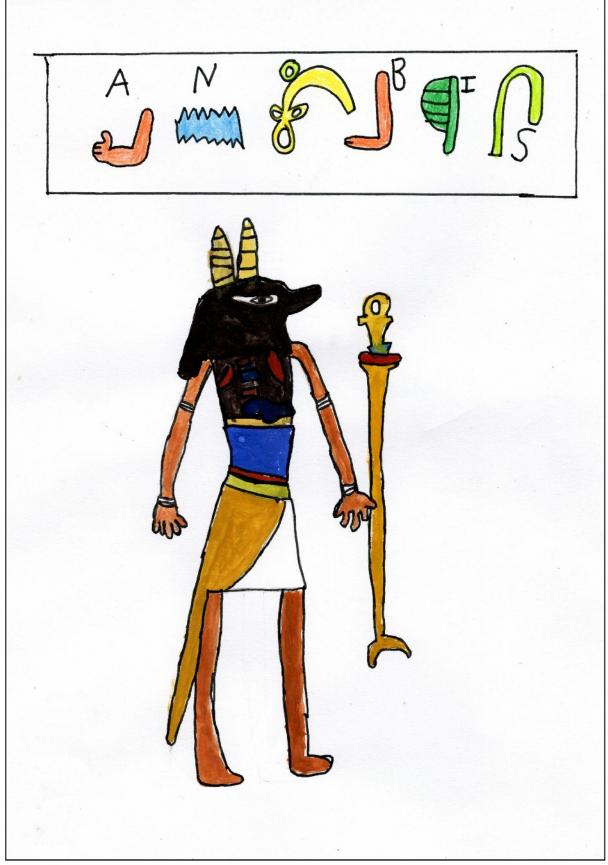

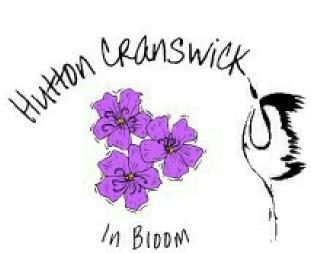

The maintenance of the ground beds and containers has continued in the village throughout the summer. The Village in Bloom team had hoped to hold a meeting on 15th September to discuss plans for the next year. It did not take place owing to health and safety concerns, but group members have continued to keep in touch and

maintenance work will continue in all areas throughout the autumn.

We are continuing to remove the small shallow containers from sites in the village. The two sinks at the top of Laburnum Avenue are next on the list to go.

Although we have not been able to undertake any fundraising activities as such this year, we had a quantity of box hedging and other seedlings donated earlier on together with a number of redundant hayracks and almost all have now been sold which has helped with funding. A resident who left the village last year donated a large quantity of decorative planters, and these will go on sale in a driveway shortly.

With all garden competitions and promotions cancelled this year (both local and Nationally) we do not intend to plan any events as a group until 2021.

Several members of the 'In Bloom' team have had to step down because of health reasons. Happily, we have had several offers of help from new residents in the last few weeks. Thanks to them. Tough times as we long to be able to move freely and especially to have contact with those we love. How I miss the hugs!

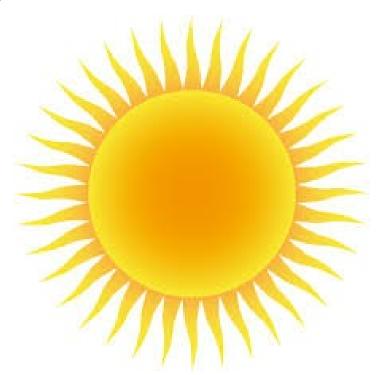

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Visit a wood on your doorstep

Woodlands are special at any time of the year, but as summer slips into autumn - and leaves turn to amber and gold – they morph into places of pure magic. Our own Centenary Wood offers the chance to roam and a space to play. A perfect spot for a relaxing ramble or impromptu picnic, our wood offers a range of opportunities for den building, nature trail and bird identification.

How to build a den.

Here is a simple way to make a sturdy shelter in the woods.

- 1. Look for strong tree with suitable nooks, crannies and knobbly bits on its trunk that will help to form the basis of your framework.
- 2. Find a couple of sturdy branches and firmly wedge them together against the tree to make your den's frame.
- 3. Collect more branches and lay them so they are leaning against your framework. Pack them closely together so they are as secure as possible.
- 4. Cover your tent like den with leaves and small twigs; wedge them into any gaps so your den provides good shelter from wind and rain.

These instructions won't make a fool proof den – use the materials that you find in the wood and adapt your structure accordingly. Please do not cut or break anything down and don't damage anything in your enthusiasm to construct the perfect den.

ANATOMY OF A WOOD

From the soil layer at the bottom to the canopy at the top, the many layers that make up a woodland create a diverse and thriving ecosystem. Each layer provides vital places for species to live. So help to protect our local wood and the animals and plants that live there.

CANOPY Mature trees position their leaves carefully to maximise the amount of light they can absorb. As the canopies of trees link together they form a network allowing animals to move easily through the woodland.

HERB LAYER Woodland plants like the shade of the herb layer. It prepares them for the leafy canopy that can block light in the spring when they are older and taller.



TREE TRUNKS Crevices in tree trunks are cosy and safe places for bugs to live, while bats like to roost in bigger openings.

LITTER LAYER this not only protects the soil from erosion and helps water infiltrate into the ground: it also provides nesting material and food for animals and birds.

DEAD WOOD Many small animals, insects, lichen and mosses call the fallen trees and branches of dead wood their home.

SOIL LAYER Soil is home to a quarter of all land living organisms. Woodland soil is home to microscopic life such as pseudo scorpions, but it also provides plants with nutrients and water.











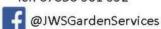

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How to plant a new vegetable patch

There is a great sense of achievement that comes from growing your own – and sowing vegetables from seed is an inexpensive way to raise tasty crops packed with vitamins and minerals.

Now is the time to prepare a number of vegetable beds ready for sowing in early spring.

What do you want to eat?

Give some thought as to what vegetables you would like to grow. If you are limited by the amount of space you can turn into vegetable beds – then it is best to focus on those vegetables you really enjoy which are more expensive to buy. I will be planting the following vegetables:

Spinach, Carrots and Beetroot; French Beans and Runner Beans; Garlic, Broad Beans and Leeks; Cabbage and Sprouting Broccoli; Courgettes and Lettuce.

Find out how to grow each of selected vegetables.

There are a good number of books in the library on vegetable growing, great information on the Internet and a wealth of information on seed packets. The best place to go is our local Garden Centre and look at the range of seeds on display and start to build a plan for the vegetable beds.

Make enquiries as to what and when vegetable seedlings will be available next year.

Choose the right spot for the vegetable beds.

First select a suitable space for your vegetable beds. The area should get at least five hours of sun a day. Each bed can be about 3 feet wide and about 25 feet in length. They will have sloping sides and sufficient width for you to weed and care for your plants with ease. Each bed can be separated by a wood chip path.

It is likely that you will have to convert an existing grass and weed area into your vegetable beds. There



are a number of ways to go about this – one would be to dig over the area – however this is not recommended as it will disturb the soil and create an opportunity for dormant weed seeds to germinate. Also it is hard work!

The second option which will take about 6 to 12 months to achieve, is to cover the area with tarpaulin to kill off the existing vegetation.

The third option and the best method is the no dig approach and is what I recommend here. It adopts the same principle of depriving the existing vegetation of sunlight, but uses a layer of cardboard, manure and compost/soil, laid down on the surface of the soil without integrating it.

This thick layer will work hard during the winter months preparing your vegetable bed ready for direct sowing or planting seedlings in the spring time. The bed can be covered with a permeable black membrane in order to keep sunlight out and the soil moist.

You will have to source cardboard, remove the parcel tape and labels, source some decent manure and compost / soil. Recycled kitchen waste and grass cuttings in the kitchen compost bin is a good start point. Look out for ERYC soil improver as well.

So over to you and good luck.

October is the month for sowing and planting crops that don't mind the winter cold: broad beans, spring cabbage, garlic, onion sets and rhubarb.

Broad Beans: – sow seeds of the early varieties now or next month.

Cabbages:- October is your last chance for transplanting spring

cabbages. Plant them in the ground that has been well firmed down and cover with nets to protect from birds.

Garlic:- plant cloves this month or next. As long as they don't get waterlogged, they will survive a cold winter. The longer they are in the ground the bigger your next year's bulbs should be. Always buy commercially grown bulbs that you know are guaranteed disease free.

Onion Sets:- plant over wintering onion sets now.

Rhubarb: They should be entering their dormant period now. It will last right through to March and is the best time to plant new sets or divide and replant old crowns.

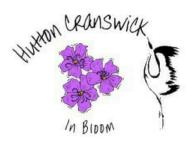

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Hello people Herbert Hutton Hedgehog here, I hope this finds you all well and not doing too much gardening as I do love a good rummage through your undergrowth.

Today I would like to talk to you about how you can encourage me and my friends into your garden.

Having us visit you can be amazing, you get to watch us bumbling about at dusk and dawn if you're around then, and you may even be lucky enough for us to make your garden our home.

Firstly though we need to be able to get in and out.

You can help us do this by creating a hedgehog highway. A hole in a fence or a gap under a gate will do. As long as it's the size of a CD case it will be big enough.

My friends and I need to be able to get to a number of gardens while foraging for food, we do ask everyone to open their gardens up and not enclose or shut them off.

The more gardens that are open the better it is for our population and we have now been officially classified as an endangered species.

Leaving us some food out will encourage us to return and really help us when food is scarce. We do love a nice cat biscuit or even puppy ones. Some people do put wet food out but it does encourage the flies you know.

More important for us is water. Did you know more small animals die of dehydration than starvation. We soon become dehydrated, so providing water in a shallow dish is essential and we are so grateful.

You can make a feeding station if you wanted to. This will keep the food out of the bad weather and also stops unwanted visitors such as cats.

Providing a hedgehog house gives us somewhere to hide through the day and if you are really lucky one of my lady friends may even have her babies in it. It won't be this year now although there have been a lot of second litters this year.

Hedgehog houses can be shop bought or home made. Some bought ones can be a bit small for raising hoglets in though. There are lots of ideas on the internet.

Please put it out of direct sunlight and prevailing winds. Somewhere like under shrubs or trees or at the back of a shed out of the way.

Leaving an area of your garden to grow wild is a hedgehog gardens best selling point.

This will encourage insects and bugs which are a food source for us all.

If you can please plant shrubs, bushes and create a log pile. These will give us areas to hide in and forage for food and nest.

You may already have visitors but you've just not seen us, look out for signs such as our poo, we are very good at leaving it everywhere.

As it is now getting rather late in the year extra food is always welcome to build up our fat reserves for hibernation but please remember mealworms are very bad for us, they are so full of phosphorus they leech the calcium from our bones causing metabolic bone disease. We are also not very good after eating bread and milk is a really big no thank you.



Just a last little thing before I go there have been a lot of second litters this year and some have been born very late. If the hoglets are under weight they will not survive hibernation so if you see a little hedgehog, smaller than a tennis ball or one that is out looking for food during the day please give either Ann or the HHH emergency number a ring so they can just have a quick check.

My namesake HHH as in Holderness Hedgehog Hospital are always ready to help with advice, practical assistance and can talk you through what is best. Their emergency number is 07563917914. They can triage over the phone and direct you as to what is best to do.

They have a local outreach hospital in Hutton whose number is 07722483845. Ann is always happy to help if she is available.

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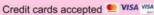
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Hutton Cranswick Sports & Recreation Association

The SRA Committee had not met since 20^{th} July, but held its Annual AGM followed by an Ordinary Meeting on 7^{th} September. Officers for 2020/21 were appointed at the AGM, but it was noted that the Chair wanted to step down due to work commitments. Frances Johnson, currently Secretary, volunteered to take on the office of Chair if someone could be found to take over her role.

Lockdown restrictions have resulted in a significant reduction in funds from matches/usage of the Clubhouse; however a grant from the F.A. for pitch preparation and further grants for new goalposts and the acquisition of PPE have been forthcoming.



The bar has been re-stocked and is now up and running subject to guidelines and a separate fund-raising Committee has been formed, principally to raise funds towards the scheduled new build. A new brick-built BBQ close to pitch sidelines had been built and was operating successfully.

A couple of cricket matches had taken place in the summer and some training exercises on the pitches had commenced. September saw the start of the football season with several pre-season friendly matches planned. Three SRA football teams would feature plus a junior team and there was a push for more junior teams. Veterans' teams may also be formed dependent on interest. Middleton would also play a couple of matches at the start of the season.

The annual Ryedale charity Cycle event which had to be cancelled earlier in the year has a proposed date of 3rd/4th July 2021 providing circumstances are back to normal by then.

Clubhouse cleaning has figured large in recent weeks and, using grant money, a decision made to acquire a Fogga machine which would effectively clean and de-contaminate the Clubhouse after usage far more quickly and efficiently than could be achieved by a manual physical clean: this machine is now successfully in use.

The new fund-raising subcommittee, which will be looking into grants available for the new build, will be meeting on 21st September when various ideas/suggestions will be discussed. It was agreed to purchase a reasonably priced card reader for use at the Bar.

Although several of the groups which had used the Clubhouse on a regular basis could not operate due to Covid 19 restrictions, Yoga Classes are now in full swing, in compliance with current Covid regulations.

A "Booty Camp" (exercise regime) operates on the playing field early on Monday evenings.

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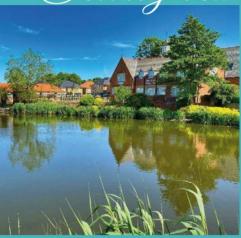
