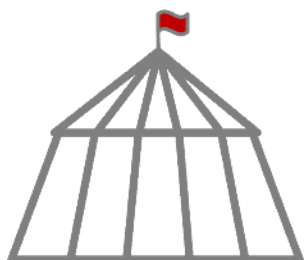

## **Census Day is Sunday 21 March 2021.**

By taking part, you can help inform decisions on services that shape your community, such as healthcare, education and transport.

The census is a unique survey that happens every 10 years. It gives us a snapshot of all the people and households in England and Wales – the most detailed information we have about our society.

It's important that you fill in your census questionnaire. Without the information you share, it'd be more difficult to understand your community's needs and to plan and fund public services.

In one way or another, your information touches the lives of every single person living in England and Wales, whether it's through using census information to plan new schools, doctors' surgeries or bike lanes.

Because these things matter to us all, everyone needs to complete the census. Do not worry, government officials dealing with applications you've made or payments or services you receive cannot see it.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) runs the census in England and Wales and is independent from government. Your details are protected by law and information published is always anonymous.

**Census Day is Sunday 21 March 2021.** You can fill yours in online as soon as you get your access code in the post. If your household circumstances change on Census Day, you can let the ONS know.

Everyone should have the support they need to fill in the census. If you, or anyone you know, needs help, there's a wide range of support services available.

These include a contact centre that can give you help over the phone and guidance in a range of languages and accessible formats, including paper questionnaires and large print.

Dear Friends,

Once again we are in the season of Lent. What does the season mean to you? What sort of ideas does it conjure up in your mind? For many, it is associated with giving something up – to kick that unwanted habit, to go on that long-intended diet, or deny oneself those unnecessary extra luxuries. But if we do these things we really need to understand why we are doing them.

Lent is a forty-day season of preparation for Easter. Lent began on Ash Wednesday. We could ask ourselves, why 40 days. Just as Jesus fasted and was tempted in the wilderness for 40 days, so Lent is our time of fasting, prayer and repentance. Lent is not referred to in the scriptures, but it has been a custom which Christians have practiced for most of the last two thousand years.

In many languages the word 'Lent' actually means 'fast'. This is where the custom of giving up something for Lent originated. However, just to confuse things, Lent is actually 46 days rather than 40 days. Why? The 40 days of Lent are supposed to be days of fasting, which means discipline and self-restraint. But Sunday, the Lord's Day, should never be a day of fasting, but a day of celebration! So each Sunday we can suspend our Lenten disciplines and celebrate.

The focus of Lent was always threefold:

- It was a time to prepare new converts for baptism through intensive classes and instruction.
- It was a time for long-standing Christians to review their lives and renew their commitment to Jesus Christ.
- It was a time for back-sliders to be restored to the faith.

In every case it was a time for a serious, disciplined self-examination, a time spent in intensive prayer and repentance before the cross of Calvary. So Lent is a time to examine ourselves carefully, to perhaps give our in-most thoughts a spring clean. Lent is about being determined to follow Christ more faithfully. It might mean more disciplined devotion, perhaps more practical service or more effective witnessing. It might mean a commitment to attend the organised Lent Studies in our Churches. Whatever it is, it is more than giving something up. It is about giving something back to the one who gave us His all. Consider today what Christ has done for **YOU**, then ask yourself, what can you do for Him, and use Lent as an opportunity to respond.

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## Hutton Cranswick Parish Council

### Minutes of the Meeting of the Parish Council, held on the 27<sup>th</sup> January, 2021.

The meeting was held remotely via Skype and open to the public. The session commenced at 7.00 pm.

**Present:** Councillors: Holtby, Poolford, Richardson (in the chair) Sibley-Calder, Mrs Simpson, Swan, Teare, Thompson, Wilkinson, Wilson. Ward Councillors: Evison and Owen. The Clerk recorded the minutes.

**21/001 Apologies:** Councillors: Alderton, Kelly, Lock.

#### 21/002 Declaration of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests

Cllr Mrs Simpson Item Nos 12/20/28 - 21/011/19/27 - Non-pecuniary - HCSRA Committee Member.

**21/003 Minutes – Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on the 16<sup>th</sup> December, 2020 be approved and signed as a correct record (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Poolford).

**21/004 Budget** – The latest budget position; assumptions for the predicted year-end outturn; receipts; bank account statements and a bank reconciliation, were noted. A report on the NatWest Business Banking Switch offer was to be considered at the next meeting.

**21/005 Local Precept Demand 2021-22** – East Riding of Yorkshire Council had confirmed receipt of the demand notice from the Parish Council in the sum of £32,781.00. The precept was to be paid in two instalments: £16,390.50 on the 30th April, 2021 and £16,390.50 on the 30<sup>th</sup> September, 2021.

**21/006 Rural Policing Priorities** – The Police and Crime Commissioner and the Chief Constable of Humberside Police were keen to ensure that local communities had involvement in setting the priorities for local policing teams in dealing with policing matters, which were of a concern to the communities they served. The Council was requested to select the Top 3 rural policing issues from a short list of 9 options:

1	Burglary including: both dwellings and outbuildings.
2	Theft of and from machinery or equipment
3	Theft of fuel
4	Theft of livestock
5	Poaching / Hare Coursing
6	Wildlife Crime including: The Killing of Birds of Prey; Badger Baiting; Fox Hunting
7	Heritage Crime including: Unlawful Metal Detecting; Archaeological Theft; Lead theft
8	Anti-social use of motor cycles / quadbikes
9	Criminal Damage including: Crops; Property; Vehicles

The Council selected options 1, 5 and 9.

The Council was surprised that speeding was not included as an option. The reason was because the survey was a Humber wide survey and enforcement for speeding involved other agencies such as the local Council, East Riding of Yorkshire Council for Hutton Cranswick, and the four Council's in the Humber area had different policies.

The focus of the survey was purely policing and therefore more crime related.

**21/007 Planning Matters** – The following decisions were noted:

- 20/03381/PLF:** Erection of a single storey extension to existing detached garden room at 43 Southgate, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QX – Full Planning Permission – Approved 3 Conditions.
- 20/03510/VAR:** Variation of Condition 17 (approved plans) of planning permission 20/01320/VAR (Variation of 17/02572/PLF - Erection of 3 dwellings and a detached garage and alterations to existing outbuilding, following demolition of existing dwelling and part of outbuilding) at the Site of Gartholme, 13 The Green, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QU – Variation of Condition – Approved 17 Conditions.
- 20/03610/PLF:** Application of render (off white) to rear and side elevations at Somerdene, 32 Main Street, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QY – Full Planning Permission – Approved 3 Conditions.

#### 21/008 Planning Applications:

- 20/04081/PLF:** Change of use of land for the keeping of horses, with erection of a stable block and a hay store, and construction of a sand-based equine arena at Land North of Simpsons Place, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9BL – Full Planning Permission – **Resolved** – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Thompson).

- (b) **20/04260/PLF**: Erection of a single storey extension to rear and installation of rooflight's to side and rear at 2 Keld Garth, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9RJ – Full Planning Permission – **Resolved** – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Wilson/seconded Cllr Wilkinson).
- (c) **20/04072/PLF**: Erection of a stable following demolition of existing at Land South of 53 Southgate, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QX – Full Planning Permission – **Resolved** – Not to object to the application (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Wilkinson).

**21/009 Traffic Issues** – Concerns had been received about a number of traffic issues caused by; through traffic; speed limit non-compliance inconsiderate parking; riding over grass verges; lack of signage/road markings; unfinished or broken roads. It was resolved to set up a working group comprising Cllrs Holtby, Richardson and Thompson to explore options to help solve the issues (proposed Cllr Thompson/seconded Cllr Swan). Cllr Evison agreed to support the Council in resolving issues.

**21/010 Good Councillor Guide to Community Business** – The 2020 publication was noted.

**21/011 SRA** – The minutes of the SRA Committee meeting held on the 25<sup>th</sup> January, 2021, the Treasurer's report and the Assessment report on the standard of the football pitches for the SRA were noted.

**21/012 Village Taskforce Walkabout** – Due to the coronavirus pandemic the walkabout with representatives from East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Highways, to identify pothole repairs, street asset painting, sign repair and washing, and any overgrown vegetation that needed to be cut back, had been delayed to 2022. In the meantime, damage to roads, footpaths and kerbs, including damage to cat's eyes, kerbs, road barriers, potholes or poor road markings could be reported to East Riding of Yorkshire Council on 01482 393939 or its website

**21/013 Website** – Training on the website had been postponed due to the coronavirus pandemic. This had resulted in additional work for the website provider in maintaining the website. It was **Resolved** to accept a one-off annual charge of £200.00 for an enhanced level of support for 2021-22 (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Teare). Cllr Swan had received information on the pages visited, which would be used to optimise the website.

**21/014 Land South of South Holme, 4 The Green** – East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Address Management Team had accepted a suggestion from the developer to name the development as Willbrook Close, the name constructed with reference to Sir William Hotham (11st Baronet Hotham) and to a brook running at the end of the site. The Parish Council had not been consulted on the naming of the development.

**21/015 Risk Register** – The Clerk had provided a review on the risks faced by the Council. It was **Resolved** to approve the register, incorporating suggested amendments from Councillors, and to continue to focus on and mitigate, as far as possible, risks faced by the Council (proposed Cllr Richardson/seconded Cllr Teare).

**21/016 Parish Plan** – An update presented by Cllr Teare was noted. Moving forward there was a need to continue organising further workshops and surveys to identify current issues and plan the action required to resolve them. The issues were broadly to do with environment, community support, planning and facilities for young people.

**21/017 Code of Conduct** – The presentation slides and an audio recording of the Code of Conduct training session held, remotely, on the 9<sup>th</sup> December, 2020 were noted.

**21/018 Register of Interests** – Councillors would review and confirm their Register of Interests to the Clerk.

**21/019 SRA Storage Container** – A request to replace a damaged container was granted (proposed Cllr Richardson/seconded Cllr Thompson).

**21/020 Complaint about car parking at the junction of Reynard Close and Churchill Avenue** – The parking of a car at the junction of Reynard Close and Churchill Avenue was causing frustration for a number of residents. Ward Councillors, the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and the Police had been informed of the concerns.

**21/021 Garden Allotments** – Cllr Poolford reported only one allotment remained vacant. The work to clear up vacant plots, including additional work at a cost of £285.00, had been completed. The cleaning out of the dyke was planned to be done in the next few weeks. The water supply had been turned off, as there was a suspected water leak.



**21/022 The Pond** – Cllr Poolford reported the annual clean-up of the pond would be done when the ground conditions improved. Cllr Sibley-Calder reported an electrical issue with the lights. If, after a further inspection, the problem persisted, it was **Resolved** to arrange for an electrician to undertake any necessary repairs (proposed Cllr Sibley-Calder/seconded Cllr Wilkinson).

**21/023 Trees on Cranswick Green** – The new trees would be planted when ground conditions improved.

**21/024 Play Park Improvements** – Cllr Thompson reported that a response to the representations received on the Council's Section 38 Application had been sent to the Planning Inspectorate. A planning application for changing the use of a small part of the Green to play area was under consideration.

The replacement shelter was due for completion by the end of the month.

The works within the existing play area boundary would commence in early February, 2021.

A decision on the application for Commuted Sums was still awaited.

**21/025 Code of Conduct** – At present, the Council had no feedback on the revised model Code of Conduct issued by the Local Government Association.

**21/026 Flood Risk Sequential and Exception Test Supplementary Planning Document** – At present, the Council had no comments on the draft document. Cllr Poolford had concerns of the lack of regular clearing of dykes/drainage by some riparian owners.

**21/027 Grant request from the SRA** – The SRA had requested financial assistance towards the cost of work necessary to clean and upgrade the surface of the synthetic sports areas and replacement of some of the surrounding boards. It was **Resolved** to provide a maximum of £5000.00 subject to (a) a grant from Sports England was obtained as envisaged and (b) the Committee provides evidence of a robust maintenance regime, as recommended by the specialist contractor used to undertake the work/or manufacturer of the surface, was in place to keep the synthetic sports surface in good condition (proposed Cllr Richardson/seconded Cllr Thompson).

**21/028 Land Registry Survey** – the Clerk was to complete the survey.

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## Did you know?

Street Markets have been around for centuries in villages and towns for local craftspeople and tradesmen together with farmers to sell their goods and services.

As a means to protect their trade and to prevent too much competition some of these places petitioned the King of the time to be granted a royal charter that would give their place the sole rights to hold markets and fairs within a specified area. This area was usually deemed to be six and two thirds miles as the crow flies from the designated market place. The reason for the distance is because that was reckoned to be a maximum fair distance for a family to walk to market, buy their goods and walk back home in daylight hours. These were known as Charter markets.

A Charter Market was granted by King Edward 2<sup>nd</sup> on 24 August 1310 to Geoffery de Hotham in our village. The Charter Market was to be held on Tuesday each week on The Green at Cranswick. This practice continued into the 18<sup>th</sup> century.

At the same time, in 1310, an annual fair was permitted. This was to take place on the Saint Day of Bartholomew the Apostle on August 24<sup>th</sup> each year. The fair would comprise an evening vigil, feast and a daytime fair. Therefore the fair could be 48 hours long.

The street market gave an opportunity for local produce and crafts to be sold into the locality. Supporting local people and ensuring a sustainable
