#### Village in Bloom – which five categories should we enter?

The RHS is not able to judge entries to their Yorkshire in Bloom competition again this year. Instead, they have launched "Best of Yorkshire" awards to help communities celebrate their resilience to the effects of the Covid pandemic. These new awards will be for one year only and will be judged digitally around the three main pillars of Bloom: Horticulture, Environment and Community. The awards are as follows:

- 1. Yorkshire in Springtime for the best spring displays (seasonal or sustainable) from March to May
- Yorkshire in Summertime for the most impressive summer floral or sustainable displays June to September – these can even be wildflower meadows
- 3. By heck that's good for the best floral feature i.e the most traditional carpet bedded feature or themed garden display. Examples could depict the heritage of the area or be a themed display.
- 4. Kind to nature wildlife project can be a small wildlife friendly garden or well-managed nature reserve, village pond or riverbank

- Saving the planet for good examples of resource management, recycling projects or tree planting initiatives
- 6. Clap for the community awarded to the volunteer or team of volunteers who have kept going through the pandemic and have helped their community get through the past year (not necessarily florally, but could be for things like organising foodbanks, looking after the elderly or keeping spirits up within their area
- Community litter heroes for the individual or group who have continued to keep their community clean by regular socially distanced litter picks or clean ups
- Wheels of fortune to celebrate local transport centres. This could be anything from a floral bus stop to a heritage railway station and anything in between
- 9. Heart of the community for businesses who have supported their community by whatever means, i.e delivering meals, donating face masks or helping NHS staff with discounts or free materials or just 'blooming up' to raise spirits
- **10. Young bloomers** for any project or activity showing the resilience of young people. Can include youth groups, schools or individuals

Hutton Cranswick in Bloom would like to enter this one-off competition. We can put forward up to five of our best examples.

## Wansford bridge parapets repairs after traffic accident. Bridge to be closed for five weeks

Hello,

#### 'You'll bounce back.'

How are you doing? Gradually the doors are opening and lockdown is easing. For many it's been a long and hard time. For everyone a year in their life has gone by. Covid 19 has caused us all to stop where we are, many home alone. In the horror of the last year we have come face to face with mortality, many losing someone dear to them. Loneliness and heartache have touched us all as we've sought safety in our own homes.

Now in May 2021 a hope has been borne, a vaccine invented, and a vaccine programme rolled out; and I have to say, the Scientists and the NHS deserve full praise for their wonderful work. #### East Riding Local Plan Update 2020 – 2039 - Draft Allocations Document

The draft allocations report was agreed at ERYC Cabinet on Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> April, which means that officers have been given the go ahead to start drawing up a consultation plan. Provisionally, the formal consultation will start on 24th May and will extend to 10 weeks. If residents want to be informed directly about the Local Plan process they can be added to the mailing list. They just need to email

forward.planning@eastriding.gov.uk

There will be a 10 week period of formal consultation where the parish council and others can send in their views. This will start at the end of May, though there is no reason why they can't start to look through the documents now. Forward planning would be grateful to receive comments, not just on the proposals/sites, but also on matters of accuracy (e.g. commentary on the number of pubs in the village).

The main changes proposed for Hutton Cranswick are shown here:-

This site is allocated for housing development. Proposals will be required to:

- a. Provide for additional landscaping to the southern boundaries;
- b. Provide for a reconfiguration of the junction between Hobman Lane and A164;
- c. Ensure that the impacts of the adjacent grain dryers on residential amenity are adequately addressed in the design and layout of the development; and
- d. Incorporate the Public Rights of Way that cross the site.
- 29.13 This new site has been proposed as a replacement for site reference CRA-C which has been de-allocated due to deliverability concerns (see above). It has an indicative capacity of 124 dwellings and is well related to the main body of the settlement. There are two public rights of way that cross the site and adjoin the eastern boundary which must be integrated into any proposed scheme. The latter will provide a pedestrian means of access to the village centre.
- 29.14 Vehicular access to the site would be achieved as part of a reconfigured junction of Hobman Lane and A164 which would improve the very awkward angled arrangement that exists at present. This would also avoid the need for vehicular traffic from the new site to pass through the existing village in order to reach the main road.
- 29.15 The potential for noise and disturbance from the existing employment sites to the south will need to be addressed in the design and layout of the dwellings and boundary treatments to ensure that this does not lead to residential amenity issues.

Dear Friends,

On a recent walk in the countryside I saw a beautiful rainbow. It arched over the Millennium Field in Driffield. It looked absolutely stunning. This wonder of nature filled me with a sense of hope and happiness. The rainbow has a long history as a sign of hope on the spiritual journey of life. In the story of Noah the rainbow is a symbol of the promise that God made to the people who were saved from the earth's destruction. There is a hopeful power in the story of Noah, the tale of a person who braved long, lonely moments, wondering what life was worth when all he knew was being destroyed. He must have questioned how he and his family would survive. The moment when Noah opened the window and sent out the dove is special and filled with hope.

Noah is everyone of us when we sit in our discouragement, calling out to God or others; 'tell me about hope; give me reason to believe; help me to trust in the goodness of life; enable me to find my courage and to enthuse about life again; tell me about the meaning of life'. What a profound confirmation of hope it was for Noah when the dove came back bearing the tiny sprig of green in its beak, the green which said; 'welcome into new life. Here is a gift of hope for you. Believe in the future. Trust what is to come. All will be well'. The rainbow has become a sign of the promises God makes to all of us who go on searching, struggling, dreaming and believing while on the human journey.

The rainbow announced hope to Noah and continues to proclaim hope to us. Sometimes it is hard to think of hope when the world is filled with war and so many lives are filled with pain and conflict, struggles and darkness. To 'hope' is more than just to wish for something. It is to yearn for and to dream something so much that we really believe it can happen. To hope is to have a strong, clear vision of the future. To hope is to know the God of hope, the God of promise, the one who has already taken us out of darkness into wonderful light. The question we need to ask ourselves is do we love God enough to trust that He will be with us whatever our trials and tribulations might



be? Do we love enough to send out a dove and to look for signs of rainbows in the sky?

Trust is a gradual, growing thing. We keep giving ourselves to God and then, taking ourselves back. We need to be aware of keeping our hope alive, of taking our trust to deeper depths. Hope just doesn't happen. It has to be nurtured in the human heart. We need to have a time each day to recall God's presence and believe again in the beauty and wonder around us. Then when you see a rainbow in the sky, praise its maker. Lift up your heart in hope and share that hope with others.

#### **Hutton Cranswick Parish Council**

#### Minutes of the Meeting of the Parish Council, held on the 24<sup>th</sup> March, 2021. The meeting was held remotely via Skype and open to the public. The session commenced at 7.00 pm.

**Present:** Councillors: Alderton, Kelly, Poolford, Richardson (in the Chair), Sibley-Calder, Mrs Simpson, Swan, Thompson, Wilkinson, Wilson. The Clerk recorded the minutes.

21/055 Apologies: Councillors: Holtby, Lock, Teare. Ward Councillors: Evison, Lisseter, Owen.

#### 21/056 Declaration of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests

Cllr Alderton Item No – 29(a) 07/21/081(a) - Non-pecuniary - Member of Bulletin Team.

**21/057 Minutes** – **Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on the 24<sup>th</sup> February, 2021 be approved and signed as a correct record (proposed Cllr Poolford/seconded Cllr Alderton).

**21/058 Public Participation** – Tim Gowthorpe made a statement promoting the planning application 21/00492/OUT for outline planning approval to erect a dwelling at Land North of 25 Station Road, Cranswick, (minute 21/063 (c) refers).

**21/059 Budget** – The year-end outturn; a list of all 2020/21 payments and receipts, payments to the Clerk, the VAT to be re-claimed in the last 6 months; bank account statements and a bank reconciliation, were noted.

**21/060 Wansford Bridge** – The Council had been consulted on the East Riding of Yorkshire Council's proposal to introduce a permanent 7.5 tonnes maximum gross weight Structural Weight Limit to the bridge. This would apply to all vehicles, including buses and farm traffic. The Council considered a 7.5 tonnes limit would have severe adverse implications for agricultural vehicle journeys and would exacerbate road congestion in Driffield. It was **Resolved** – to strongly object to the proposed 7.5 tonnes limit and suggest that, if a permanent restriction was to be introduced, then any restriction should be a minimum of 10 tonnes maximum gross weight limit (proposed Cllr Richardson/seconded Cllr Thompson).

**21/061 Open Gardens** – **Resolved** – To grant a request on behalf of St Peter's Church Fundraising Committee to use the Village Green on Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> July, 2021 to erect a refreshment tent and ice-cream cart for the occasion of Open Gardens (proposed Cllr Swan/seconded Cllr Alderton).

21/062 Planning Matters – The following decisions were noted:

- (a) 20/01548/STOUT Residential development (Access to be considered) (Resubmission of 17/03880/STOUT) at Land South of Williamsfield Road, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9BH for Williamsfield Developments Ltd Notification from the Case Officer that the application was to be considered by the Planning Committee on the 18<sup>th</sup> March, 2021.
- (b) 21/00322/TCA: CRANSWICK CONSERVATION AREA Remove 1 no. Oak tree to prevent significant damage to neighbour's boundary fence and due to the tree encroaching on the boundary fence and due to the tree restricting light into the garden at 79 Main Street, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9QN – Tree Works in Conservation Area - No objections raised.
- (c) 20/04081/PLF: Change of use of land for the keeping of horses, with erection of a stable block and a hay store, and construction of a sand-based equine arena at Land North of Simpsons Place, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9BL – Full Planning Permission – Approved 11 Conditions.
- (d) 20/04260/PLF: Erection of a single storey extension to rear and installation of rooflights to side and rear at 2 Keld Garth, Hutton Cranswick, East Riding of Yorkshire, YO25 9RJ – Full Planning Permission – Approved 4 Conditions.

## News on The Green

#### Play Park Phase 2 granted permission

An application made under Section 38 of the Commons Act 2006 for consent to carry out restricted works on a village green by Hutton Cranswick Parish Council to the Planning Inspectorate has been successful.

The works comprise a 30 m zip line, a climber with scramble net traverse rope, safety surfacing improvements and realignment/additional 24 m of boundary fencing. The Parish Council will determine a start date for this part of the project.

## Detailed work on the Pond

As part of SA Agricultural and Landscaping, we spent the day sorting the pond out. It was strangled in weeds and in much need of clearing back.

We removed 6 tractor trailer loads of weeds that were over a foot deep in roots in places, so much so you could walk on them.

The area around the water lillies has been cleared so they can survive as they were getting blocked by weed.



Bullrushes cut back too and the dratted water soldiers removed as best is possible. The result is a much more presentable pond that can be seen much better.

The wildlife is all still there fine. We were careful to try our best not to harm any. The moorhens are all perfectly fine with their 6 babies. Frogspawn was carefully moved to safe areas of the pond. Any

frogs found were also moved away from the work area.

The fish can now flourish better, there's still goldfish!/ carp as well as loads of minnows and hordes of pond skaters too. There's even a bird box on the island now to encourage more wildlife. The blackbirds were loving picking through the debris.

Some areas of weeds were left as well as bullrush shoots so they will all build up again but now the pond can breathe a bit! The litter also removed including a child's scooter and a bike tyre.



It was nice to get lots of positive comments – over 40 on the Facebook Village Community page . While it was a job its always nice when the job means we can help our village a bit more.

It was worth a day in freezing water and the biggest hailstones I've ever seen!
