How to contribute to socio-environmental equity through landscape actions/research that responds to pressing emergencies with an increased understanding of the landscape's critical role and responsibility in constructing the future of our territories?

The International Federation of Landscape Architects states that landscape architects are tasked with creating 'globally sustainable and balanced living environments for the benefit of humanity worldwide' (IFLAWorld, 2023). Indeed, landscape architects are trained to have an integrated understanding of environmental factors, political forces and cultural traditions that shape the land and generate responses to several forms of conflicts. There is a need to reconsider the way of living on this planet in the context of demographic growth and human-induced environmental changes. Scholars and intellectuals share the idea that there is a fundamental right to landscapes, considered a right to healthy and culturally rich environments that everyone is entitled to demand. Landscape Architects can be the game-changers in the recovery and reconstruction of the planet's ecological systems and contribute to how we inhabit, produce, and navigate our landscapes.

This panel aims to define liminal paths between humanitarian design, the right to shared landscapes and the well-being of communities, and the governance of the recovery and reconstruction process. It aligns with the commitment of the LAWB - IFLA working group Landscape Architects Without Borders. LAWB is engaged in working with vulnerable and disadvantaged communities, especially those affected by war, conflict, and natural disasters, helping them re-create safe, sustainable and dignified living conditions.
