Dear participants,

The International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) has a rich history dating back to the early 20th century. In 1948, visionaries from national landscape architecture associations convened in Cambridge, England, during the International Conference on Landscape Architecture. It was there that the seeds of an international organisation dedicated to promoting landscape architecture on a

global scale were sown. Thus, the International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) was formally established in 1948 in Cambridge, with Sir Geoffrey Jellicoe as its pioneering president. In its formative years, IFLA focused on fostering communication and cooperation among national landscape architecture associations, promoting the profession, and facilitating the exchange of knowledge and experiences among professionals across borders. The IFLA World Congress swiftly emerged as a powerful platform for landscape architects to convene, share research, showcase projects, and deliberate on emerging trends and challenges.

IFLA has played an integral role in advocating for landscape architecture as a profession and championing sustainable development principles. Despite the profound changes that have unfolded over the past 75 years, IFLA remains steadfast as a hub for professional collaboration, knowledge sharing, and advocacy, championing the cause of landscape architecture. Our role in shaping sustainable and resilient environments remains as crucial as ever. Landscape architects worldwide continue to confront shared challenges from globalisation, urbanisation, sustainability, climate change, health, social justice, and the recent global pandemic.

These pressing issues call for a united vision to protect and nurture our natural and built environments.

As the only international non-governmental organisation representing landscape architects globally, it is imperative that we collectively expand our knowledge and experiences. It is opportune to remind readers that we are not a small profession. IFLA is the body that represents 80 member associations and more than 50,000 landscape architects worldwide; however, according to the International Labour Organization, more than 1 million landscape architects exist worldwide. Our mission is to promote the landscape architecture profession within a collaborative partnership of the allied built-environment professions, demanding the highest standards of education, training, research and professional practice and providing leadership and stewardship in all matters. As a global federation, our allies are international bodies like the United Nations, UNESCO, ICOMOS, FAO, IUCN, and WHO, as well as allied built environment bodies like UIA, ISOCARP, IFHP, and WFEO, among many others, where our expertise is required around the table to strategise about the future of our planet.

Landscape architects practice a discipline rooted in holistic thinking. We understand the natural environment, the built environment, and the interface between them. And we are prepared to take leadership in shaping outdoor spaces and framing public awareness about them. To do this, we need a strong IFLA that helps promote the profession and expand educational

standards so we can train the future generation of landscape architects and facilitate professional development, standards and recognition worldwide. This is a time in human history when landscape architecture has something important to say, and we must be heard.

In this context, the 2023 IFLA World Council and Congress in Nairobi (Kenya) and Stockholm (Sweden) is an important milestone to discuss the future of the profession and the organisation. Landscape architects from every corner of the globe will convene in Nairobi and Stockholm to discuss how pivotal the profession is in shaping a prosperous future characterised by resilience, transformation and long-term sustainability. By understanding different contexts locally and acting globally, we can tackle climate action, protect biodiversity, enhance ecosystems, promote health and well-being, support community participation, embrace technology and evidence-based design, improve food security, design resilient landscapes, and incorporate Indigenous knowledge and traditional practices with innovative solutions in mind. Landscape architects and organisations like IFLA must take a stand and work collectively to address these challenges, ensuring a better and more sustainable future for all.

Shifting Landscapes: Emergent interactions from Kibera to Coachella, to Stockholm, and back. A discussion between the founders and shapers of KDI that explores the evolution of KDI's transnational and transdisciplinary journey, from Kibera to Coachella, to Stockholm, and back again.



"We aim to draw conclusions about the potential of emergent and upstart landscape and design practices required to attend to the urgent demands of social and environmental justice. We offer a specific set of strategies and experiences shaped by the maxim: make it until you make it."

Combating questions of poverty, environmental degradation and social isolation — Arthur and Joe have been transforming unsafe and underused sites into "Productive Public Spaces" through participatory and interdisciplinary methods. Through site-specific design they create permanent and temporary places around the world and with creative solutions for green infrastructure and safer and healthier cities.

JOY MBOYA - Executive Director, The GoDown Arts Centre

Co-designing the Public Realm: The GoDown Arts Centre's HerCity HerStreets Initiative. For a full year during the Covid pandemic, The GoDown Arts Centre engaged a core stakeholder group comprised of women and girls in co-designing two public streets – Dunga Road and Dundori Road - that bound the site of The GoDown's redevelopment into a civic-scale cultural institution. The women core-group systematically assessed the streets and generated design ideas for welcoming, safe and green public streets. Thereafter, planners and landscape architects developed these ideas into the technical designs. The presentation will share The GoDown's journey in unfolding its people-centred ethos and practice, and how this was applied in its HerCity HerStreets process.



TOREY CARTER-CONNEN CEO at American Society of Landscape Architects

The American Society of Landscape Architects is one of the oldest and most influential organizations in the profession, but today it must meet the world in a moment of profound change. THE SIR GEOFFREY JELlicoe AWARD is the highest honor that the International Federation of Landscape Architects can bestow upon a landscape architect. The award recognises living landscape architects whose achievements and contributions have had a unique and lasting impact on the welfare of society and the environment and the promotion of the profession of landscape architecture.

THE IFLA PRESIDENT'S AWARD recognises the contribution of an individual or organisation for the advancement of the profession of landscape architecture through their participation in IFLA. The award recognises living landscape architects whose achievements and contributions have had a unique and lasting impact on the welfare of society and the environment and the promotion of the profession of landscape architecture.

THE IFLA AFRICA AWARD recognises a living landscape architect whose lifetime achievements and contributions have had a unique and lasting impact on the welfare of the society and the environment and the promotion of the profession of landscape architecture in Africa, through IFLA Africa or on an individual basis.

THE JUST TREES AWARD recognises the best use of trees in a Landscape Design and is awarded by The Institute for Landscape Architecture in South Africa (ILASA).

THE IFLA STUDENT COMPETITION is a yearly event and aims to receive, compare, share and advance landscape planning, design and management ideas from across the world. This year's focus was on the subtheme Act Local-Think Global which aimed at stressing on proposals that addressed global challenges with solutions that are locally sourced for different local contexts. The competition has three categories of projects which include landscape planning, landscape design and applied research. The prize money is sponsored by Haan Group.

STUDENT CHARETTE

25-27 SEPTEMBER

The IFLA student charette is a yearly workshop, this year exploring the power of digital storytelling. The Charrette will take place physically in Nairobi and Stockholm simultaneously with close interaction between the two locations virtually. The result of the Charrette will be showcased during the IFLA World Congress with the aim to inspire cross-border collaboration and knowledge exchange.

Stories have long been used by cultures around the world to communicate values, teach life lessons, preserve histories and rituals, and entertain. They are a form of local knowledge of lived experiences and emotions, that told in the right way can influence change and encourage public participation. Among architects and planners, storytelling can support a more democratic and inclusive design process, identifying local history and culture to create landscapes where humans live with nature, as well as adapting to climate change.

Introducing digital media, new possibilities of working with storytelling is enabled. We can share stories in new ways, make voices heard and work cross-borders. Guided by experts from the Storytelling Academy at Loughborough University, the participants will acquire skills in Digital Storytelling and will co-create short videos about the urban landscape of Nairobi and Stockholm, while celebrating the landscape architecture and public spaces.
