We extend a warm and heartfelt welcome to our first-ever bilateral IFLA World Congress! Whether you are joining us in Nairobi, Stockholm, or virtually, we embrace the spirit of flexibility and inclusivity to ensure that all voices are heard in the global dialogue of landscape architecture.

The International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) has a rich history dating back to the early 20th century. In 1948, visionaries from national landscape architecture associations convened in Cambridge, England, during the International Conference on Landscape Architecture. It was there that the seeds of an international organisation dedicated to promoting landscape architecture on a global scale were sown. Thus, the International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) was formally established in 1948 in Cambridge, with Sir Geoffrey Jellicoe as its pioneering president. In its formative years, IFLA focused on fostering communication and cooperation among national landscape architecture associations, promoting the profession, and facilitating the exchange of knowledge and experiences among professionals across borders. The IFLA World Congress swiftly emerged as a powerful platform for landscape architects to convene, share research, showcase projects, and deliberate on emerging trends and challenges.

IFLA has played an integral role in advocating for landscape architecture as a profession and championing sustainable development principles. Despite the profound changes that have unfolded over the past 75 years, IFLA remains steadfast as a hub for professional collaboration, knowledge sharing, and advocacy, championing the cause of landscape architecture. Our role in shaping sustainable and resilient environments remains as crucial as ever. Landscape architects worldwide continue to confront shared challenges from globalisation, urbanisation, sustainability, climate change, health, social justice, and the recent global pandemic.

These pressing issues call for a united vision to protect and nurture our natural and built environments.

As the only international non-governmental organisation representing landscape architects globally, it is imperative that we collectively expand our knowledge and experiences. It is opportune to remind readers that we are not a small profession. IFLA is the body that represents 80 member associations and more than 50,000 landscape architects worldwide; however, according to the International Labour Organization, more than 1 million landscape architects exist worldwide. Raising awareness of our profession and bridging the gap with non-members is a shared mission. Our mission is to promote the landscape architecture profession within a collaborative partnership of the allied built-environment professions, demanding the highest standards of education, training, research and professional practice and providing leadership and stewardship in all matters. As a global federation, our allies are international bodies like the United Nations, UNESCO, ICOMOS, FAO, IUCN, and WHO, as well as allied built environment bodies like UIA, ISOCARP, IFHP, and WFEO, among many others, where our expertise is required around the table to strategise about the future of our planet.

Landscape architects practice a discipline rooted in holistic thinking. We understand the natural environment, the built environment, and the interface between them. And we are prepared to take leadership in shaping outdoor spaces and framing public awareness about them. To do this, we need a strong IFLA that helps promote the profession and expand educational standards so we can train the future generation of landscape architects and facilitate professional development, standards and recognition worldwide. This is a time in human history when landscape architecture has something important to say, and we must be heard.

In this context, the 2023 IFLA World Council and Congress in Nairobi (Kenva) and Stockholm (Sweden) is an important milestone to discuss the future of the profession and the organisation. Landscape architects from every corner of the globe will convene in Nairobi and Stockholm to discuss how pivotal the profession is in shaping a prosperous future characterised by resilience, transformation and long-term sustainability. By understanding different contexts locally and acting globally, we can tackle climate action, protect biodiversity, enhance ecosystems, promote health and well-being, support community participation, embrace technology and evidence-based design, improve food security, design resilient landscapes, and incorporate Indigenous knowledge and traditional practices with innovative solutions in mind. Landscape architects and organisations like IFLA must take a stand and work collectively to address these challenges, ensuring a better and more sustainable future for all.

I eagerly anticipate our gathering in Nairobi and Stockholm and the enriching discussions that will undoubtedly ensue!

**ARTHUR ADEYA** - Architect and Landscape architect, lecturer at JKUAT, Co-founder, Kounkuey Design Initiative (KDI) **JOE MULLIGAN** - Civil and environmental engineer, Principal founder and Executive Director of KDI



Shifting Landscapes: Emergent interactions from Kibera to Coachella, to Stockholm, and back. A discussion between the founders and shapers of KDI that explores the evolution of KDI's transnational and transdisciplinary journey, from Kibera to Coachella, to Stockholm, and back again.

"We aim to draw conclusions about the potential of emergent and upstart landscape and design practices required ot attend to the urgent demands of social and environmental justice. We offer a specific set of strategies and experiences shaped by the maxim: make it until you make it."

Combating questions of poverty, environmental degradation and social isolation — Arthur and Joe have been transforming unsafe and underused sites into ""Productive Public Spaces"" through participatory and interdisciplinary methods. Through site-specific design they create permanent and temporary places around the world and with creative solutions for green infrastructure and safer and healthier cities.



#### JOY MBOYA - Executive Director, The GoDown Arts Centre

**Co-designing the Public Realm: The GoDown Arts Centre's HerCity Herstreets Initiative.** For a full year during the Covid pandemic, The GoDown Arts Centre engaged a core stakeholder group comprised of women and girls in co-designing two public streets – Dunga Road and Dundori Road - that bound the site of The GoDown's redevelopment into a civic-scale cultural institution. The women core-group systematically assessed the streets and generated design ideas for welcoming, safe and green public streets. Thereafter, planners and landscape architects developed these ideas into the technical designs. The presentation will share The GoDown's journey in unfolding its people-centred ethos and practice, and how this was applied in its HerCity HerStreets process.



#### TOREY CARTER-CONNEEN CEO at American Society of Landscape Architects

The American Society of Landscape Architects is one of the oldest and most influential organizations in the profession, but today it must meet the world in a moment of profound change. With new leadership and a dynamic vision for the future of the profession in the United States, ASLA is looking outward and inward to forge innovative collaborations to help landscape architects meet the global challenges at hand. CEO Torey Carter-Conneen will share ASLA's vision for landscape architects to lead nature-based planning and design work in priority areas including climate action and biodiversity, as well as supporting meaningful change in inclusivity and diversity.

Architect and urban planner, co-founder OOZE

After a long era of unprecedented economic growth generating an over-expansion of built space, it now might still be time to protect and reconstruct nature, in other words, to dedicate oneself fully and as a matter of urgency to the production of nature as a long-term objective. The talk will explore and illustrate, through examples of OOZE's work, how understanding and deploying natural processes could be a methodology and strategy to overcome to heal and repair our immediate and wider environment.

**Incorporating AI in the planning and design process.** With over 35 years of experience, Hitesh is a leader in using Landscape Architecture and Architecture as a tool to improve habitats for indigenous communities and endangered species. Through award-winning projects, he has been key in protecting African natural and cultural heritage through planning and designing participatory processes.

Hitesh's presentation is on how his firm, HM Design incorporates Ancestral Intelligence (AI) in the Planning and Design processes of their African projects. His "going back to visualize the future" presentation will highlight his firm's projects in Kenya, Liberia, and Namibia.

Landscape architect, co-founder BOGL

Atmospheric and site-specific space. How to create a sustainable, green and social aware projects, fit into a local site-specific context. In his lecture, landscape architect Jens Linnet will explore the dynamic nature of landscape architecture, particularly in light of the pressing issues of climate crisis and social needs in urban areas. Drawing from a range of BOGL projects, he will highlight the potential of integrating circularity, biodiversity, and climate solutions, with the creation of unique and socially- engaging possibilities of landscape architecture as a catalysts for positive change.

## **AWARDS**



THE SIR GEOFFREY JELLICOE AWARD is the highest honor that the International Federation of Landscape Architects can bestow upon a landscape architect. The award recognises living landscape architects whose achievements and contributions have had a unique and lasting impact on the welfare of society and the environment and the promotion of the profession of landscape architecture.

THE IFLA PRESIDENT'S AWARD recognises the contribution of an individual or organisation for the advancement of the profession of landscape architecture through their participation in IFLA. The award recognises living landscape architects whose achievements and contributions have had a unique and lasting impact on the welfare of society and the environment and the promotion of the profession of landscape architecture.

THE IFLA AFRICA AWARD recognises a living landscape architect whose lifetime achievements and contributions have had a unique and lasting impact on the welfare of the society and the environment and the promotion of the profession of landscape architecture in Africa, through IFLA Africa or on an individual basis.

**THE JUST TREES AWARD** recognises the best use of trees in a Landscape Design and is awarded by The Institute for Landscape Architecture in South Africa (ILASA).

THE IFLA STUDENT COMPETITION is a yearly event and aims to receive, compare, share and advance landscape planning, design and management ideas from across the world. This years' focus was on the subtheme Act Local-Think Global which aimed at stressing on proposals that addressed global challenges with solutions that are locally sourced for different local contexts. The competition has three categories of projects which include landscape planning, landscape design and applied research. The prize money is sponored by Haan Group.

## STUDENT CHARETTE 25-27 SEPTEMBER

The IFLA student charette is a yearly workshop, this year exploring the power of digital storytelling. The Charrette will takes place physically in Nairobi and Stockholm simultaneously with close interaction between the two locations virtually. The result of the Charrette will be showcased during the IFLA World Congress with the aim to inspire cross-border collaboration and knowledge exchange.

Stories have long been used by cultures around the world to communicate values, teach life lessons, preserve histories and rituals, and entertain. They are a form of local knowledge of lived experiences and emotions, that told in the right way can influence change and encourage public participation. Among architects and planners, storytelling can support a more democratic and inclusive design process, identifying local history and culture to create landscapes where humans live with nature, as well as adapting to climate change.

Introducing digital media, new possibilities of working with storytelling is enabled. We can share stories in new ways, make voices heard and work cross-borders. Guided by experts from the Storytelling Academy at Loughborough University, the participants will acquire skills in Digital Storytelling and will co-create short videos about the urban landscape of Nairobi and Stockholm, while celebrating the landscape architecture and public spaces.







#### **Ground Floor O**







# WALKS AND TALKS

#### **1. VASAPARKEN AND NORRA BANTORGET**

A walk to Vasaparken and Norra Bantorget at Norrmalm. Vasaparken was built around 1900. The park has been changed in a modernistic style in 1947 with the famous hill terrasses. In 2006 the park was refurbished and the park got the Siena prize. The most recent addition is the wooden Yoga pavilion. Norra Bantorget was built I the 50:ies and refurbished 2009 with more green areas instead of traffic areas. Norra Bantorget also received the Siena prize.

**Guides:** Landscape architects Johanna Jarméus & Tobias Phersson from Nyréns who have designed the Yogapavillion that was recently built and inaugurated.

The tour will take aprox. 1 hour in total. Total walking distance: aprox. 3,5 km

#### **2. CAMPUS ALBANO**

A former industrial area directly north of Roslagstull in Stockholm, is currently being converted to accommodate a new university district, a redevelopment which is recently inaugurated. The landscape design for Campus Albano draws upon the site's unique position within both the Royal National City Park and the cultural heritage landscape that surrounds the lake Brunnsviken. Views and context with the surroundings are fundamental to the development plan with green terraces, streets, alleys, public spaces, park area with a stormwater valley including an integrated artwork from the design practice Doze, which also is one of the key speakers at the conference.

**Guides:** Landscape architect Göran Lindberg from Nivå landscape responsible for the landscape project together with the artists Eva Pfannes and Sylvain Hartenberg from Ooze Architects and Urbanists.

Public transport from St:Eriksplan to the site and then a one hour "walk and talk" at the campus. Total time including travel aprox 2 h. Total walking distance: aprox. 2 km

#### **3. RÖDA BERGEN AND HAGASTADEN**

City development in the1920's & 2020's. Röda bergen is Stockholm's largest single inner-city environment, characterised by the urban planning ideals of the 1920s and buildings in large courtyard blocks. The green environments were the urban response to the garden city. The development of the city's land was coordinated with the individual to create an elaborate, high-quality urban environment. Röda Bergen as a whole has therefore been protected as a national interest since 1987.

Hagastaden is a new city centre district – where Solna and Stockholm meet. A total of 6,000 new homes and 50,000 workplaces will be built here. Hagastaden will have denser and higher buildings than what is currently common in the cityscape. The ground floors of the residential buildings will contain pre-schools, services, restaurants and cafés. The dense urban structure provides access to good communications and proximity to Stockholm's entire range of schools, services and green areas.






About: This tour visits some of the classical parks and areas of Stockholm, with Hagaparken being the foremost example of an English landscape park, Drottningholm being on the UNESCO's World Heritage list and the most well-preserved royal castle built in the 1600s in Sweden. Vällingby Centrum is Sweden's first ABC city – a city planning concept built on the idea that residents should be able to live, work, shop and get access to services all within close proximity. The tour will also take you through some classical residential areas in Bromma and Blackeberg from the 1930-1950s.

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### ALL DAY TOUR: **STOCKHOLM SEAFRONT**

Where: Djurgården with Blockhusudden, Kvarnholmen, Biskopsudden, Rosendals slott (Castle) and gardens
How: Boat and walking tour. Walking distance approx. 3 km.
Time: 8.45-17, including lunch
Meeting point: 8:45 am at Kajplats 17a, Strandvägen



About: This tour takes you by boat showing parts of Stockholm seafront as well as giving a taste of the unique archipelago. Along the boatride you will travel through Djurgårdskanalen, visit Blockhusudden, where the Tsunami Memorial parked was inaugurated in 2018, continue to Kvarnholmen, with new residential areas as well as old renovated industrial sites, make a stop at Biskopsudden with Frisens park, and end at Djurgårdsbrunnsviken, from where the tour continues by foot on Djurgården, an island that is part of the National city park and is home to historical buildings and monuments, museums, galleries, the amusement park Gröna Lund, the open-air museum Skansen, the small residential area Djurgårdsstaden, yacht harbours, and extensive stretches of forest and meadows.

#### HALF DAY TOUR: "STOCKHOLMSSKOLAN" IN OUR TIME

Where: Stadshuset/City hall Norr Mälarstrand – Rålambshovsparken – Kristinebergsparken – Hornsbergs strand
 How: Walking tour, total walking distance approx. 5 km

 Meeting point: Court yard, City Hall, Hantverkargatan 1, by the oak tree



About: This tours focuses on showcasing the planning ideal "Stockholmsskolan" and how it has evolved over time around the island of Kungsholmen. Kungsholmen is also where Stadshuset/the City hall is located which was built between 1911 and 1923. Designed by Ragnar Östberg, it is one of the most renown architectural projects of the 20th century in Sweden. The city uses the City Hall for the Municipal Council, the organization of the Nobel Prize banquet and other special ceremonies. The walk will continue via Rålambshovsparken, which began to be built in 1936 and has evolved since then, continue via Kristinebergsparken, a recent park addition and end at Hornsbergs Strand, where industrial sites has been converted into residential areas in the early 2000's.

## STOCKHOLM'S MODERN LANDSCAPES – CITY CENTER

Where: Sergels torg – Brunkebergs torg – Kungsträdgården
 How: Walking tour, total walking distance approx. 2km
 Time: 9.00-12.00 (am)
 Meeting point: Hötorget, by the sculpture Orfeusgruppen (by the concert hall)



About: This tour focuses on some of the landmarks in central Stockholm. All of these sites have a high historical and cultural value. Kungsträdgården is Stockholm's most central park and has its historical roots in the 1400s. The park is one of the city's most important meeting places, and its central location makes it a green centerpiece in the city. Brunkebergs torg and Sergels torg are also all important public spaces, with Sergels torg being one of Sweden's most renown squares from the Modern era, and Brunkebergstorg which has recently been renovated as part of the City center development.

## STOCKHOLM'S NEW SOUTHERN WATERFRONT

Where: Liljeholmskajen – Årstabergs-parken – Hammarby Sjöstad How: Walking tour, total walking distance approx. 5 km Time: 9-12 am Meeting point: Liljeholmstorget, in the centre of the square



About: This tour takes you through two of the bigger developments areas of Stockholm from early 2000s. Both Liljeholmskajen and Hammarby sjöstad are built on former industrial land, but have been transformed into new residential areas right outside of the central parts of Stockholm. In close connection to Liljeholmskajen the mountainpark Årstabergsparken links the residential developments to Årstaskogen, and since its recent refurbishment acts as an important park of the eara. Årstaskogen is an important nature reserve with a large continuous biotope and has great ecological values. The natural area is unique in the inner urban region.

## STOCKHOLM'S NEW NORTHERN WATERFRONT

Where: Norra Djurgårdsstaden (The Royal Seaport).
How: Walking tour, total walking distance approx. 2-3 km
Time: 14-17 pm
Meeting point: Subway station Ropsten, outside entrance Hjorthagen Nimrodsplan



About: This tour visits the Stockholm Royal Seaport which is one of the largest urban development areas in northen Europe with 12,000 new homes and 35,000 workplaces. Planning work started in the early 2000s. The area runs along the waterline of the Baltic Sea, lies next door to the Royal National City Park and is just ten minutes away from central Stockholm by bicycle. The industrial site around the gasworks has been transformed into an urban district that interacts with port operations and the existing residential areas. In this area new processes and solutions are tested and developed for a more sustainable future. Several recent projects will be presented on site.

## STOCKHOLM'S MODERN LANDSCAPES


Where: Skärholmen – Vårbergstoppen How: Walking tour, total walking distance approx. 4 km Time: 14-17 pm Meeting point: Subway station Vårberg, outside the ticket exits



**About**: This tour visits a more peripheral area of Stockholm. With a master plan from 1963, the idea was that Skärholmen would become an area center for the neighboring districts in southwestern Stockholm and the planning followed the Scaft plans, a plan for traffic separation, the goal of which was to separate car and pedestrian traffic. Car-free walkways, underpasses, footbridges and large parking lots were built at the homes. Vårbergstoppen is an artificial hill of 90 meters that was built in 1965-1982. It is a landscape park that is part of a large green area that extends in an east-west direction at the southern end of the district. In 2019-2021, the park was renovated with a new landscape design by LAND and Tyréns. The tour will also visit a spontaneous sports field, Puckelbollplan, designed by artist Ferner Ström, a perennial park with about 65 spieces by Piet Oudolf and Stefan Mattson, gardener, as well as "Jättarna" / The Giants, a recent urban land art project by Xavier Veilhan. Nearby Viking Mountain is Stockholm's highest point.

## **SKOGSKYRKOGÅRDEN - A WORLD HERITAGE SITE**

Where: Skogskyrkogården (the Woodland cementary) – Gamla Enskede / Kärrtorp
 How: Walking tour, total walking distance approx. 4 km
 Time: 14-17 pm
 Meeting point: Subway station Skogskyrkogården, outside the ticket exits



About: This tour visits Skogskyrkogården, a UNESCO world heritage site, and an important landmark in Stockholm. When Skogskyrkogården was founded at the beginning of the 1900s, the aim was to create something special, something original — a cemetery blending nature and architecture into a seamless whole. Gamla Enskede is a typical garden city in Stockholm. The Swedish garden cities were residential and single-family areas with moderate density and elements of public buildings, small squares with shops and a school and possibly a church. Kärrtorp is a district which was expanded in the 1950's, as many suburbs in Stockholm, along the Subway line, and was recently renovated.
